### Minutes of the Central Moravian Church Council January 29, 2017

Pastor Hopeton Clennon opened the annual meeting of the Central Moravian Church Council at 12:30 p.m. on Sunday, January 29, 2017. Following the singing of "What Brought Us Together", Barry Pell and Terry Delph were nominated for the offices of Council President and Secretary, respectively. Following custom, these two were elected by unanimous consent.

The Minutes of the 2016 Church Council were approved without modification. Nathan Bissey, Louisa Frey, and Mark Jones will serve as reviewers for the minutes of this year's minutes.

The first business item on the agenda was the presentation of the report of the Board of Elders, presented by Hopeton Clennon. Those Elders present were recognized with a round of applause.

Barry referred to the written reports of the various church committees for a description of their activities over the past year.

Anne Zug thanked the congregation for the strong support afforded the Joint Board in 2016. She recognized Jim Whildin, who spoke of the progress of the Almawas family that Central has sponsored. The father is currently employed, although at a minimum wage job, and the children are prospering in the Allentown School District. We will continue to support them as necessary. Anne then welcomed Bill Sachs to the podium, who outlined the status of the 275<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Campaign. At the present time, the campaign has reached approximately 75% of its goal.

George Mowers, Financial Secretary, then outlined the 2016 financial results. The majority of the Christian Spring property was sold in early 2016, a welcome relief. The house and adjoining acreage is still on the market. The Barnette Scholarship Fund was established last year as well, with the goal of supporting international students at Moravian College. Finally, we also established a Resettlement Fund to support the needs of the Almawas family. On the negative side, George noted a disquieting three-year decrease in envelope receipts. The result of this was a deficit of slightly less than \$18,000 for 2016. 2014 and 2015 showed deficits of approximately similar size. The budget shortfall was covered this year by a

generous unrestricted gift from a deceased Central member.

Rob Phillips followed with a presentation of the 2017 budget. This budget projects a total income of \$847,665. A slight increase in envelope giving is forecast, to a level of \$535,000. The budget provides for staff raises of 1%. Rob characterized the overall budget as "plausibly aggressive." The budget passed with no dissent.

### **Board of Elders**

The year under review brought with it several highlights in our faithful ministry and mission at Central. We are maintaining the longstanding tradition of excellent partnership with the Board of Trustees in facilitating the effective work of our worshiping, learning and serving community. Among the twelve elected Elders along with **Pastor Lynnette Delbridge** and myself, we are very grateful to have **Hank Naisby** serving as Vice President and **Ann Raines** serving as Secretary.

Two Elders rotated off the board after the faithful completion of their terms in office. We offer our deepest appreciation to **Bill Sachs** who served as Vice President of the Board for five years and to **Frank Shipman** who chaired the Church Family Life and guided the development of the Emergency Preparedness Task Force. The newly elected Elders in 2017 are **James Jordan** and **Mary Shields**.

According to the Handbook of Central Moravian Church, the Board of Elders is charged with the spiritual care of the congregation, overseeing worship, membership, and the work of various committees. These committees include: Christian Education chaired by Pat Herman, Church Family Life chaired by Elissa Derbak, Communications chaired by Ann Raines, Congregational Care (in development) chaired by Julie Atwood, History chaired by Diane Shaw, International Student Care, Membership, Mission, Music, Putz reported on by Ken Kodama, Resettlement, Social Action co-chaired by Janice Ostock, and Stewardship reported on by Martha Griffis. We are grateful for the guidance we receive from Steve Schlack in his leadership roles with other committees reporting primarily to the Board of Trustees. At our monthly meetings we welcome the Trustee representative and review minutes of past Trustees' meetings, review attendance statistics, act on changes in membership (admissions and removals), and work on correspondence to members and organizations. We also determine when, how and by whom the five buildings for which Central Moravian Church is responsible are used. Any appeals for causes outside of our congregation come before the Elders for approval.

We began 2017 welcoming new leadership for the Sacristan Corps in January, moved through the

climatic celebration of the 275<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the formation of the congregation in June, and ended with a focus on worship attendance, long-distance members, non-communicant members, and communing children in December. Challenging questions abound. We hope we dealt with each issue with love, grace, and careful attention to the Holy Scriptures and the policies of the Moravian Church Northern Province. Thank you for your prayerful support. We deeply value your responses and recommendations. We remain committed to walking with members, friends, and newcomers in our journey of faith.

Timothy Brady took over the role of Head Male Sacristan on January 1, succeeding Jeffrey Griffis who completed 25 years in that position. He is capably assisted by Nathan Bissey and Philip Corvino. The Female Sacristans changed leaders at the start of 2017 as well. The long-serving Judy Thomas and her assistant Nancy Foster stepped down from their leadership positions. The Co-Head Female Sacristans are Beth Boyer and Ann Raines.

The midweek Lenten program ran from March 8 – April 5. The theme focused on community service, local and international. **David Wickmann** spoke about hunger and the Food Pantry; **Rose Warner** spoke about homelessness and the Bethlehem Emergency Sheltering; **Abbas Khalaf** from Iraq gave a personal testimony about refugee resettlement; **Jackson Mlimuka** from Tanzania spoke about the international Moravian students' scholarship program; **Bob Brown**, **Bob Adams and Harry Tachovsky** hosted presentations on Habitat for Humanity.

After more than a year of 275th Anniversary events and publications in the congregation and community, we gathered in Johnston Hall at Moravian College in June for a community lovefeast to mark the establishment of the Bethlehem congregation. This was on the same date, June 25th, as it was in 1742. The 275th Anniversary Lovefeast began with Outdoor Brass Preludes by a community brass band made up of members from local churches and led in three sections by Don Kemmerer, Caitlin Heckman and Allan Frank. The Moravian Youth Brass Choir played the postlude for this 3 p.m. service. Greetings and messages during the service were brought by Dr. Bryon Grigsby (College President), Bishop Sam Zeiser (ELCA), The Rev. Canon Maria Tjeltveit (Episcopal Church), The Rev. Dr. Betsy Miller (PEC President),

Bishop Blair Couch (descendent of Count Nicholas Ludwig von Zinzendorf), Dr. Paul Peucker (Archivist), and The Rev. Dr. Cortroy Jarvis (Chairman, Worldwide Moravian Unity Board). We express our deepest gratitude to the Bethlehem Area Moravian, Inc. for underwriting much of the cost for the lovefeast celebration. Earlier that morning we launched the book edited by **Rebecca Kleintop Owens**, *Praise and Thanksgiving: For 275 Years of Music at Central Moravian Church*, during our 10 a.m. worship service. Best wishes to Rebecca who was united in marriage to **Ralph Lepore** on July 22, 2017.

The Joint Board and congregation acknowledged milestone employment anniversaries for two members of the church staff in the fall of 2017. Director of Music **Rebecca Lepore** celebrated her 15<sup>th</sup> anniversary on September 15. Becky was presented by original artwork created by **Timothy Naisby** at a worship service on September 10. Financial Secretary **George Mowers** celebrated his 15<sup>th</sup> anniversary on October 7.

Of some concern is the declining pattern of the statics tracking worship attendance. We acknowledge national trends in both the sacred and secular sectors. We celebrate the vitality reflected in so many areas of our ministry and mission including the music ministry, opportunities for children and youth, adult discussion groups, as well as food, clothing, and homeless mission work on and off our campus, in the Lehigh Valley and around the world. In recent decades, the year 2006 is the high watermark for worship attendance. The Board of Elders is undertaking the task to study the issue. We anticipate implementing changes that may address the issue of declining numbers while keeping our focus on key factors that have no numerical assessment.

In the closing months of the year, we explored what to do about the following:

- A) Inactive members who are living more than an hour away from the Lehigh Valley.
- B) Children of members who were baptized as babies and are now more that 21 years old without participating in a catechetical experience or the Rite of Confirmation.
- Baptized children receiving Holy Communion who should be listed in a membership category we have not used at Central: Communing

### Children.

In addition to the year long catechism culminating in confirmation for our youth members on June 11, we also had the reception of adult members on March 12, March 26, and October 8. Guest preachers during 2017 included the Rev. Dr. Craig Atwood (Central member), the Rev. Jennifer Nichols (Presbyterian), the Rev. Dr. Steve Simmons (Presbyterian), and the Rev. Dr. Walter Wagner (Lutheran). We were fortunate to have at least 15 lay members present mission moments during worship services in 2017.

It is our goal to keep expanding opportunities for worship, education and fellowship, in accordance with the mission statement of Central Moravian Church. That statement continues: "Our members are committed to meeting the needs of society and nurturing individuals on their spiritual journeys as we honor our Moravian heritage. We live our lives serving and fulfilling the mission of Christ in the world."

### **Christian Education Committee**

### Opportunities for Children and Youth

Church Nursery: We are grateful to our nursery volunteers who provide childcare for our smallest children in the West Room of the Sanctuary building during our 11 a.m. worship services (10 a.m. in the summer). Children can stay in the nursery for the entire worship service or start out in the Sanctuary and then go to the nursery when they need a break. Juice boxes and regular and gluten free snacks are available. Children's furniture and toys offer several play options for the children and parents using the nursery. A new rotation of volunteers began in June of 2017.

We also experimented with providing activity packets for the children attending our Christmas Eve services. These packets included crayons, a double-sided coloring page and two pipe cleaners. All 34 packets were in use at the 1 p.m. Children's Lovefeast. Parents appreciated having something for their children to do before the services began. Many were also used at the 5:30 p.m. service.

Family Play Group: With leadership provided by parent Elissa Derbak, we offer a monthly opportunity for parents, grandparents, caregivers and their infants and toddlers to meet each other, play together, and share in a brief circle time during the Sunday School hour.

Sunday School and Children's Choir: JoAnna Freund, our Sunday School Superintendent and Children's Choir Director, leads our preschool and elementary Sunday School teachers, Jane Corvino, Gayle Dimmick, Faith Fiegel and Diana Worley in offering a loving environment, creative presentation of bible stories, and musical activities. The children learn music which complements the content of their Sunday School lessons. Their involvement in worship during 2017 included singing for the Christian Family Lovefeast in May, singing for a 9 a.m. service in October in which they heard the story of the Call of Samuel, taking up Red Wagon offerings for the Food Pantry in April and November, and singing and presenting the story of the shepherds on Dec. 17 at the 11 a.m. worship and for the Children's Lovefeast on Dec. 24. The Youth Sunday School class is taught by Beth Careyva and Pastor Delbridge. Beginning in Fall of 2017, we have been using stories from the Narrative Lectionary and curricula provided by Spirit and Truth

and Spill the Beans.

Friday Night Fun: First through fifth graders meet on the second Friday night of each month September through May from 6 to 8 p.m. Sessions include supper, time to explore a bible story, play and crafts. In the fall, Pastor Delbridge and seminary students Charlie McDonald and Alyssa Nelson took over leadership for this program from Emily Toyberg and seminary graduate, Ben Lippert.

Youth Group: Our middle school and high school youth typically meet on Sunday nights from 6 to 8 p.m. September through early June. The 13 youth who regularly attend engage in a variety of learning, discussion, prayer, service and fun activities. For service activities, the group helped to stuff Easter Eggs, placed hyacinths on graves in God's Acre for Easter, stocked shelves in the Food Pantry, sorted clothing at Cynthia's Boutique, cleaned out and put brochures in the Sanctuary pew racks, cooked and served supper for the Women's shelter, helped pack meals for Haiti, participated in the CROP Walk, wrapped candles, baked cookies and went Christmas caroling at King's Daughters Home and Moravian Houses. Fun activities included a Lock-In, movie and game nights, a Friendsgiving dinner, going to Free Fall, and enjoying a swim party at the home of Karen Ferrey and Nancy Meckstroth. We also discussed the involvement of youth in the Civil Rights movement and attended the Palm Sunday reading service together. We typically take turns at each meeting sharing our highs and lows for the week.

Sarah Phillips and Lynnette Delbridge provide regular adult leadership. In the fall they were joined by Charlie McDonald, a seminary student, and Steve and Katie Kish, members at Edgeboro Moravian Church. Steve and Charlie take turns assisting with the group. We appreciate other adults from the congregation who have lent their special gifts to the group. These adults include Charlotte McGorry, Regina Kelechava, David Wickmann, Rose Warner, Martha Griffis, Ben Wallace, Krysti Nappi, Caitlin Heckman, Robert Wascura, Hopeton Clennon, Pam Larimer, Beth Davis, Andy Meckstroth, and many other parents who pitch in from time to time.

**Confirmation:** Six of our 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> graders confirmed their faith on June 11, 2017. We celebrated in worship and with a pancake breakfast prepared by the Christian Education Committee. Confirmation classes met on

Sunday mornings each week and once or twice a month on Friday nights. Sunday morning sessions included a 9:30 to 10 a.m. time to explore spiritual practices such as reading the *Daily Texts*, breathing and being silent, giving thanks, and journaling. The regular 10 to 10:45 a.m. Sunday School hour explored salvation history from the perspective of characters in the Old and New Testament. Friday night sessions provided a time to take a deeper look at key scripture passages such as the Ten Commandments and the Sermon on the Mount and to delve into Moravian history and practices. Four of the class members also attended the Eastern District Confirmation Retreat at Camp Hope in May.

The Confirmation teaching staff included Mary Mowrer, Beth Careyva, Steve and Margaret Kraweic, Peter and Renae Behrens, and Lynnette Delbridge with occasional assistance from Craig Atwood.

Beginning in the fall of 2018, a new confirmation class for rising 6<sup>th</sup> and 7<sup>th</sup> graders and any youth who have not already taken part in confirmation will get underway for the 2018-2019 school year.

Vacation Bible School: We cooperated with East Hills Moravian and Advent Moravian Churches in offering VBS again this year. VBS was held at Advent Moravian Church, June 12-16, 2017, and we used a curriculum provided by Cokesbury called *Hero Central*. The children and staff began and ended their day together in assembly and rotated between music, bible story, crafts, science, and recreation and snack sites. We served a total of 41 children who came from the neighborhood and the three congregations. Eight children, seven youth helpers, and seven adult leaders from Central participated.

Camp Hope: 11 children and youth attended week long conferences for their age group and 8 also attended week long specialty camps. We are grateful to the Busy Workers and several individuals whose generous contributions, added to income from the Allen Fund, made it possible for us to offer camperships for each person attending camp.

Advent Workshop: Our annual Advent Workshop took place on Dec. 3 with 62 people participating. Led by Carol Holbert, our staff provided a variety of activities: making felt Moravian candles, Advent wreaths, pinecone bird feeders, decorating ornaments and angels, marble painting stars, and making tea light

luminaria. An Advent coloring book, produced for the event with an activity for each day, was also available for children to take home. Mark Jones supplied refreshments and those attending enjoyed Christmas music provided by Mary Mowrer and Dick Groman.

### **Adult Christian Education Opportunities**

**Friendship Bible class:** This class, led by Howard Cox, meets in the church office conference room and has been studying and discussing scripture on Sunday mornings since 1936.

Comenius Sunday: This discussion group meets from 9 to 11 a.m. on Sunday mornings in the C. E. building, lower level, to watch and discuss DVD's and YouTubes with a bearing on Faith and morality

**Comenius Tuesday:** This group is led by AnneMarie Whildin and they studied various books throughout the year.

**Parents Group:** Informal gathering of parents (with children of all ages) meets in the C. E. building's Zinzendorf Parlor.

Adult Classes led by Pastor Maggie Wellert: In the Spring, the CEC collaborated with the Social Action Committee in bringing the Rev. Maggie Wellert to teach the Sunday morning discussion sessions on <a href="Difficult Conversations">Difficult Conversations</a>, a book by Douglas Stone, Bruce Patton, and Sheila Heen. Hank Naisby led the Wednesday evening discussion group studying the same book. Pastor Wellert then followed up with a series on the Moravian Covenant for Christian Living and Walter Wink's book, Jesus and Nonviolence: A <a href="Third Way">Third Way</a>. In the fall, Pastor Wellert led a series called Stories for Life following the same narrative lectionary stories used by the children's and youth Sunday School classes.

### **History Committee**

The Central History Committee has just completed its eleventh year. 2017 saw our involvement with the 275<sup>th</sup> Anniversary celebration of the founding of Bethlehem the Moravian congregation; planning for the storage and display of Central's historical materials as part of the Capital Campaign; and special programs for Central's Moravian History Month and Christmas.

The Committee participated in the 275th Anniversary's Moravian Day on June 17, offering tours of the Sanctuary and a sale table of publications, Christmas cards, and the new replica door handles created by Shelly Watson. We also commissioned another exhibition in the Christian Education Building lobby from Tom McCullough of the Moravian Archives—this one was a history of Moravian anniversaries. The Committee also began to try to envision what a secure storage space might look like in Central's basement. Barry Pell did some preliminary sketches and there were discussions with the Buildings and Grounds Committee. Carol Reifinger helped oversee the return of Central's accessioned furniture from Christian Spring to temporary storage in the basement, and she also put together a list of ideas for future exhibitions highlighting some of Central's historical objects. Instead of celebrating Moravian history in September as we have done in previous years, we moved it to October so that we could commemorate the 500th anniversary of the Protestant Reformation. Paul Peucker chaired a subcommittee that brought two excellent speakers to Central's pulpit in October-the Rev. Drs. Craig Atwood and Walter Wagner—to talk about this historic moment in the context of the Moravians. And finally, the Committee celebrated the 80th anniversary of Central's putz by offering a "Putz Crawl" on December 9, with tours of three church putzes and three private putzes, and with all proceeds earmarked for Caribbean hurricane relief. June Griffiths ably chaired this subcommittee.

The History Committee's work is always very engaging and often unexpected. We would encourage any Central members who think they might be interested in joining us to contact Diane Shaw.

The Membership Committee's mission is to welcome and embrace new members while encouraging the involvement of all members in the life of the church through faithful worship, service, and fellowship. The committee, which reports to the Board of Elders, also engages in outreach to attract visitors and new members.

The committee organized two outreach events in 2017: a spring *Invite-a-Friend* worship service coinciding with the Great Sabbath Lovefeast and a fall *Invite-a-Friend* Sunday in conjunction with the Lovefeast for November 13, held on November 12. The committee again printed door hangers with a schedule of Central's Advent and Christmas season events for members to distribute in their local neighborhoods, designed and printed a limited run of bookmarks with a schedule of events for the Lenten and Easter season, and for the sixth year, mailed Christmas cards to distant members of our congregation.

This year, in an effort to save time and money, the committee partnered with the Church Office to create press-ready copy of Central's 2017 Pictorial Directory. After multiple rounds of proofreading, the finished directory was printed and ready for distribution in late July.

This fall, the committee organized a pilot RideConnexion program with the objective of matching volunteer drivers with Sisters and Brothers who need transportation to attend Sunday worship services. While formal evaluation of the pilot is pending, informal observation suggests that the program could benefit from improved communication among participants.

### **Mission Committee**

The Mission Committee of Central Moravian Church affirms, prays for and helps promote the international mission efforts approved by the Joint Board of Elders and Trustees through groups, organizations and individuals. In carrying out this mission, the Mission Committee partners with the Board of World Mission. This year the committee recognizes and appreciates the long-term devotion of Hal Smith as committee chair. Hal's leadership has been crucial to the encouragement, guidance, and careful stewardship of resources for many years. Hal transitioned off the mission committee in May, and the committee offers sincere gratitude on behalf of the congregation for his commitment and leadership to Christ centered ministries and mission. Another transition for the committee this year was the retirement of, Judy Ganz, Executive Director of the Board of World Missions. Judy is warmly thanked for her help and leadership as we partnered in mission. We welcome Justin Rabbach in his new post as Executive Director and look forward to working together.

We also extend our deepest thanks to Bill and Peg Hoffman for their many years of extraordinary service in Africa. Bill provides the following update on mission in Tanzania.

### **Church Council Report from Tanzania**

During 2017 Bill and Peg Hoffman made their 30<sup>th</sup> and 31<sup>st</sup> trips to Sikonge, Tanzania, in support of Central's partnership with the Sikonge Moravian churches. They anticipate returning to Bethlehem the second week of January.

### **Orphan Program**

The orphan program includes thirty-six villages in the Sikonge district and five parishes in the city of Tabora. It serves 409 orphans in the city and 2,743 in and around the village of Sikonge. These figures are little changed from previous years. In Tabora, 37% of the children are in secondary education or beyond. This compares with 10 % in the villages. The difference is due to the availability of teachers in the city.

The total cost of the combined programs for 2017 was \$76,000, or \$24 per orphan per year. This is 80% of the total expense in 2016, but still covers the same items such as food, clothing, medical care, school uniforms and supplies, and personal items such as soap. It also includes all educational costs beginning with kindergarten and extending through the university for those able to pass the government's entrance exams. This significant decrease was primarily due to the scarcity of maize. Being unable to purchase supplies locally or nationally, this expense fell from \$21,500 to \$8,000. In addition, the president of Tanzania has kept his promise to terminate all fees for primary and secondary school. The result is that educational expenditures have fallen by \$7,000. Due to the ever increasing numbers of children beyond secondary school, however, education still accounts for over 65% of the total budget.

### **Church Construction**

Churches at Iyombakuzova (11<sup>th</sup>), Msuva (12<sup>th</sup>), and Mkolye (13<sup>th</sup>) have been completed. Kabanga Moravian (14<sup>th</sup>), being constructed to honor of the memory of Gordon Mowrer, is currently being plastered; doors and windows are still being constructed. It should be completed by late spring. Congregations at Imalampaka, Mazinge, Mwasavanga, and Madukani have asked for construction assistance.

### Wells

Over the last year a total of seven wells have been reconstructed with metal pumps. Each was fully functional during the exceptionally severe dry season.

### Special Needs School

The next school year begins the second week of January. Enrollment data will not be available until several weeks later. The new dormitory, built and furnished by the federal government, should increase the boarding capacity of the school to nearly 100 children.

Vocational training has begun with the intent of providing these children with the skills needed to at least partially support themselves.

Funds have been made available to Mama Kimwaga to provide uniforms and small personal items, such as soap and skin oil, for non-orphaned students from impoverished families.

### **Additional Developments**

Ernest Parker Jr. of North Carolina has continued his support for pastoral training. He is providing full scholarships for the education of six assistant pastoral students at the Lusangi Bible School.

Multiple groups from Central have provided the Tanzanian orphan ladies with the money needed to send their own children for additional education.

The Hoffmans and the Tanzanian Moravian Mamas gratefully acknowledge the continued financial and spiritual support of Central Moravian Church, without which this ministry would not exist.

### Nepal Moravian Outreach

Craig and Alice Mosebach offer the following letter from Shanti and Vani Pradhan. Craig adds that while NMO committee is disbanding, the mission goes on and is growing. Central will not abandon them. Please pray for their continuing success.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Greetings from Kathmandu, Nepal!

We write to you with very grateful hearts as we prepare for the closure of the Nepali Moravian Outreach (NMO) as our primary contact with congregations in the U.S. and Canada who supports the ministry of the Nepali Moravian Church and its schools. In its place the Board of World Mission (BWM) will continue to receive donations for our work and provide information back to you about all that is going on in Nepal through our quarterly newsletter and emails.

The reason for this change is very positive in that the original goals in the formation of NMO have been met. Our ministry is well-developed, stable and moving forward, with some income from the school now able to provide toward other needs.

Eight years ago, on 16, May 2009 we completed our seminary education and on 17 May 2009, we were ordained and in the same month, three churches (where we served) and the Board of World Mission came together to form the Nepali Moravian Outreach (NMO). It came into existence with the purpose "to support the vision of the Nepali Moravian Outreach to share the good news of Christ through the ministries of the Nepali Moravian Church, transforming lives, educating and equipping people to impact the community and the nation at large".

For the last 8 years, we have witnessed God's work through NMO ministry. There were many who served in this committee since its inception, some have gone to be with our Lord, some moved on as they gracefully handed the baton to the next member. Likewise, many partners/donors are no longer with us, but their presence is alive in the work they contributed so graciously in Nepal.

We give thanks to God for raising up people like you who has been a part of the ministry supporting us through your financial commitment, through prayer and through your precious advice. We will indeed cherish it over many years as Lord continues to lead us in the next step of the journey.

### Eight years at a glance

### Mission teams and Mission work in Nepal

- June 2011: Meredith Alexander She came for a month and worked at the Moravian preschool. Rev. Jeff Copage was also here and he worked with the church.

- April 2012: Christie and David Melby Gibbons Our friends from seminary came to visit us and encourage us with their presence and support. In their short visit they helped at the school and church.

- April 2015: NMO Mission team Five members came to Nepal and they came at a time when the school was relocating. Their presence and help made the difficult transition so much easier and blessed.
- Dec-Jan 2015/16: Minnesota Mission Team: Consisting of 10 people was here from Dec 27 to January 9,2016. They ran winter camps at the school and church Sunday school and youth camps. One of the Members of this team also designed the logo for the new grade school that was still in the planning and now a reality Shristi Academy
- June 2016: Andrew Mengel Worked at the grade school for a month.
- July August 2016: Timothy Naisby worked at the school for a month.
- August 2016: Phyllis Rosner- Worked at the school for a month.
- Feb April 2017: Autumn Cooper, Sarah Jennings and Fran Huetter taught at the school and helped at the church.
- June-July 2017: Jessy, Jamie, Jessy Worked in grade school, gave swimming lessons, developed curriculum for grade I and II.
- October 19 to Nov 9, 2017: Catherine Moyzan, Susan Trimble, Jody Bryant worked with grade I and II.

### May 2012: Tuition Aid Program

Seven children are currently enrolled in the Moravian pre-school in Kathmandu under this program

### November 2015: Higher Education Scholarship Program

Jayanti Rai has been enrolled in the BSc nursing program in Nepal. She will finish the four-year course in 2019.

### **Fund Raising**

Fashion Shows: In May 2010, March 2011 and March 2012, three very creative and meaningful Fashion shows were organized by the NMO team in the US to raise support for the purchase of the pre-school and other ministry needs.

Moravian Pins: In the summer of 2011 Marie Keim, College Hill, and Myra Jones, Edgeboro, asked Liztech Jewelry in East Stroudsburg, PA to create a Moravian Star pin as a fundraiser. Liztech, Musselman Jewelers in Bethlehem, and through Alice Mosebach, the Central Church office and Star and Candle Shop graciously sell our pins. The Lord has blessed this pin ministry with over 375 pins sold to date.

After the earthquake in April 2015, NMO was a part of the fund-raising effort with the British Province and Board of World missions to raise funds to purchase the Khokona church land as the previous rented building was damaged by the earthquake. The amount of 134,000 USD was raised, and the land transferred to the Moravians in January 2017.

### **Others**

May 2010: Car purchased for the Pradhan's to assist in the needs of the ministry in partnership with Central Moravian Church (Dough and Carol retirement fund).

### NMO also helped with:

Financial support to Pradhans in partnership with the British Province. Building the School Shed, Playground equipment.

Over the 8 years we were able to visit the US twice. All the traveling, boarding expense were born by the NMO team.

As we gradually bring the NMO ministry to a close, we feel nothing less than gratitude and awe for we experienced miracles every step of the way. Amazing people, beautiful memories, new relationships and ongoing ministries and so much more. When we all responded to fulfill the great commission to go out into the ends of the earth (Nepal), we trusted God all the way. We are very grateful to all the individuals, organizations and churches who sent out their missionaries to bless the ministry through their time and expertise. We believe God has touched their lives in ways only they can explain.

A special mention of gratitude to our present committee members: Jack A Thomas, Rev. David Geyer, Sue Yoltz from College Hill Moravian Church, Alice and Craig Mosbach, Central Moravian Church, Myra Jones, Edgeboro Moravian Church, Rev. Judy Ganz from the Board of World Mission.

### **Music Committee**

The music program at Central continued to expand this year because of the many gifts, talents and time that was given by so many people! Under the extraordinary leadership of Llyena Boylan, the music committee oversaw many wonderful projects and events. The committee meets six times during the year with subcommittees created when necessary.

### Goals that were accomplished in 2017 include:

- 1. Create a book about the history of the music of Central Moravian Church. a. Praise and Thanksgiving: For 275 Years of Music at Central Moravian Church was released on June 25, 2017, in celebration of the 275th Anniversary of Central Moravian Church. This book concluded four years of research and included memoirs, photos, and articles, many of which were submitted by more than one hundred members of the congregation or friends of Central Moravian Church. This 256 page book edited by Rebecca Kleintop Lepore is being sold through the church office and at the Moravian Book Shop.
- 2. More involvement of Central Church and Moravian College organ students in the music program at Central Moravian Church.
  - a. Becky Lepore is an adjunct faculty member of Moravian College and teaches classes, private organ lessons, hymnody, organ literature, and hymn improvisation to Moravian College Students.
  - b. Throughout the year, Moravian
     College students performed during the worship services of Central Moravian
     Church including the second Moravian
     College Music Sunday on September 18<sup>th</sup>.
  - Once per semester, Moravian College is holding their weekly performance class in our Sanctuary and specifically features organ students of Becky Lepore.
  - d. Four college students have become regular members of our choir, as well as several others who have offered

their gifts and talents during our worship services.

- e. Becky Lepore met with and created a Bible study for these incredible college students.
- 3. A Choir trip to Ohio in July.
- 4. A Johnston Memorial Concert featuring a full orchestra and choir performing Haydn's Harmoniemesse was held in October.
- 5. As a result of extraordinary generosity of congregation members during our capital campaign, a beautiful brand new Steinway piano (Model in 1098 in Mahogany) was purchased from Jacob's Music in Philadelphia and was installed in the Sanctuary balcony.

The Chapel Choir, under the direction of Richard Miller, has continued to bless the 9 a.m. worship services. In addition to the Chapel Choir, Richard Miller has done a beautiful job of creating a wide variety of musical offerings such as instrumentalists, soloists, duets, quartets, youth musicians, and a men's choir for the 9 a.m. service. Richard Miller also assisted in the service playing during the Holy Week and Christmas season. In September, Richard concluded his faithful service as the organist and choir director at the West Side Moravian Church.

The Central Moravian Brass Choir, under the spirited leadership of Central member Caitlin Heckman, plays the second Sunday of every month at the 11 a.m. worship service in addition to community events. This growing group consists of members and friends of Central Moravian Church, greatly enhances our worship experience, and has become a wonderful way of integrating young musicians into our music program.

The Men's Choir is a group of men from the Central Choir, Chapel Choir, and congregation members and friends of members that sings several times throughout the year. There is one rehearsal that takes place the morning of the worship service in which they sing.

The Central Church Choir is an amazing group of individuals who continue to give generously of their time and talents to both enhance our worship services and concerts, but also to provide musical outreach in the community. Each member contributes so much

above and beyond their music to this ensemble whether it be as choir officers, (Hank Naisby, president) quartet, (Cathy Spallitta, Deborah Leyshon-Brandt, David Charrier, and Bob Beck), librarians (Alice Mosebach and Karen Naisby) hospitality coordinators, (Karen Naisby and Linda Wickmann) spiritual devotions, musical ideas, and humor, just to name a few. Thank you for all you do, and for being such a blessing!

We are also blessed to have the Bethlehem Area Moravian Trombone Choir, under the direction of Don Kemmerer, as a part of our worship services here at Central Moravian Church. In addition to playing chorales from the belfry on the last Sunday of each month, Bach at Noon concerts and at various memorial services throughout the year, this choir, who is a valuable part of our Moravian musical heritage, plays in worship ten times a year: August 13th lovefeast, Children's Christmas Eve Lovefeast, New Year's Eve, first Sunday in Epiphany, Ash Wednesday, Palm Sunday through Wednesday evening services during Holy Week and our Easter Dawn Service. Thank you to Don Kemmerer, Nancy Beitel-Vessels and the many members of the trombone choir. We look forward to many more years of being blessed by the Trombone Choir.

We were equally blessed by special music presented by the **Mainstreet Brass** (Palm Sunday, Easter, A Musical Christmas Extravaganza, Lessons and Carols, and Christmas Eve), and classical guitarist, **John Arnold** (Christmas Contemplative Worship).

CDs are selling well. One of our CDs (An Old-Fashioned Moravian Christmas) has officially sold out, and we have sold over 4500 Christmas Eve at Central Moravian Church CDs. These recordings are being sold in the church office, Star and Candle Shoppe, after concerts, through the mail, and at the Moravian Book Shop. All five (Christmas Eve at Central Moravian Church, Favorite Hymns at Central, An Old-Fashioned Moravian Christmas, To God All Praise and Glory, and Be Still My Soul) continue to sell successfully at the price of \$5 each in the church office. A portion of these sales are given back to the general operating budget of the church on an annual basis as well as to the choir checking account. I am grateful for the extraordinary gifts of Kelly Knapp who continues to be responsible for the accounting, inventory, filling CD orders and giving complete financial records of the CD account to George

Mowers, the Music Committee, and to the Board of Trustees.

Concerts at Central have continued to be a success in offering the gifts of local musicians as well as bringing visitors into our Old Chapel and Sanctuary. We are thankful that Karen and Tim Brady have provided leadership in preparing the Sanctuary and Chapel for concerts, handing out programs, collecting offering, and cleaning up after the concert.

We continue to value the good ministry of many agencies in the area and are fortunate to work with them. We have attempted to recruit more volunteers for efforts such as the Emergency Shelter.

- of this idea of commerce). This year the project has transferred hands from AnneMarie and Jim Whildin to Beth Davis. We thank the Whildins for their many years of service.
- The Bethlehem Interfaith Resettlement
  Committee consists of members from five
  local churches uniting to sponsor refugees to
  the Lehigh Valley. Central Church provides 20
  volunteers who tutor our refugee family of
  seven, take them to medical appointments,
  help them at school, monitor finances, and
  acclimate them to life in America. The family
  has moved to a bigger apartment and has taken
  over many of the day to day tasks that the
  Committee assisted with. We joined with the
  Busy Workers at a shower for their new baby
  this summer.
- Central Food Pantry: (see separate report).
- Cynthia's Boutique is ably led by Charlie McGorry and Gina Kelechava. The Boutique's monthly clothing distribution averages about 40 customers. They also have given clothing to Goodwill, ARM, organizations that benefit women returning to the workforce and several special needs cases. Their newest endeavor is working with Esperanza: setting up a clothing distribution area and organizing clothing and other donated goods that are being offered to Esperanza members and their families coming to the area as climate refugees from Puerto Rico. It's been a successful and rewarding year for the Boutique and they are grateful for a close relationship with the Food Pantry.
- **Bethlehem Emergency Cold-Weather** Shelter: Rose Warner was our overall coordinator for the 2016-17 shelter, with weekly coordinators Peter Behrens, Peter Diehl (East Hills), Janice Ostock, and Michelle Walters, and supplies coordinators Don and Jacque Jean. Rose provided strong leadership and many, many hours of volunteering. We provided shelter Saturday evenings and also opened for a longer period for snowstorms. We averaged 15 women most nights. Rose was able to recruit volunteers from a number of groups besides Central, including students from Ursinus College, but volunteers are always needed, especially for overnights this year. For the 2017-18 season, the shelter has moved to one central site at Christ Church UCC and includes both men and women, which means a much larger group

- to feed (close to 90). Central is in charge of the second and third Saturdays of the month. Although there is now an overnight security person, we still need volunteers for many tasks!
- Bread for the World: our offering of letters this year used postcards with a message to our members of Congress, encouraging them to continue budget support for programs (WIC, SNAP, etc). that help provide food for those in need. We also donated \$400. Rose Warner led this effort.
- Church World Service: (promotion of CROP Walk in October, over \$4,000 raised from Central). Despite rain and scheduling conflicts with the Johnston Memorial Festival Concert, the walk went well, and teens from Central joined the walking group. Thanks again to Helen Foraste for her CROP Walk leadership.
- Moravian Open Door: (annual gift of \$400, congregational awareness).
- Esperanza/BAM Minstries: Hurricane Relief. Central gathered donations of household goods for families coming to Bethlehem from Puerto Rico. Committee members helped with packing welcome kits at Esperanza.
- Community Services for Children and Esperanza: Central Santas in November gave 165 gifts of warm clothing and books to needy children in the Lehigh Valley from CSC and Esperanza.
- Victory House: (congregational awareness, volunteers for meals, annual gift of \$400, plus \$100 in kitchen supplies, bath sandals, umbrellas).
- New Bethany Ministries: (congregational awareness, participated in Luminaria night, annual gift of \$400, volunteers).
- Northeast Ministry: \$400 for summer program.

In addition to our work with partners, the Social Action Committee ran our annual discussion group called Travelers' Together in January and February on the topic of Difficult Conversations, under the direction of the Rev. Maggie Wellert and Hank Naisby. The discussions and book were focused on helping people have caring conversations.

We attempted to continue fostering concern for our environment in various ways. For *Caring for Creation*,

we had a workshop on backyard gardening with native plants with Mare Ashford. We planted 27 American Chestnut trees at Christian Spring, with guidance from Bill Sachs. Mary Jo Hill and Peg Church contributed articles to *The Belfry* to help people think about ways to support the environment. We have had discussions with the Green Faith organization to help us think about more ways our congregation can be better stewards of our environment.

In August, we helped host the Central Chautauqua on the Birds and the Bees. We thank Steve Krawiec for his able leadership. We also thank Priscilla and Rett Oren for their presentation on birdwatching and Kelly Knapp and Gaby Dee for their presentation on beekeeping. 35 people attended.

In September, we hosted a bus trip to the National Museum of African American History and Culture in Washington, DC. Hopeton arranged for a guided tour, and we were lucky enough to be there on the first anniversary of the museum.

We thank our dedicated committee and congregation for an excellent year of caring and action.

# Foundations—The Campaign for Central Moravian Church's 275<sup>th</sup> Anniversary

The Campaign for Central Moravian Church's 275th Anniversary was publicly launched at an open forum on Sunday, October 9 in 2016. The campaign, which began with an excellent foundation of \$306,000 from pledges received earlier in the year during its silent phase, closed out 2016 with 108 pledges totaling approximately \$650,000—more than two-thirds of its overall goal of \$825,000! By the beginning of April, 2017, pledges totaled \$725,000, and on June 23, two days before the 275th Anniversary of the organization of the Moravian congregation in Bethlehem, Tidings of Great Joy! Foundations reached its goal with total pledges exceeding \$825,000. In early August, donor acknowledgements were joyfully mailed to all members of the congregation and to Central's friends and local business partners who supported the campaign.

Campaign Results. With the time for pledging now largely past, we are pleased to report that by year's end, *Foundations* had received 207 pledges totaling \$854,728.91, and that 128 of these pledges have been fulfilled. It is noteworthy that the campaign received 18 pledges from local business partners and friends of Central. We continue to explore foundation grants for additional funding for selected campaign-related projects.

With more than 63% of the total pledged amount in hand, a number of projects have already been undertaken, including replacement of the HVAC system at the church office with a new high-efficiency unit; installation of new energy-efficient cove lighting in the Sanctuary; the purchase of a Steinway piano for the Sanctuary choir loft; installation of a new amplification system in the C. E. Building basement; and the creation of a new landscape design for the Sanctuary by a professional landscape architect. Additional projects to be funded by the *Foundations* campaign are in the planning phase.

A Look Back at Previous Capital Campaigns. In speaking with Central members about our *Foundations* campaign, we have sometimes been asked about the outcomes of past capital campaigns. We thought that sharing a retrospective summary of our most recent capital campaigns would provide an informative context for *Foundations*.

Central has conducted three other capital campaigns since 2005: (1) *Steps to the Future* in 2005, (2) *To God All Praise and Glory* in 2007, and (3) *With Heart and Hands and Voices* in 2011.

Steps to the Future received 202 gifts totaling \$487,368, exceeding its goal of \$475,000. The campaign was undertaken in preparation for the 200<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the completion of the Sanctuary in 1806. Funds were raised for the creation of an architectural record of the Sanctuary which would be needed for rebuilding in the event of a disaster, and to return the Sanctuary's brownstone steps, its auxiliary steps, and the stone retaining wall bordering Church Street and Main Street to their original appearance and configuration. A Steps endowment was created from unexpended campaign funds for continuing maintenance of the brownstone steps.

To God All Praise and Glory received 242 gifts totaling \$535,578, exceeding its goal of \$350,000 by a generous margin. Funds were raised for the refurbishing and digital enhancement of the Sanctuary organ, for the purchase of a new Chapel organ, and for the creation of an endowment for the future maintenance and augmentation of Central's three organs. This endowment consists of both restricted and unrestricted gifts.

With Heart and Hands and Voices received 130 gifts totaling \$630,102, exceeding its goal of \$400,000 by a generous margin. Funds were raised for renovation of the parsonage, exterior and interior painting of the Sanctuary, interior painting of the Chapel, and for repairs to the Sanctuary windows. An important secondary goal was the addition of \$150,000 to Central's Preservation Fund. In the event, the campaign was able to add an additional \$250,000 to the Preservation Fund.

Will Central ever be in a position to dispense with capital campaigns? This is a fair question, but with an unknowable answer. For the more immediate future, periodic capital campaigns are likely to remain a necessary vehicle for funding major capital improvements and mission programs to guarantee the future of this wonderful legacy of which we are currently stewards.

Celebrating Success. During the 11 o'clock worship service on October 15, the congregation formally celebrated the successful conclusion of the Foundations campaign. Produced and directed by our own Jim Whildin, with digital hardware and special effects donated by Alex Newell and First Generation Visual Communication, Inc., the many Central members and groups who were instrumental in ensuring the campaign's success were given starring roles. If you were unable to attend but remember Jim's production of "Raising the Roof" a little more than a decade ago, you will have some inkling of what you missed. But fret not; Bob Brown created a video recording of the proceedings for posterity. In closing, it is with sincere gratitude that we thank our Trustees, Elders and staff for their active support throughout the campaign, and especially Hopeton Clennon, Lee Williamson and members of the Campaign Steering Committee for their prayerful participation in planning the campaign. We are

especially grateful for the unwavering support of so many members and friends of our congregation. Your generosity and commitment to securing Central's future has been awesome!

### **International Student Care Committee**

In June of 2015 Central Moravian Church agreed to partner with Moravian College to bring qualified international student(s) from the worldwide Moravian Church to Bethlehem to earn a Bachelor's Degree at the College. The students are designated as Barnette Scholars. The College will provide full tuition, room and board for two qualified students every other year. Central will cover the cost of transportation to Bethlehem and home at the end of their studies, books and other incidental expenses.

The International Student Care Committee was formed to provide local support for the Barnette Scholars. Such support includes administering the funds designated to their financial support; to serve as local "family" to the students; seeking home visits for them during holiday breaks; and other needs that arise to help them while they are students at Moravian.

Jackson Mlimuka from Tanzania and Joshua Pradhan from Nepal have completed three semesters at Moravian. Jackson is a Marketing major, and Joshua is studying Business Administration with a minor in music. During the summer of 2017 they both worked at the College and took two courses each. Joshua traveled home to Nepal for Winter break; Jackson stayed in Bethlehem and took a course. We are blessed to have such conscientious and outstanding young men as our first Barnette Scholars.

Nahum Pradhan from Nepal has already been accepted as a Barnette Scholar and will begin studies in August, 2018. Nahum is the son of the Revs. Vani and Shanti Pradhan. Vani served as a pastoral intern at Central when she was studying at Moravian Theological Seminary 2006-2009. We look forward to welcoming Nahum in August.

Lucy Ngara from Tanzania is in the process of

applying to Moravian for 2018. We pray that her application process will be successful.

### **Board of Trustees**

Last year my objectives, which I shared at our annual Church Council meeting, were to complete a successful fund drive, the sale of Christian Spring, a revision to help downsize the Church Council report (our Cindy never complains!) and to continue to make myself available for the challenges the Lord might assign to us! I also invited you to call me, email me or speak with me personally to answer any of your questions. I appreciate that you have done so and I believe our relationships are healthy as a result of this open dialogue.

Trustees have had another busy year with managing the temporal affairs of the Church. The board consists of fourteen members. It is a fine group of talented individuals with expertise in education, business and leadership. Some have specific backgrounds in finance, business management, marketing, and real estate. Each month the meeting agenda includes reports from the president, senior pastor, and the various standing committees which provide oversight of our church's operations. You will find a yearly summary of those reports in other sections of this Church Council record.

Monthly, elders read Trustees' Minutes and trustees read Elders' Minutes; this enables each board to be apprised of what each is discussing and accomplishing. Additionally, a trustee is assigned to attend a monthly meeting of elders and likewise, an elder is invited to attend a trustees monthly meeting.

George Mowers, our financial secretary, provides the board with complete financial reports each month. He must be thanked by all of us for his dedication, vast knowledge and financial expertise. Kelly Knapp has been assisting him part time for the past couple of years and we have found their collaboration to be seamless and efficient.

Much has been accomplished and our 2018 schedule is anticipated to also be quite busy. As a result of the success of the Foundation's fund raising campaign, specific funds are expected to be spent on the projects which were designated for implementation this year.

Recently, I was asked by a Central member to explain "how do the trustees work through tough board decisions?"

Trustee meetings include discussion and decision making where the majority are usually in agreement. From time to time I believe every board faces tough decisions which can be perplexing to each of us. And at those times we may not be in total agreement! If this is the case, we redefine the issue so everyone understands the background, the facts and the possible options. Perhaps we invite a committee member knowledgeable on the issue to the meeting to answer remaining questions. Everyone is encouraged to participate. Then we confront the tough points and ask if there is agreement on any of the ideas that have been recommended. I believe it is imperative that we find a solution, on which the majority of board members can agree, before we implement the decision. Thank you for your interest in how trustees reach consensus in handling the business side of our Church's affairs.

As indicated in my report last year, under the leadership of Terry Worrich, the house and property at Christian Spring was to be listed for sale. The property was sold in June with the proceeds reimbursing the Church for all costs expended on the property. The remaining funds were deposited in the Elizabeth Johnston Prime Fund which is administered by our Investment Committee.

Annually, at the February meeting of Trustees, new members are present for the first time since their confirmation at January's Church Council. The term of office for board members is three years with eligibility for election to an immediate second term.

Departing trustees now at the end of their terms are Don Brown, John Mast and Rob Phillips. Each of them has been an outstanding member of our team and I have been extremely privileged to have had the opportunity to work with them.

Don has been a very active vice president and my right hand. He has also chaired the Personnel and Investment Committees. His priority has always been to place our Church affairs first and we thank him for his leadership and support. He will continue as Investment Chairman.

John, as a long-time member of Central, is completing his second 6-year term on Trustees. This time he has chaired the 63 West Church Committee and has been active with Building and Grounds. He was on the Foundations Steering Committee and actively helped to make it a success. His generous spirit and ongoing leadership have been evident at Central for many years. John will continue to chair the 63 West Church Committee.

Rob, as our treasurer and Chair of Budget and Finance, has never been known to waiver in his responsibilities or in the explanation and duties of fiscal prudence. Each of you has received his quarterly updates filled with pertinent financial information and encouragement. Behind the scenes he has actively negotiated contracts with great skill and outstanding savings to the Church. Thank you Rob for your committed leadership and service.

During the Summer, Glenn Noack advised that he would step down from Trustees due to professional obligations. We welcomed Tom Tenges who agreed to complete Glenn's term.

I would be remiss if I did not take the opportunity to say thank you to Pastor Hopeton and Pastor Lynnette, Becky, Cindy, George, Kelly, Mike, John, Richard and Martha for their outstanding support and dedication to our congregation. They live our Moravian Motto of "In essentials unity, in non-essentials liberty and in all things LOVE".

Many thanks too to all of you our members, committee chairs and members, and Elders and Trustees for your hard work, cooperation and enthusiasm on behalf of our church.

In closing, at Central, we will continue to do God's work wherever he leads us to the very best of our ability. God bless all.

### **Audit Committee**

The Audit Committee retained the services of Campbell, Rappold & Yurasits, LLP to audit the general, special and investment accounts of the Church for the fiscal year which ended December 31, 2016. This firm has been the Church's auditor for a number of years, and this provides familiarity and continuity in reviewing our financial records and controls. As has been the case for years in the past, Campbell, Rappold & Yurasits issued a clean report with respect to fiscal year 2016. The clean report provides assurance that our records are accurate and maintained in a timely manner. The only qualifying note pertains to the auditor's observation that we do not have a separate committee to independently verify the financial records prepared by our Treasurer, such as would be expected for larger corporations and organizations whose financial affairs are much larger and more complicated than those of Central Moravian Church. However, this absence of a separate independent committee is typical of smaller charitable organizations which cannot justify the additional cost of this compliance. This circumstance facing smaller charitable organizations is recognized by auditors. Although they are required to make note of this circumstance in their audit findings, it is not a material efficiency. Otherwise, our financial protocols are appropriate, consistent and observed. A copy of the Audit is available in the Church Office for review.

A special notice of thanks to George Mowers is appropriate. George's diligence and commitment to serving our congregation is appreciated. The accurate and complete records which George maintains permit the auditors to have a clear and uncomplicated review of our financial records. This greatly assisted our auditors' timely issuance of an unqualified positive opinion in connection with the annual audit.

### **Investment Committee**

The Investment Committee meets on a quarterly schedule in January, April, July, and October to evaluate the performance of the Church's portfolio and make purchases, sales or any needed adjustments. Members of the committee include Ann Raines, Mark Parseghian, Hal Smith, David Weikert, Anne Zug, and Don Brown.

The committee is assisted by Wayne Achey, a Senor Vice President of Investments at Merrill Lynch, and a Central member. As a financial adviser, Mr. Achey prepares presentations for the quarterly committee meetings that give the members several suggestions and options that they can consider and evaluate to help maximize the stability and return of the portfolio.

Monthly investment reports of the portfolio from Merrill Lynch are provided to each member of the committee and also to the Financial Secretary. Investment results are shared with the Board of Trustees through the Financial Secretary's monthly Board report. The Board is also informed on the Committee's actions by reports on the quarterly meetings.

The Committee met with the new President of the Moravian Ministries Foundation, Chris Spaugh to get an update on the Moravian Common Fund and his renewed push for Donor Advised Funds. The following table indicates the opening and closing balances of our managed funds as well as increasing amounts that were withdrawn from the accounts to help cover church expenses in 2017. The E. Johnston Prime Fund reflects the balance after the final payment for the Christian Spring property in 2017. The Preservation Growth Fund is a new Mutual Fund that was set up in 2017 to grow over time.

### **Stewardship Committee**

2017 Results: Each year, the Stewardship Committee spends much of their effort on an annual fund appeal to inform members on the use of their annual financial support to the church operating budget. The 2017 Budget was adopted by the Church Council in January 2017. It called for financial contributions from members and friends of \$535,000, which represented an increase of \$8,303 (1.58%) from the 2016 budget. The total amount given from members and friends as of December 31, 2017, was \$498,913.

Financial contributions from members and friends consist of payments on pledges, dollars given from members who do not pledge (outright gifts), offering plate contributions from visitors who attend services, and contributions to the operating budget given by some of the church groups who raise money through their group activities. In 2017, contributions from members and friends represented 59% of the total dollars needed to support the church operations.

### 2018 Church Budget – Contributions from Members and Friends of Central

The 2018 Church Council will be asked to approve the 2018 operating budget. The amount budgeted to come from contributions from members and friends is \$530,000. This is a decrease of \$5,000 from last year. As of December 31, 2017, \$332,411 has been pledged from 182 household giving units. We need to receive an additional non-pledged support of \$197,589 from members and friends to meet our budgeted contributions from the members and friends line item. Our current pledged support, represents 63% of the contributions needed from members to meet the 2018 operating budget. In past years, members have pledged 58% or more, by the end of December.

### **Budget and Finance**

Reviewing the past several years, a disturbing trend of deficits had continued regarding the Operating Budget of Central Moravian Church. However, excitingly, that trend was reversed as **Fiscal Year 2017** ended with a surplus of \$2,240.

Total Income was under budget by \$9,110 or 1.1%.

Throughout the year, **Envelope Giving** was consistently below budget requirements and ended the year \$36,087 or 6.7% under budget. This had serious implications for the Budget and Finance Committee in establishing the 2018 Budget.

Other Contributions (other gifts, special envelopes, and cash plate offering) were over budget by \$9,878 or 10.2%, but not enough to offset the shortfall in envelopes.

**Institutional Receipts** (Moravian College, Moravian Academy, ArtsQuest, Bach Choir, 63 W. Church Street rental, and wedding income) were over budget by \$8,150 or 8.3%.

Endowment Income was also over budget by \$8,949 or 7.6%, thus helping with the envelope shortfall.

Total Expenses, on a positive note, were under budget by \$11,350 or 1.3%.

Expenses for Salary and Benefits were slightly over budget by \$3,328 or 0.8%.

**Facilities-Operations** were under budget by \$14,108 or 12.9% due to utility cost savings for gas and electric in all buildings in 2017.

**Facilities-Maintenance** expenses were under budget by \$3,452 or 4.6% due to major projects being funded through the 275<sup>th</sup> Capital Campaign.

Expenses for **Total Programs** were slightly under budget by \$256 or 0.3%.

Church Office Administration expenses came in over budget this year by \$3,140 or 9.4% due to increased publication costs and additional mailings of *The Belfry*.

In 2017, Central paid 100% of the amount requested for the **Province & District Administration and Benevolent Ministries**, a decrease from the previous year of \$1,162 or .01%.

**Total Income less Capital Projects Income** increased over last year by \$32,471 finishing at \$838,555. **Total Expenses less Capital Projects Expenses** increased over last year by \$12,267 finishing at \$836,315. As a result, Fiscal Year 2017 ended with a surplus of \$2,240 which will carry over to FY2018.

Capital Projects, although not part of the Operating Budget, totaled \$50,239 for capital improvements to buildings on the Church Street Campus. These projects were funded by income from the Preservation Fund. Moravian Academy reimbursements totaled \$4,606 for their share of the CE Building projects.

### 2018 Budget Overview

The 2018 budget is substantially similar to the 2017 budget with some enhanced program areas. This is very good news: we both continue and expand the many ministries of Central Moravian Church on our campus, in our community, and in the world. As in prior years, we reviewed each line item and budget request to ensure that we were being prudent with our resources for this new budget year.

### Income:

Envelope Giving and Other Contributions are budgeted for a net increase of 4.9% over actual 2017 figures. This is a stretch goal – but in line with past performance.

Institutional Receipts are mostly flat since we had requested increases from those who use our facilities last year. The Budget and Finance Committee annually reviews these charges through the lens of fairly covering our expenses from sister organizations rather than fair market value.

Endowment Income expectations have been increased because of positive market trends in 2017 that are expected to continue in 2018 as well as the benefit of wise investment decisions made in 2017. Following sound principles and past practice, only income is planned to be used from the Endowment Fund. Central Church investment assets grew substantially in 2017 due to the 275<sup>Th</sup> Capital Campaign contributions to the Preservation Fund, increases in the Elizabeth Johnson Prime Fund, and generous gifts from the congregation.

### **Expenses:**

Salary and Benefits includes a salary increase for all full-time and part-time office staff.

Facilities Operations were reduced in anticipation of savings realized from energy efficiency in several campus buildings.

Facilities Maintenance has increased as the Buildings and Grounds Committee continues their program of prudent and proactive maintenance and improvement to our campus.

The budgets for Ministry & Worship, Music, and Christian Education were increased for 2018 to provide for enhanced experiences for adults and youth alike.

Church Office Administration remains substantially the same as 2017. By changing telecom service providers in 2017, we have significantly better internet access in the office and newly added internet access in the Old Chapel basement with no increase in costs.

Province and District Common Ministries funding is \$100,686. Central continues to joyfully meet 100% of our requested support for administration and benevolent ministries.

Dear sisters and brothers in Christ,

Grace and peace to you in the name of our loving God! This summer I watched a pair of draft horses pulling a plow. As the steel blade of the plow cut through the earth, I marveled at how the yoke combined the strength of the two horses to create power that one horse alone could not have achieved. It was the pulling together – the shared yoke – the common purpose – that humbled me most. Imagine with me, if you will, an enormous yoke that connects all of the congregations of the Northern Province – pulling together – with a shared yoke – and a common purpose. We could do together what would be impossible alone. That is the image of our Common Ministries Commitment. Each congregation gives – as we have been blessed – toward a common purpose. We share the burden – and the joy – of pulling together toward God's vision for our common witness.

When I look at the impact that our province has on the world – far beyond what our membership warrants – I thank God for your generosity and faithfulness. Whether we are helping with hurricane relief through the Board of World Mission or educating future pastors at the seminary, we are blessing the world. When we meet with congregations in the call process or move pastors from one congregation to another, when we meet with ecumenical partners, or when we manage finances or prepare for synods, those costs are part of that shared yoke. We need everyone, pulling together, to fulfill our commitments. Thank you in advance for your full participation.

We fund our common ministries through every congregation giving a percentage of its Line 1 income. The 2018 provincial budget was built on your Line 1 income from 2016. The percentage of your Line 1 income remains the same as last year. The amount you are asked to offer changes based on the fluctuation of Line 1 income. As with good stewardship practices, you give to the province as you have received. Like personal budgets, the province lives within the expected receipts from congregational giving, which means we must make choices based on prayerful priorities. When one congregation does not meet its full share, we all suffer. When all congregations offer 100% of their requested support, we all rejoice together. We need all of you giving fully to our common ministry to support the many ministries God is calling us to offer the world.

The provincial elders have approved a budget for 2018 in the amount of \$2.07 million, which is based on anticipated common ministry receipts of \$1,490,786. Both our budget and our anticipated common ministry receipts are down more than \$160,000 from last year. We are funding an increasing amount of the budget through invested funds. While we have made a conscious decision to do this, we want you to be aware that the percentage of our

budget that is funded by the congregations continues to go down while the percentage of investment support continues to rise. We continued funding our Core Agencies at the same level, except the Provincial Women's Board, which indicated that they did not need as much support as in prior years.

Again this year we are sending out this entire mailing via e-mail. You are receiving this letter because you are a Pastor, Vice-Chair of Elders, President of Trustees, or Treasurer. It is imperative that you access the specifics of your congregation's share of the provincial budget on the Moravian Church Northern Province Portal. You have access through a specific password; if you experience difficulty with the portal, contact Tammy Curcio in our Finance Office at portal@mcnp.org.

As you prayerfully determine your local budgets and include your share of our provincial budgets, I invite you to 'yoke yourselves' to the other congregations of the province to pull together toward God's vision for our common witness. Thank you for your faithfulness and support.

2018 FUNDING OF OUR EASTERN DISTRICT COMMON MINISTRIES

Greetings Friends and Partners in Ministry:

I write on behalf of the Eastern District Executive Board (EDEB) to thank you for this last year of ministry partnership and invite your full participation in the Eastern District Common Ministries for 2018. The ministry partnership that we share with you is one which supports congregational redevelopment, ministry agencies, as well as district staff who offer congregation consultation toward ministry enhancement.

The budget for this upcoming year is a result of direct action of the 2016 Eastern District Synod. Similar to the current Provincial budgeting process, the 2016 synod instructed the EDEB to initiate an income based budget formulation that will be based upon "Line 1 income" (plate offerings) of the congregations. Moving away from the membership "per capita" assessment model, now the Eastern District Common Ministry contributions of our congregations will no longer be based upon "head counts," but rather upon the tithes and offerings of congregants.

The proposed income-based formulation which establishes the 2018 Eastern District budget comes as a result of rigorous work from the Eastern District Controller, Brenda Cahill and an appointed Financial Task Force chaired by Rev. Jeffrey Van Orden and consisting of Rex Knowlton, Steve Krawiec, Ralph Wanamaker, Andy Meckstroth, and David Bennett. The desired outcome was to establish an income-based assessment formulation which would "ebb and flow" with a congregation's plate offerings, sustain the ministry of the district, and also not create a severe, unexpected increase in a congregation's district assessment at the initiation of the new formula. Through the use of a 'standard deviation' formulation, it is the opinion of the Financial Task Force and the EDEB that this formula achieves those outcomes.

In preparing for the 2018 income-based budget, each congregation's 2017 assessment figure was made into a percentage of line 1 income from the 2015 annual report provided by the congregation. (2017 district assessment amount / 2015 Line 1 income = congregation's assessment %) That assessment percentage was capped at 7% for congregations whose assessment percentage was above 7%.

As an example, if Halo Moravian Church's Eastern District Common Ministry assessment was \$10,000 in 2017 and its 2015 annual report reported \$300,000 in Line 1 income, then their assessment percentage would be 3.3%. (10,000 / 300,000 = .033)

If that same congregation's 2015 Line 1 income instead had been \$100,000, then their assessment percentage would have been over the cap of 7%, and therefore the congregation's actual assessment percentage would be lowered to 7%.

(10,000 / 100,000 = .10, therefore lowered to 7% cap)

The assessment percentage for each congregation is then applied to the line 1 income from the 2016 annual report to generate the district assessment for 2018. (Congregational assessment % x 2016 Line 1 income = 2018 district assessment)

For the first example, which generated an assessment percentage of 3.3%, if Halo Moravian Church's Line 1 income for 2016 was \$305,000, then their 2018 Eastern District Common Ministry assessment would be \$10,065.00

In the second example, resulting in an assessment percentage capped at 7%, if Halo Moravian Church's Line 1 income for 2016 was \$110,000, then their Eastern District Common Ministry assessment would be \$7,700.00.

In subsequent years, the congregation's assessment percentage will remain the same and will be applied to their Line 1 income from two years preceding the budget year. (i.e. The 2019 Eastern District Budget will be based upon the 2017 Line 1 income of congregations.)

It is worth noting that the Eastern District Common Ministry Assessment was either frozen or lowered during the time period between 2015 and 2017 and the Eastern District budget remained relatively stable.

Although this income-based formulation keeps most congregations at or near their current level of giving toward the Eastern District Common Ministry, it will in fact create a minor decrease in the Eastern District budget for 2018. However, the Eastern District Synod also instructed the EDEB to utilize a spending rate on reserves to balance the budget if necessary. Given this decrease in budget, it will be vitally important that all of our congregations fully support the district common ministry as our success relies heavily upon the faithfulness of all of our congregations.

As we live into this budgeting process, it is the desire of the EDEB to maintain the basic structure of the district budget approved by the 2016 Eastern District Synod. The EDEB plans to submit a report to the 2020 Eastern District Synod regarding the effectiveness of this new assessment formulation and its implication upon Eastern District Common Ministries.

Attached to this memorandum is your congregation's 2018 Eastern District Common Ministry assessment, as formulated through your congregation's assessment percentage. How your congregation's assessment was tabulated is also clearly demonstrated for your review.

We continue to encourage congregations to look seriously at employing the benefits of the new Past Due Balance Policy which offers 20% forgiveness of the Provincial and District Common Ministry Past Due Balances for each year that a congregation meets all District/Provincial assessments and pastoral benefits submissions in full. This policy supports our collaboration in district and provincial ministry, while providing much needed relief from past due balances. (Please see enclosed document.)

Finally, on behalf of the Eastern District Executive Board let me express our gratitude for each congregation as a ministry partner. Our common ministry reflects an important, shared value that Christ calls us to do together that which we cannot do alone. We are appreciative of our district and provincial staff members, the Provincial Elders Conference, and interprovincial agencies whose dedication and leadership skill makes congregational revitalization and mission collaboration this day's reality. "To Us, To Us This Task is Given!"

## <u>OUR EASTERN DISTRICT COMMON MINISTRY</u>

One of the noblest characters of the Moravian Church is found not only in how we as individual congregations touch lives within our own communities, but also how we collaborate denominationally to make a regional, national, and even global impact. Our common ministry reflects an important, shared value that Christ calls us to do together that which we cannot do alone. It is in this way that our common ministry contributions express not only our ministry partnership with one another, but more importantly the kinship we proclaim in Christ Jesus.

#### **ADMINISTRATION**

DISTRICT ADMINISTRATION

These monies are allocated for such items as district synods; the cost of travel and expenses of meetings of the District Board; making grants to congregations; paying liability insurance; the cost of having our district represented on various boards, committees, and agencies; subsidy in support of Moravian Open Door administration and legal and intervention expenses; as well as salaries, benefits, and program costs for the Eastern District Director of Christian Education and the Eastern District Director of Youth and Young Adult Ministries.

CHURCH REDEVELOPMENT

Utilizing the services of district professional staff and the consultation of the district commissions, these monies fund ministry assessment, appreciative inquiry sessions, and ministry plan development of churches in need of congregational revitalization and redevelopment. The A.I.D. Program and other district initiatives directed toward congregational health and revitalization were reaffirmed as a priority by the 2012 Eastern District Synod.

## SERVICE & BENEVOLENCE MINISTRIES

DISTRICT PROGRAM

Provides support for miscellaneous programming efforts, including Pastoral development events, summer urban internships, support for state councils of churches and ecumenical agencies, as well as continuing education at Moravian Theological Seminary.

DISTRICT HOMES FOR THE AGED

This contribution assists Moravian Manor and Morningstar Senior Living in providing care for needy residents where costs are not fully covered by personal and social security resources.

HOPE CONFERENCE AND RENEWAL CENTER (all congregations except Ohio)

These monies subsidize the cost of the administration and management of the Hope Conference and Renewal Center.

STATE COUNCILS OF CHURCHES

This item includes contributions to State Councils of Churches in New Jersey, New York, Maryland, Ohio, Washington DC, and Pennsylvania. These monies provide an ecumenical service and witness which otherwise would not be available to us as individual congregations. Services provided include consultation on migrant ministries and information on public policy issues.

INNER CITY YOUTH

This significant ministry for congregations in urban areas was started by the "Moravian Women" who annually contribute between \$3,000 and \$5,000 for this ministry. As the years have passed, requests have increased to approximately two and one half times the monies available. The District Synod of 2004 established support for this important ministry through an assessment. This initiative funds new youth ministry initiatives for congregations in urban areas where youth programming is lacking or non-existent.

MORAVIAN OPEN DOOR

Moravian Open Door is a not-for-profit (501(c) 3) organization committed to providing transitional housing and supportive services to the homeless, distressed and underserved population of New York City. Our ministry serves those individuals who are fifty and older with the goal of helping them regain their independence and security, and assisting them in moving to appropriate, permanent facilities.

#### District Ministry Teams

Spiritual Formation Ministry Team: (Formerly Christian Education Commission and Lay Ministry Commission)

The purpose of the Spiritual Formation Ministry Team is to aid pastors and congregations in elevating the call of ministry to laity through workshops and training events (locally, area-wide and District-wide); to assist in developing leadership skills among all members for continued spiritual growth and to include spiritual leadership development; to assist in a discernment process for laity to identify their call to life-long, vocational ministry, mission and service; and to uphold the importance of shared ministry among lay and clergy alike.

Stewardship of Life Ministry Team: (Formerly Stewardship Commission and Evangelism Commission)
Moravians have always stressed the stewardship of all of life – management and sharing of our spirituality,
time, talents and treasurers as well as the care of creation. For the next inter-synodal period the primary focus
of the Stewardship of Life Ministry Team is to enable congregations to discover what assets are available
within their congregation (using Snow's Asset Mapping as one tool) for ministries so that the congregation
feels empowered to view their community and world as their mission field.; to assist congregations in helping
members discover their spiritual gifts for ministry and matching them to the ministry needs of the congregation
and community; and to encourage congregations to develop a strategy where the time commitment of members
to a specific ministry is adjusted to the time and place of the congregation, demonstrating sensitivity to the lifestyles of members.

Church in Society Ministry Team: (Formerly Church and Society Commission and Community Ministries Commission)

Moravians have always understood the need for the Church to be the voice for the voiceless. For the next inter-synodal period the primary focus of the Church in Society Ministry Team is to assist congregations in identifying a mission ministry to "the least of these" (experiencing hunger, poverty, discrimination) in the community in which the congregation is planted and assist them in developing programs to help meet the needs of their community, as well as pursue partnership with other congregations and agencies in seeking to meet these needs. The Church in Society Ministry Team will also serve as a resource to congregations throughout the District, working directly with congregations in their mission ministry efforts.

MINISTRY LEADERSHIP TEAM:

The purpose of the Ministry Leadership Team is to share activities, programs and needs of each Ministry Team; to provide feedback to each Ministry Team; to collaborate in meeting the needs and programs of the District; and to support and encourage one another and congregations in ministry. The Ministry Leadership Team consists of one Chairperson from each of the above Ministry Teams, as well as one EDEB representative, the Eastern District Director of Christian Education, and the Eastern District Director of Youth and Young Adult Ministries.

OHIO MORAVIAN MINISTRIES COMMISSION (Ohio only)

This item is for youth ministry, camp support, mission society support, matching grant programs for Ohio Congregations. These monies are collected by the Eastern District Executive Board and returned to the Ohio Moravian Ministries Commission.

## **Buildings and Grounds Committee**

The Buildings and Grounds Committee meets once monthly and helps to guide the maintenance and capital project efforts for the Moravian buildings assigned to the care of the church. The committee works in conjunction with the church staff and the Facilities Administrator.

In this past year, there were some major energy and cost saving projects initiated and completed. These projects were targeted in the recent capital campaign. Some of the major projects were:

- 1. The replacement of the Sanctuary lighting and control panel with a much more energy efficient LED system. The LED project will be included in the Green Revolving Fund, a program focused on energy reduction based projects.
- 2. The replacement of one of the heating units in the Sanctuary basement.
- 3. The gutter system and roof repair of the Sanctuary.

Work has also begun on upgrading the HVAC systems and insulation in the church office, which should be completed by January 2018. Working with the History Committee, the planning for the storage area in the Sanctuary basement has been started, including a climate controlled area, for storage of church artifacts.

The committee has started, and will continue in the upcoming months, to review the Stone House Report and create an outline of projects focused on the preservation of the historic buildings. Work will also continue to move forward the other projects assigned to the committee in the capital campaign, such as upgrading and improving the sound systems in the Sanctuary as well as the Old Chapel. The Old Chapel upgrade will include a system for those with special hearing needs.

The committee takes seriously the important task of the preservation and maintenance of the historic buildings and grounds, but with the understanding that there would be no church without the support of the extraordinary members of this congregation. We look forward to doing our part to help the church reach out to the members and the community around us. Many thanks to members of the committee and to the church staff for their time and effort.

#### **Personnel Committee**

The Personnel Committee meets on an as needed basis to consider issues related to the needs and smooth functioning of our full time and part time employees.

Kelly Knapp, who was hired in 2016 to learn the Financial Secretary's duties, has been working as a part time Financial Intern for the full year and has learned the majority of the duties. Her training will probably be completed this year so that she could fill in for an emergency absence.

Our 275<sup>th</sup> Campaign Coordinator, Martha Jones, filled a very important function during the campaign by keeping accurate records of pledges and receipts, and by sending out requests and responses. As the early work of the Campaign has slowed, her duties are being shifted to give more help to our increasing office workload, while still maintaining campaign records. She has helped with the 2018 pledge drive and is helping the Stewardship Committee by keeping statistics that will be useful in the current and future drives.

There was an extended medical absence last spring of the Facilities Administrator due to hip replacement. We are grateful to the Sexton, John Geier, who made an extra effort, with help from a part time hire, to keep the facilities operating.

There was a large cost increase for staff health insurance received in the fall. The Committee met with a broker who found an equivalent policy for a slight decrease in price from the former policy. The change was made to be effective the first of December.

A 2018 item will be to review the facilities management program and make updates or modifications as needed.

#### **BAM Almoners Fund**

The Almoners Fund is managed by Board members elected by each of the six churches of the Bethlehem Area Moravians (BAM). The Board works quietly and confidentially to carry out the purpose of the Fund and responds to requests made by the pastors of the local congregations to assist members who are in temporary financial need.

The board meets 4-times a year. Many of the requests presented to the board were handled by telephone or email.

The program to provide \$1,500 for each BAM congregation to assist the pastors with request for immediate financial assistance was continued. These discretionary funds are administered by the pastors and are not to be used for the congregation's general or benevolence budgets. This program does not replace the current Almoners program, but supplements it. Requests for larger grants or short-term assistance are handled through the normal process.

During 2017, the Almoners expended a total \$51,420.34 to assist 18 individuals in financial need. Some were one-time grants, while others were for a set period of time. Of those assisted, 11 were from our congregation.

Financial gifts, no matter how large or small, are always welcome.

### Bethlehem Area Moravians, Inc.

By now, many of you know that I have announced my retirement effective March 30, 2018. This year started my 24<sup>th</sup> year with BAM. It's been a great ride and I am grateful to have been a part of the growth of this amazing organization. This will be my last annual report to you. I will let others explain the achievements of 2017 in their individual reports, which follow. (Copies of the other reports mentioned by David Roth are available from the Central Moravian Church office upon request).

I want to express my personal thanks to Dan Soos, Jack Lightcap, Brenda Dorward, Roy Boehm and all of the BAM staff; as well as Brad Senick, Peg DeAngelo and Mike Mushko and the Moravian Development Corporation (MDC) staff; and Tracy Patton, John Calzola and Marvin Granda and the Moravian Village of Bethlehem (MVB) staff. We are blessed to have employees who have loyalty to the organization and who deeply care about its mission. Our senior management team of Dan, Brad, Tracy, John and Marvin are truly first class. I have been privileged to work beside them thru our successes and as we faced challenges. They will continue to guide BAM and its related entities with strong conviction and level headed determination. Please give them your support and gratitude, as I have done over the years.

BAM continues to operate the Moravian Historic area and its buildings and grounds. We recognize the responsibility we have to the greater Bethlehem community. Our properties, two cemeteries, and other real estate assets are well maintained to reflect our Moravian heritage.

When I arrived at BAM, income was generated from a small endowment fund and rental income from the historic properties. It was a small operation. Moravian Development Corporation was a related organization, which provided no revenue to BAM and operated on a "breakeven basis". Today BAM generates income from MDC, which has grown from the original Moravian House I, and II. MDC today has 7 Moravian Houses and numerous smaller properties rented to our core responsibility; low-income individuals and folks with disabilities. The growth over the years is phenomenal. Brad Senick ably manages MDC. We also generate income from Moravian Village of Bethlehem. It is a premiere Continuing Care

Retirement Community with a major economic impact on the Bethlehem community. During my tenure we built MVB from the ground up. Tracy Patton ably manages MVB.

One of the projects that we built but unfortunately no longer own is the HILL on the south campus of Moravian College. BAM built the project, which was approved by the prior college administration and board. It's a wonderful environment for the students lucky enough to live there. It anchors the south campus.

The above referenced assets; properties and projects represent major contributions to the City and its residents. They generate significant tax revenue and employment. Without a doubt, BAM is an important entity in Bethlehem.

Dan Soos will be replacing me as CEO of the organization. I have been working with Dan for many years. My first interaction with him was when he was engaged as our external auditor. After a few years getting to know him, I was lucky enough to entice him to come and work with me at BAM. He has functioned for the past 10 years as our Chief Financial Officer. I have appreciated Dan's insight to all things financial.

He has alerted senior management to any number of nuances and areas in need of concentration. Dan is well equipped to take the organization forward and I have full confidence in his leadership.

Brad Senick, current Vice President of Moravian Development Corporation, will assume the additional role of BAM Chief Operating Officer as of January 1, 2018. I have enjoyed working with Brad for the past 9 years. I have watched him mature into a seasoned and exceptional senior manager. Brad has wonderful organizational skills and the ability to look at situations very analytically. He will be a great asset to the organization moving forward.

As part of our transition from the "Dave Roth" era into the future, I relinquished my title as Moravian Village Executive Director back on March 30,2017. At that moment Tracy Patton took over the leadership of MVB. Tracy has been part of MVB senior management since its birth. She knows and understands the organization, industry and BAM. Tracy is trusted by the staff and will perform

admirably moving into the future.

I've been blessed over the years with very supportive Boards, Executive Committees and Board Presidents. They have provided guidance and opinion. But they have always allowed me plenty of latitude with decision-making. In my opinion, I can't express enough how important that has been to the growth of the organization. Thanks for all the opportunities and memories. I am very grateful for everything.

The future of BAM, MVB and MDC is very bright.

Busy Workers' philosophy for donations will continue and making every effort that our dollars are well spent. We continue to work with organizations from Bethlehem, Tanzania, and Nepal.

Busy Workers have donated \$552.00 for sanctuary flowers in memory of departed Busy Workers and friends. We assisted with raising funds for Easter flowers for God's Acre. We prepared envelopes and inserted them into Sunday bulletins during Lent. The congregation was able to dedicate their contribution for hyacinths in honor or memory of a loved one. Busy Workers presented Katie with our Anna Nitschmann doll. She was very touched by this gift. Katie Faull will be speaking at the Moravian Archives in 2018.

Larry Jones has submitted the necessary papers to patent our Anna Nitschmann doll. We are currently awaiting approval.

This year we can say that the Moravian Archives has received many boxes from Busy Workers of old records, dating back to 1884. As we find more materials, they are catalogued by Mary Jo Hill and stored at the Moravian Archives to preserve our history. If you have any information pertaining to Busy Workers, please contact us.

## **Food Pantry**

Central Moravian Church and its members have ministered to those living in our community living at or slightly over the poverty line as defined by the government. Because of the generosity of the congregation and in partnership with the Second Harvest Food Bank we have been able to provide several bags of food to the needy of our community each month. We receive a little over a ton and a half of food in cans, bags and boxes from the Second Harvest Food Bank. Additionally, we are able to supplement the food that we receive from Second Harvest with the generous contributions from the members and friends who attend worship services on the first Sunday of each month and who bring cans, boxes and bags of food. This food is offered to anyone who is hungry. During many months, food is distributed to those who come to the church office and express a need. Many members of the congregation also make financial contributions to this ministry, which are used to purchase food to fill in the gaps. We seek to provide the opportunity for each of our clients to have a balanced diet, should they choose to do so. Most are keenly aware of the need for protein,

vegetables, and fruit. Up to this point, we have been able to provide these in canned form. But soon we will have a refrigerator which will provide the opportunity to offer fresh fruits and vegetables as they are available. Second Harvest has developed a relationship with the port of Philadelphia to distribute their produce which remains after their orders are filled. This new resource will also provide us with the opportunity to share produce from our own gardens in season.

This ministry, coupled with Cynthia's Boutique, seeks to meet the food and clothing needs of many in our community. The ministry of the Boutique is just as important as the opportunity to receive food in the minds of most of our clients. This year, an uptick in clients was experienced following Hurricane Maria which devastated Puerto Rico. These clients continue to arrive and live with families, the members of Central Moravian serve.

Matthew 25 records a story told by Jesus about finding various needs within the community and doing something about it. Central Moravian has a long history of finding problems and doing something about them.

This year the members and friends of Central Moravian Church worked an average of 47.8 hours each month with a team of 28 volunteers. Together we impacted an average of 94 families each month. This includes 53 adults, 43 children and 81 clients over the age of 65. As followers of Jesus, we are aware of his vision to help the needy of the world. Cynthia's Boutique and Central Moravian Food Pantry are but a couple of ways in which we seek to fulfill this call. Thank you to all who pray for, bring food on the first Sunday of each month and those who volunteer to unload trucks, drive vehicles loaded with food and vehicles loaded with recycled cardboard to the recycling center, sweep the floor and offer friendly service to our clients on a monthly basis.

Special for the last few years, has been a group of volunteers from Moravian College who volunteer for us each year. This year, they came in September and moved all of the shelving, washed and cleaned the shelves, and reorganized the shelves again. We also received 150 plus pounds of food from Cub Pack 1742, which was added to our inventory of food. We are deeply grateful to Pastor Lynnette Delbridge, Jim Jordan, Joan Carson, Bob Adams, Jacqueline
