## Summer Food

This past week, I had the pleasure of eating breakfast with a friend and we found ourselves talking about a spiritual discipline that's helpful to both of us. Each day, we both try to list ten things for which we are truly thankful. We realized that food is often on our gratitude lists. We began talking about the pleasures of summertime eating: the smell of basil when we cut it in the garden, the explosion of flavor when we bite into a fresh cherry tomato, and the sweet taste of fresh, locally grown blueberries. Maybe you are grateful for summer food too.

I know I enjoy the summer because I have a closer relationship with the food I eat and more time to enjoy it. While the community garden plot that Andy and I care for is too small to provide for all our produce needs, it is big enough that this year we are growing tomatoes, cucumbers, potatoes, beans, corn, zucchini, carrots, and herbs. (The rabbits took out my kale plants. I guess they need to eat too.) I appreciate our garden because it reminds me of the goodness of creation. Being able to plant seeds, watch them grow into plants, and then pick and eat from them is a powerful reminder that God intends for us to participate in and to work with creation. God intends for us to have what we need to eat and to eat joyfully.

But there are other reasons I appreciate summer food. Food connects me to people. Being able to take big bunches of parsley and mint home from the garden and make them into tabbouleh, or to make our basil into pesto which we then eat together with our daughters around the table, reminds me just how much food also connects me to the people I love. Much of the quality time our family gets to spend together is tied to fixing, eating, or cleaning up food. I do not take our conversations around the dinner table for granted but try my best to savor them with joy, just as I try to savor the food that has brought us together around the table.

A Moravian blessing many of us use at meal times puts what I am trying to say into simple words:

Come, Lord Jesus, our guest to be  
and bless these gifts bestowed by thee.  
Bless our loved ones everywhere  
and keep them in thy loving care."

(You might know a slightly different version, but this is the one I learned as a student at Salem College where saying the Moravian blessing together before family style supper meals in the Refectory was a long-standing tradition.) I like saying this simple prayer before meals. It reminds me that food truly is a gift bestowed by God and that when we pay attention

to our food, when we eat it mindfully with gratitude, we are more aware of God's presence at our tables. We are more aware of the people around the table with us – those who are physically present, those far away but near and dear to our hearts, and those in our memory. I also count among those loved ones not just my own personal circle of friends and relatives but God's whole human family.

I hope that this summer we will have many opportunities to appreciate and give God thanks for summer food. Enjoy the beautiful colors of bright red tomatoes, deep purple eggplants, and vibrant green parsley. Breathe deeply and smell basil and mint. Feel the soft fuzzy texture of fresh peaches. Listen for the crunch of a crisp carrot. Let the tastes of sweet corn, cantaloupe, and watermelon roll over your tongue. I hope that the simple, yet profound miracle of fresh summer food will remind us just how blessed we are to live together on this good earth. God has created the earth for us to care for, to participate in, to enjoy. As the psalmist invites us in Psalm 34:8, "Taste and see that the Lord is good."

### The Monocacy Farm Project

The Monocacy Farm Project is happy to announce the launch of its Pick-Your-Own Program to provide interested families the option of harvesting their own organically-grown fruits and vegetables from early summer through October each year.

Membership is open to all. A \$10 annual membership fee per family includes \$5 toward your first harvest. All membership fees and donations received from the Pick-Your-Own Program will be used to defray the costs of producing fruits and vegetables which the farm donates weekly to area food pantries, soup kitchens, and homeless shelters through its Grow Healthy Community Initiative.

Designated growing fields will be open to “Pick-Your-Own” members Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday from 9 a.m. - noon, and Thursday from 4:30 - 6:30 p.m. during the harvest season.

Moravians have always been about mission and service. This year, both the Northern and Southern Provinces of the North American Moravian Church are trying out a new/old idea. Congregations have been encouraged to plan a “Day of Service” in which every member has an opportunity to participate in a mission or service activity that has the possibility to care for people beyond the walls of the church. The idea is to think creatively and offer service opportunities that will work for people of different ages with different interests, schedules, and physical abilities. While most congregations will be taking on this challenge on Sept. 15th, our planning committee felt that we would be better prepared and that we would be able to offer a wider range of activities if we waited for October and planned for a whole month. We will, therefore, by celebrating together a “Month of Service” this coming October.

This month is not meant to replace the great local mission work already going on in our congregation but it does offer us a chance to rethink how our congregation interacts with our community. After all, local mission is an enduring part of our Moravian faith.

We are hoping that you will help us with the planning phase of this project. If you are a leader or a participate in one of our existing ministries at Central, please take some time to think about a way you could include more people in an activity during the month. Maybe you’d like to try something new and different. The idea is to serve with one another in ways that will bring us closer together and to God, that will make a difference in our communities, and that will demonstrate our ability to be the hands and feet of Christ in the world.

We are also hoping that if you volunteer with an organization outside our church like Cops and Kids, Meals on Wheels, or the Lehigh County Humane Society, that you will let us know about your involvement. Please let us know if you have ideas for ways volunteers from Central could come and help that organization at a time during the month of October.

## Hospital Visits

Being able to offer you the care and support of the congregation when you are hospitalized is one of the ministries that your pastoral staff highly values. When you are in the hospital, we appreciate the chance to visit, to make sure you have support, to connect you with other members of our congregation and, if you wish, to pray with you.

During the admissions process at both St. Luke's University Hospital and Lehigh Valley Hospital, you should routinely be asked if you have a religious affiliation. Please identify yourself as a member of Central Moravian Church. When your membership at Central is part of your record at either hospital network, then when we call the hospitals, they are able to tell us that you are a patient and where you are. The LV Hospital service typically tells us when our members are patients at the Muhlenburg 17<sup>th</sup> Street campus, or the Cedar Crest campus. The St. Luke's service checks for all 10 hospitals in their network.

Even though we encourage you to make the most of these services offered by our fine area hospitals, we still encourage you to call us or the church office. It's also a good idea to have a friend or family member designated to call us whenever you go into the hospital. We are not always able to get through to the LV Hospital Pastoral Care office and if you are in any other hospital besides those listed above, you will need to let us know directly that you have been admitted. Presented by the Interprovincial Women's Board, this event drew over 400 Moravian Sisters from across the world. It was remarkable to witness the camaraderie among conference participants as well as the development of new or renewed friendships. The 3 day affair began with daily worship followed by Imagine Sessions/Workshops during the morning and afternoon. Keynote speakers offered reflections upon the contributions of women from biblical times to modern day. An interwoven emphasis upon empowering strategies for achieving everyone's full potential by adequately understanding God's perspective and intentional purpose for our individual lives emerged throughout the conference. Attendees enjoyed visiting various Share & Sell Market vendors whose tables included unique and varied Moravian merchandise for purchase. Friday evening was marked by a Gala Event described as an 'Evening of Excellence' that showcased Moravian cultural as well as international diversity. Saturday Evening found most attendees at nearby Home Church enjoying a wonderful love feast and candlelight service. Sincere thanks are extended to the Interprovincial Planning Committee for the development of this extraordinary program. The Sisters of the Unity will convene again 4 years from now in the Northern Province at a location still to be determined. **Preservation Fund (August 4):** Gifts designated to the Preservation Fund are used for capital project expenses. These include major repairs and restorations to our buildings and outdoor structures. Recent examples include upgrading the fire monitoring system in the Sanctuary, installing a new fire monitoring system in the Christian Education building, and insulating the attic floor for energy saving in the Church Office. Expenses for an anticipated campus-wide energy audit will be paid from this Fund. We use the interest income from this Fund which is Board designated for capital projects only. Our long-term goal is to increase this fund, thereby increasing the income generated. More income means more monies available to perform the upkeep of our precious historic buildings.
