

## Minutes of the Central Moravian Church Council-January 27, 2019

Pastor Hopeton Clennon opened the annual meeting of the Central Moravian Church Council at 12:25 p.m. on Sunday, January 27 with a short prayer. Barry Pell and Terry Delph were nominated for the offices of Council President and Secretary, respectively. According to custom, these two were elected by unanimous consent. The singing of "What Brought Us Together" followed.

The minutes of the 2018 Church Council were approved without change. Jeff Biro, Debbie Helms, and Carolyn Clewell will serve as reviewers for the minutes of this year's meeting.

Hopeton rose to bring the report of the Board of Elders. We ended the year with 993 communicant members. We also saw a slight uptick in attendance during 2018. Unfortunately, Iglesia Esperanza has lost its rental space on 4<sup>th</sup> Street on the South Side of Bethlehem. Efforts are now underway to find a new space, while worship services continue in the Robinson's home. The Robinsons spoke passionately about Esperanza's ongoing ministry despite all their difficulties.

Barry referred to the written reports of the various church committees for a description of their activities over the past year.

Anne Zug gave the report of the Board of Trustees. Landscaping has taken a good deal of the Trustees' attention this year, with very happy results. Paul Peucker and Pastor Lynnette Delbridge heavily reworked Central's website, resulting in a fresher look and a much improved site.

George Mowers then presented the 2018 financial results. Envelope giving, the largest segment of our income by far, was once again under budget for 2018, showing a shortfall of \$33,000. Overall, however, we were able to show a small surplus of \$1,459.

Tom Tenges presented the 2019 budget. Envelope giving is projected at the same level as 2018. Overall, a 6.33% increase in total income is envisaged, as well as a 6.52% increase in total expenses. The total budget is \$868,709. After a few questions, the budget was passed as proposed.

On behalf of the Nominating Committee, Craig Mosebach presented the nominees for 2019 boards and committees. These were:

The nominees were elected unanimously.

After closing comments by several members of the congregation, the Council adjourned at 1:30 p.m.

## **Board of Elders**

The year under review was a relatively calm one for the board as a whole. Any major challenges were resolved at the level of the committees which augment the ministry of spiritual care and oversight of the congregation and all classes of its membership. We are particularly grateful for the opportunity to partner with the Board of Trustees in preparing the annual report to the Provincial Elders' Conference, completing a survey dealing with Identity, Purpose and Organization of our province, establishing a new policy for the utilization of the Prime Fund for spiritual development, and approving the budget for 2020.

During the year under review, our congregation was served faithfully and well by a board of twelve elected elders and two pastors: Gene Allen, Peter Behrens, Don Brown, Hopeton Clennon, Lynnette Delbridge, Elissa Derbak, Jim Jordan, Ken Kodama, Pam Larimer, Ann Raines, Steven Schlack, Priscilla Schueck, Diane Shaw and Mary Shields.

We started 2019 bidding farewell to Martha Griffis and Janice Ostock who rotated off the board after serving the maximum of two three-year terms. The newly elected elders in 2019 were Gene Allen and Don Brown. Both gentlemen shared the unique tale of joining the board together for the first time 40 years earlier. We are ending 2019 bidding farewell to Jim Jordan, Ann Raines and Steve Schlack. While the Senior Pastor serves as President of the Board, we are extremely grateful to Vice President Ann Raines and Secretary Diane Shaw for their faithful work and dedicated service.

We completed the first full year of having Elders assist with the serving of holy communion in the sanctuary on Sunday mornings. Six of our twelve elders participated in this ministry in 2019, covering all dates except the First Sunday in Lent. On April 7<sup>th</sup> we celebrated with Richard Miller who is the organist for our 9 a.m. worship service and director of the Chapel Choir. He was presented with the James V. Salzwedel Award for Excellence in Church Music by the Moravian Music Foundation.

We celebrated the completion of another series of Confirmation classes under the leadership of Pastor Lynnette. Later in the year we joined in the celebration of the 35<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Pastor Lynnette's ordination.

Among the new developments in 2019 were the following. Introduction of an ESL (English as a Second Language) program for our Korean members. Establishment of a Care for Creation subcommittee of the Social Action Committee. Implementation of a change in Becky Lepore's title from Director of Music to Minister of Music. Approval of a new members Sacristan Corps, Sharon Upton. Celebration with the International Student Care Committee on the occasion of the graduation of the first two students in this partnership with Moravian College—Jackson Mlimuka and Joshua Pradhan. Offering prayerful support for the ordination of Timothy Naisby. Welcoming the Rev. Maggie Wellert on her return to the staff position of part-time Parish Pastor. Participation as a host church for the Bethlehem Interfaith Group inaugural faith crawl on September 15. Dedication and installation of the Moravian Church Seal in Soil painting on September 22. Hosting the Rally Day for Moravian Women (Eastern Region) on September 28. Finally, the utilization of the term "Communicants" among the provincial categories of membership. These are our younger members who receive holy communion but have not yet participated in the Rite of Confirmation.

The Midweek Lenten Program centered on the theme "Mission and Tradition." Presentations were made by Paul Peucker, Mary Brown, Lyn Chynoweth, Hopeton Clennon, Paul Silwamba, Betsy Miller, and Craig Mosebach. Guest preachers through 2019 included: The Rev. Dr. Betsy Miller, The Rev. Chris Johnson, The Rev. Dr. Steve Simmons, Central member Timothy Naisby (the week of his ordination), and The Rev. Maggie Wellert. Our thanks to Carol Reifinger for resuming executive leadership of the Star and Candle Shoppe after Shelly Watson's relocation to southern New Jersey. Our thanks to Linda Norris-Fiegel for accepting the role of Volunteer Putz Coordinator in 2019.

Our Elders are called upon to ensure that the public means of grace are regularly and faithfully dispensed according to the ritual, customs and practices of the Moravian Church. Elders oversee the Christian culture of the members of the congregation and their instruction in the doctrine, history, principles, and usages of the Moravian Church, the Sunday School, and various organizations, agencies, and societies of the congregation. Sincere gratitude is offered to the Sacristan Corps, Music Committee, and Christian Education Committee among others for their phenomenal work in these areas.

Although the Elders decide on all matters pertaining to the admission, dismissal, suspension, and exclusion of members, we prayerfully chose to be guided by the expressed wishes of members of our worshiping community. Two other areas of responsibility include determining when, how, and by whom the church buildings and properties may be used, and determine what financial appeals shall be taken for causes outside of the local congregation.

As in the previous year, our strategic plan calls for expanding opportunities for worship, education and fellowship, in accordance with the mission statement of Central Moravian Church. That statement continues: "Our members are committed to meeting the needs of society and nurturing individuals on their spiritual journeys as we honor our Moravian heritage. We live our lives serving and fulfilling the mission of Christ in the world."

## **Christian Education Committee**

## Opportunities for Children and Youth

Church Nursery and Activity Packets: With the exception of Lovefeast Sundays, our Church nursery volunteers continue to offer childcare in our West Room nursery during all Sunday morning worship services in the Sanctuary. A new rotation of volunteers began their service in June of 2019. The nursery is supplied with snacks, age-appropriate books, a housekeeping center with kitchen, table, and toy food, a crib and baby doll, a tool table, and a low table which can also be converted into a Lego table. We have been blessed to have children in the nursery almost every Sunday this year and are grateful to our volunteers for making this ministry possible.

Our nursery volunteers met in November to review our nursery ministry and affirmed that the nursery is intended for infants through preschool age children. We invite children who are old enough for Kindergarten to sit with their families during worship. Also, children who wish to receive communion should sit with their families during worship.

For children attending worship, we continue to offer activity sheets, available from the sacristans at the door, and bags with coloring books and crayons from baskets at the doors of the Sanctuary and in the Chapel. Since our nursery is not open for the Children's Christmas Eve Lovefeast, 92 coloring packets were prepared for the children. All packets were used both at the Lovefeast and Christmas Eve Vigil services. We thank the volunteers who invited families to take them. Parents and children were appreciative of this effort to welcome them to worship at Central.

Children's Sunday School: We appreciate the growth of warmth and enthusiasm in our Children's Sunday School Class under the leadership of Faith Fiegel, our Sunday School Superintendent, and our other teachers, Jane Corvino, Gayle Dimmick, and Laura Corcoran. Maria Prochnau, our pianist, is also a valuable part of the team. The class explored the following units in the spring and fall: Jesus in the Synagogue (Luke 4), the Prodigal Son (Luke 15), Journey to the Cross, Psalm 23, Joseph, the Exodus, and the Magi Bringing Gifts to Jesus (Matt. 2). The spring and Christmas units tied in

as much as possible with the lectionary texts used in worship.

Working with Pastor Delbridge, we have more intentionally coordinated the Sunday School curriculum to our worship life as a congregation. Services planned with children and their families in mind included:

- January 27<sup>th</sup>, "Growing Up Sunday." Worship in the 9 a.m. Chapel service focused on grown up Jesus preaching in the Synagogue. We looked at baby pictures paired with grown up pictures for several members of our congregation and heard from grownups, doctor Beth Careyva and lawyer Kathy Williams about the way their professional work enables them to care for others.
- March 3<sup>rd</sup>, Red Wagon Food Collection for the Food Pantry at both worship services.
- April 21<sup>st</sup>, the children's sermon for the 9 a.m. Chapel Service about butterflies led into the Easter Egg Hunt and workshop and the hymn "In the Bulb There Is a Flower", which the Sunday School class learned for Easter.
- May 12<sup>th</sup>, the children sang for the Christian Family Lovefeast at the 11 a.m. service.
- Oct. 6<sup>th</sup>, Red Wagon Food Collection at both worship services.
- Oct. 19<sup>th</sup> (marathon weekend) at 6 p.m. in Benigna Auditorium, we focused on the Exodus story.
   Through sound effects, we experienced God's struggle with Pharaoh and then we crossed over the Red Sea into freedom. Activities for people of all ages followed.
- Dec. 15<sup>th</sup>, the children sang and presented a Christmas play for the 11 a.m. service.
- Dec. 24<sup>th</sup>, the children presented their Christmas music for the Children's Christmas Eve Lovefeast.

Friday Fun Night: Our Kindergarten through 5<sup>th</sup> graders continue to meet for a child-friendly supper, story, games, craft, music and other activities on the second Friday of the month from 6 to 8 p.m. We have been exploring the same stories as the Sunday School in order to deepen the children's understanding of these core stories and to become more familiar with the songs that go with them. In the spring, Pastor Delbridge and Seminary students Grace Budier and Charlie McDonald provided leadership and in the fall, Kristine Mauer, who is an ESL teacher from East Hills Middle School, replaced Charlie McDonald. We typically have 8 to 12 children attending. Realizing

that we had several families with infant and preschool age children, we decided to experiment and expand our Friday Fun Night program. Starting in February, we added an infant and toddler room and a preschool class. Parents send in age appropriate food for the infants and toddlers. Our preschooler children enjoy plenty of free play and a lesson and activity based on the same story the elementary age class is exploring. They join our elementary children for a child-friendly meal prepared by Michella Cardoso and Pat Metcalf.

We are grateful to volunteers Jane and Lou Leposa, Mary Brown, Jessica George, and Karen Brady, as well as staff members Faith Fiegel and Sara Mass for helping us add these two new classes and to expand our ministry to our families with younger children. We typically have one or two infants and two to five preschoolers joining us for Friday Fun Night.

Easter Egg Hunt and Workshop: For the second year, we tied images from the hymn "In the Bulb There is a Flower" into our Easter Egg hunt followed by refreshments and activities in Nitchmann Hall. This year we focused on butterflies as a symbol for Easter. Activities included decorating butterfly cookies, potting bulbs to take home, and using stickers found along with candy in the Easter eggs to complete a picture portrayal of the hymn. The workshop was well attended by many of our Sunday School children and by visitors, particularly grandchildren of our members.

Youth Group: Our youth group typically meets on Sunday nights from 6 to 8 p.m. in Nitschmann Hall, September through early June. We engage in a variety of service learning, and fellowship activities. In the spring, leadership included seminarian Charlie McDonald, parent Sarah Phillips and Pastor Delbridge with Beth Davis occasionally joining us. In the fall, seminarian Grace Budier and two college students, Maddie Figiel and Grace Helfrich served as youth assistants. With two seniors graduating from the group and no youth moving up into middle school, our fall was a time of readjusting and growing accustomed to new leaders.

We appreciate the help of other adult volunteers from the congregation throughout the year who help connect our youth to church ministries like the Food Pantry, Cynthia's Boutique, and Bethlehem Emergency Shelter. This year, our Youth participated as the worship leaders and readers for our Palm Sunday Holy Week Reading Service. Journey to the Cross and Beyond: As part of our Lenten and Easter observance, our Sunday School, Youth Group, and members of the congregation all had the opportunity to participate in Journey to the Cross and Beyond. We set up 14 stations following Jesus' experience from the anointing in Bethany, through to the last supper, his trial, crucifixion, and resurrection. Each station included a scripture passage, directions and materials to do something experiential, and sets of reflection questions geared for both children and adults. We are grateful to all the people who helped with preparations and who hosted this event.

We experimented with offering more dates and times of day for members of the congregation during Holy Week. Those persons who participated found it a meaningful experience and we were pleased that the Chaplain from Moravian Academy participated and found the child-friendly versions at each station meaningful for her preschool age children.

Confirmation: Our confirmation class continued to meet through the spring of 2019 with twelve of our youth participating. The students met on Sunday mornings from 9:30 to 10:00 a.m. to explore spiritual practices and then continued with the regular Sunday School hour from 10:00 to 10:45 a.m. to explore salvation history from the perspective of characters in the Old and New Testaments. The students met about once a month on Saturdays to delve into Moravian History and practices. Eight students and four leaders attended the Confirmation Retreat at Camp Hope led by Marie Couts. The Confirmation teaching staff included Susan Trimble, Camie Modjadidi, Peter Behrens, Hopeton Clennon, Steve Krawiec, Carol Delbridge, and Lynnette Delbridge. Ten of the students were confirmed in June and two in September.

Vacation Bible School: For the fourth year, we cooperated with East Hills and Advent Moravian Churches in offering Vacation Bible School. VBS was held at East Hills Moravian Church, June 17-21, 2019, with 10 adult leaders, 9 teenager helpers, and 10 campers from Central participating. We used *To Mars and Beyond*, a curriculum published by Cokesbury. The total staff of volunteers from all 3 churches served 42 children during a fun week of stories, art, music, science and recreation activities.

**Camp Hope:** Once again this year, many of our children and youth attended winter retreats and summer camps at Camp Hope. We are grateful to the

Busy Workers' Society, Ladies' Sewing Society, and individuals whose generous contributions, added to donations from the Soup and Chili Contest and income from the Allen Fund made it possible for us to offer camperships for 6 of our senior high youth to attend the Winter Retreat, 8 to attend the confirmation retreat and 16 to attend summer camps.

Advent Workshop: Our annual Advent Worship took place on Dec. 1st in Benigna Auditorium with 61 people attending. In light of the bad weather forecast for the day, we were pleased with the attendance. Led by Carol Holbert, our staff provided many repeat activities: making felt Moravian candles, pinecone bird feeders and Advent wreaths. Some new activities this year included making King crowns, silhouette tea lights with nativity scene covers, and decorating lamb cakes. Heajin Ko, Mary Mowrer, and Maria Prochnau played the piano for us. Many other youth and adult volunteers assisted with refreshments and activities.

## **Adult Christian Education Opportunities**

Friendship Bible Class: This class gives careful attention to biblical texts and how they can be understood in the context of the history and culture of the Ancient Near East. Led by Dr. Howard Cox, retired Old Testament professor, this group meets during the Sunday School year at 10 a.m. in the Church Office Conference Room.

Comenius Sunday: Participants in this group enjoy Sunday breakfast together while viewing and discussing high-quality videos on various kinds of theological, historical, and biblical issues. Led by Willard Martin, Comenius Sunday meets year-round on Sunday morning from 9 to 11 a.m. in Zinzendorf Parlor off Nitschmann Hall in the lower level of the Christian Education building.

Comenius Tuesday: Comenius Tuesday participants read and discuss a wide variety of books and resources and explore the Bible, biblical archeology and anthropology, progressive Christianity, comparative religions, and environmental morality. Group members seek to deepen their understanding of the Bible and its metaphorical implications for their personal and communal development, expand their concept of spirituality, and apply those learnings to the mission of the church. This discussion group, led by AnneMarie Whildin, meets every other Tuesday, September through early June at 9:30 a.m. in the Conference

Room off Nitschmann Hall in the lower level of the Christian Education building.

Stories for Life: Class members explore major stories about our ancestors in the faith from the Hebrew Scriptures (Old Testament) and the New Testament in hopes of growing more deeply into their own personal faith stories today. Taught by the Reverend Maggie Wellert, this class meets during the Sunday School year on Sunday mornings at 10 a.m. in the lower level of the Chapel. For six weeks in January and early February, this class doubles with the Travelers' Together discussion group sponsored by the Social Action Committee. The book, Fear of the Other by William Willimon was the focus for discussion.

Wisdom Way of Knowing Prayer Circles: Led by the Rev. Maggie Wellert, participants in this group join together once a month for a time of gathering, body prayer, chanting, sung prayer, contemplative prayer, a short time for a wisdom teaching, a lectio divina reflection on a saying from the *Gospel of Thomas*, and a sharing or debriefing time at the end.

## **Committee Work - Collaborations**

As a committee, we enjoyed two collaborations with other church committees. First, with the Church Family Life Committee (CFL), we offered a "Prodigal Son" Sunday during the 10 a.m. Sunday School hour on March 31st. CFL prepared and served a delicious brunch while we provided discussion questions at the tables and activities around the perimeter of the room, which invited both children and adults to explore the parable of the Prodigal Son more deeply.

Second, with the Social Action Committee, we explored the possibility of offering English as a Second Language classes for our members who are growing in their mastery of the English language. Using funds given in memory of Mare Ashford, we were able to hire Kristen Mauer, ESL teacher at East Hills Middle School, who offered weekly classes during the summer months. Pastor Delbridge also offered a monthly ESL Bible study. In the fall, this program continued with the monthly ESL Bible study.

## Committee Work - Thinking and Planning

- Our committee looked at the ways our work responds to the goals in the 2016-2020 strategic plan for Central Moravian.
- We benefitted from a workshop with Marie Couts,
  Director of Christian Education for the Eastern
  District. She helped us see the importance of children
  participating in worship with their families and the
  larger community of faith and offered several
  suggestions for strengthening our ministry to children
  and their families.
- We considered our budget and requested the funds necessary to make the honoraria we provide for our Friday Fun Night, Youth Assistants, and Sunday School Superintendents more equitable in 2020.
- Based on statistics from the 2018-2019 year, we took two different meetings to look deeply into the number of children and youth involved in 17 different programs or service opportunities at Central. Our research showed us that 9 children or vouth participated in one activity or program, 13 participated in two different activities or programs, 9 participated in three activities or programs, and 15 participated in four activities and programs. (These activities or programs did not include those children who only attended the Easter Egg Hunt and those who typically attend the 11 a.m. worship service). Looking ahead, we noted that we are lacking active children and youth in the 4th through 7th grades. This dip probably reflects the demographic bubble following the 2008 recession. ## **History Committee**

We have just received the HVAC estimates and the project should be ready to go out to bid shortly. When completed, the new facility will be named the Patricia Smith Collection Room, in

## **International Student Care Committee**

In June of 2015 Central Moravian Church agreed to partner with Moravian College to bring qualified international students from the worldwide Moravian Church to Bethlehem to earn a Bachelor's Degree at the College. The students are designated as Barnette Scholars. The College will provide full tuition, room and board for two qualified students every other year. Central will cover the cost of transportation to Bethlehem and home at the end of their studies, books and other incidental expenses.

The International Student Care Committee was formed to provide local support for the Barnette Scholars. Such support includes administering the funds designated to their financial support; to serve as local "family" to the students; seeking home visits for them during holiday breaks; and other needs that arise to help them while they are students at Moravian.

Our first two students graduated in August having completed their studies in just three years. Joshua Pradhan graduated with a degree in Business Administration and has returned to Nepal and is helping in the church there. Jackson Mlimuka received a degree in Business Administration majoring in Marketing and minoring in Ethics. He was awarded a scholarship to pursue a Masters Degree in Business Administration at Moravian.

Nahum Pradhan from Nepal is a sophomore majoring in Music Therapy. He is in the College Choir, the Guitar Ensemble and was recently elected to the Board of the Undergraduate Student Government. He went on a mission trip to Cuba during Summer break. Thanks to the generosity of many, Nahum had successful oral surgery in August, and has recovered well. The next step in his treatment has not been determined.

In August we welcomed our first woman scholar. Lucy Ngara from Tabora, Tanzania is an Economics major and is doing very well. She made Dean's List for Fall Semester. She is looking forward to participating in a mission trip to Jamaica during Spring break.

We are blessed to have such conscientious and outstanding students as our Barnette Scholars.

Jane Mahelo from Tabora, Tanzania is currently applying to Moravian to begin studies in Fall of 2020. She is a graduate of our Moravian orphan program in Tabora. We pray for her success in the admission process.

## **Mission Committee**

The Mission Committee of Central Moravian Church supports and provides oversight of the international mission efforts approved by the Joint Board of Elders and Trustees through groups, organizations and individuals. In carrying out this mission, the Mission Committee partners with the Board of World Mission. The most historic of these efforts is work in Tanzania. Mission work included the building of churches, supporting the construction and maintenance of wells, sending medical supplies and the care and education of orphans. Adopt a Village is a partnership with BWM and Central Moravian Church, and it has been faithfully supervised by Central Members Bill and Peg Hoffman. Their devotion over many years has been greatly appreciated by the Mission Committee and the members of CMC. Their frequent reports have kept this important work before all of us to share in and feel committed to this important work. Many additional church congregations have joined us in sustaining the work of the AAV program and we express our deep appreciation to these partners as well.

## Bill Hoffman provides the following Church Council Report from Tanzania 2019

During 2019 Bill and Peg Hoffman made their 33<sup>rd</sup> trip to Sikonge, Tanzania, in support of Central's partnership with the Sikonge Moravian churches.

## Orphan Program

The orphan program includes thirty-six villages in the Sikonge district and five parishes in the city of Tabora. Support for these children is provided through Adopt a Village, a program sponsored jointly by Central Moravian Church and the Board of World Mission. Twenty-nine village women and four ladies in the city of Tabora are currently providing assistance to nearly 2800 children. The primary focus has always been on education. The structure and function of these two programs are similar; they are separate due to the significant distance between the villages and the city and the nature of the need.

There are nearly 300 children in the city program; over 50% are in secondary education or beyond. Twenty orphan graduates of the government's VETA (Vocational Educational Training Authority) program have formed three "work groups." The two sewing

circles, formed exclusively by young women, are doing very well. The young men have formed a carpentry shop. They are currently making window frames for new houses. Each group is financially independent.

There are just over 2500 children enrolled in the village orphan program, slightly more than 10 % of whom are participating in education beyond primary school. Education, and educational opportunities in the villages is far inferior to those in the city. VETA does not extend to the villages. As primary schools are often located many miles from a student's home, attendance is not routine, especially for those less than eight years old. Classrooms typically have 80 or more students for a single teacher. Children are often required to pass secondary school entrance exams in subjects they have never studied due to absence of a qualified instructor.

Good healthcare is available in the cities, but it remains a significant problem in the villages. Children with a clubbed foot, an all too common anomaly, must travel to Dar es Salaam for adequate treatment. Mothers continue to die in childbirth, often leaving an infant orphan behind. Osteomyelitis has not been successfully treated outside the city, which requires a significant and fearful journey for an orphan. Although the central government is theoretically responsible for children with sickle cell disease, in practice their care, which often involves expensive blood transfusions, falls to the orphan program.

For the first time in two years, the mamas in the orphan centers requested maize to distribute to those in need. Forty-one sacks, each weighing 70 pounds, were purchased and sent to the village centers in early May. The mamas gave the food to only selected families. While making rounds, a suitcase is kept in the back of the truck from which Moravian Academy clothing is passed out where needed. Additional sacks of maize were scheduled for delivery in Tabora.

This year the Mama's Educational Scholarship Fund will make its seventh distribution to the Moravian Mamas working in the villages. Funding for this gift has been provided by the Twenty Minute Society, Moravian Women, and the Busy Workers' Society. Each of the ladies will again be given 100,000 Tsh (43 USD) to help meet family educational expenses.

## Wells

Only one new well, located at Usipilo A, was constructed over the last year. This is the sixteenth funded by Central Moravian Church in the Sikonge district. The well in Usega, repaired last year with government funds, was again in need of minor maintenance. This must now be the responsibility of the local water committee.

There are sufficient funds available to construct one more new well. Eng Ngunda, the district water engineer, in consultation with Mama Kimwaga, will decide on its location.

## **Church Construction**

Mazinge Moravian is located two miles southwest of Sikonge. It was roofed at the end of June and is now fully functional. This is the sixteenth Moravian church completed under the auspices of Central Moravian. Mwasavanga Moravian, a small Sukuma congregation located fifteen miles to the northwest of Sikonge. It is currently ready for roofing. SPG, the Society for the Promotion of the Gospel, has joined Central in sponsoring its construction.

## **Special Needs School**

Fifteen new students have been added to the roster over the last year, bringing the total to 96, with 80 boarders. The boys out number the girls, 52 to 44. Sixteen students are albinos; four more were due to report in September from the very distant village of Kitunda. The number of staff has increased proportionally; there are now 7 full time teachers and 1 volunteer.

Nearly a third of the students are very poor and unable to purchase their own school uniforms. The headmaster was assured that First Presbyterian Church of Durango will provide these as needed.

## Lusangi Bible School

Once again this year there will be a total of six "Parker Scholarship students," three in each of the two years of study. One of last year's Parker graduates, who was also in the orphan program, has been accepted at Mbeya as a pastoral candidate.

## Evangelism of the Sukuma

The new Moravian church at Kondi has nearly dissolved. The assistant pastor who had begun and grown the congregation had a major stroke, and there was no one available to replace him. A graduate of the Lusangi Junior Bible College from the village of Msuva has recently been assigned to restart this effort.

The Sikonge Moravian Church is continuing its evangelism with a section of the Sukuma tribe located 15 miles to the northwest. In Igulula 11 adults and 17 children routinely attend the Sunday service, which is now held in a tent purchased with funds provided by Central Moravian Church. The congregation at Mwasavanga (v.s.), located on the west side of Igulula, has always been somewhat larger. They currently number 27 adults and 30 children. Both congregations are led by Jackson Daudi, an elder at Sikonge Moravian. He begins worship each Sunday at 8 a.m. in Igulula. At 10 a.m. he rides his bicycle three miles to a second service at 11 a.m. in Mwasavanga. Jackson is currently guiding the construction of Mwasavanga's new church. As it takes him 2½ hours to make the trip to Sikonge, he is living in the village until the construction is completed.

The Tanzanian Moravian Mamas and the Hoffmans gratefully acknowledge the continued financial and spiritual support of Central Moravian Church, without which this ministry could not exist.

## Craig Mosebach provides the following report on the Mission Support to Nepal

Central's work with the Nepal mission started in 2009 when the Revs. Vani and Shanti Pradhan returned to Nepal following their graduation from Moravian Theological Seminary. Vani had been an intern at Central during her Seminary studies.

## School News

International Kindergarten – purchased in July of 2011 with enrollment of 47 in two levels of preschool and two levels of kindergarten.

- current enrollment is about 80 with a waiting list.
- tuition aid, funded by donations to Central through the Mission Committee, is currently providing half tuition for 5 Moravian children in attendance.

Shristi Academy – founded by Vani and Shanti after gaining a license from the Board of Education in 2016, now has 4 grades with total enrollment of about 55. Hiring teachers is still a concern for Vani, the Principal. There are also 5 Moravian students on Tuition Aid at Shristi Academy funded by the Academy.

Room for the fifth grade for next year is critical. Both buildings currently rented by Vani and Shanti are at capacity. Extremely good news, the British Province has asked Vani and Shanti to prepare a proposal and plan for the purchase and construction of a new facility to house the two schools. We are prayerfully anticipating a successful outcome to this proposal and plan.

## **Teaching Mission Trip**

Central members Jody Trostle and her two daughters Lizzie and Aliceann, along with another teacher from Broughal, visited Nepal to teach in the schools for a month during the summer with partial expenses paid by Antioch of the Board of World Mission. Jody and her family were also granted partial support for expenses provided by Central's Mission Committee.

## **Church Report**

Three congregations are currently active in the Kathmandu Valley of Nepal serving about 400 Moravians.

This Christmas season Shanti and Vani led caroling sessions over 15 evenings leading up to Christmas. This caroling is held in church members' homes since it is not legal to evangelize in public. Instead the families invite their friends and neighbors to their homes for the caroling programs.

Two of the congregations continue to share putz displays provided by the 2015 mission team from Central.

## Other

Vani's and Shanti's son Nahum, a Barnette Scholar under Central's International Student Care program for Moravian College students, will be home over the Christmas break to act as a local leader for the Eastern District Youth Ministry mission trip to Nepal.

Prayers are needed for Shanti's brother, Senior Pastor Nagendra Pradhan, who is struggling with diabetes. He has recently started dialysis twice a week and is feeling better.

Under the wise leadership of Llyena Boylan, the committee meets six times during the year with sub-committees created when necessary.

I am deeply grateful for the dedicated and talented members of our Chapel Choir, Church Choir, and Central Brass Ensemble who give many hours to our church's music ministry. I am very thankful for **Richard Miller** who conducts the chapel choir, coordinates instrumentalists and soloists, plays for many weddings and serves as organ substitute for me when I'm on vacation. **Caitlin Heckman** had a beautiful baby girl (Claire Elizabeth) this year, and continues to direct the Central Moravian Brass Ensemble as they play the second Sunday of each month during the school year.

## **Social Action Committee**

We thank the strong and dedicated members of our church for another year of promoting good partnerships with our community and church agencies as well as creative projects that raised awareness in the areas of environmental concern, homelessness, hunger, and poverty.

We continue to value the good ministry of many agencies in the area and are fortunate to work with them.

A List of our Community and Church Partners and our Ministry Together in 2019:

- · Bethlehem Emergency Cold-Weather Shelter at Christ Church UCC: The shelter provides dinner, sleeping quarters and breakfast for homeless men and women, with a maximum of 75 guests. A paid security monitor is also there while we are there, and all guests must get a voucher from the Bethlehem police, indicating they have no warrants for violent crimes. Starting with the 2018-19 year, Central has been in charge of the third Saturday of the month. Rose Warner was the volunteer coordinator/kitchen director for our dates for the 2018-19 shelter. Janice Ostock is now the volunteer coordinator and Rose is in charge of food purchasing. New this year is the ability to provide showers for men and women. The shelter also had the season extended, starting Nov. 21st and ending April 8th. We still need volunteers for many tasks, especially shower monitoring, overnight assistance, and breakfasts! If you are interested in helping, please contact Janice at janice.ostock@gmail.com.
- Bread for the World: \$400 was donated for the membership fee. Michael Brennan and Bonnie Davis took over Bread for the World for 2019. It was a new experience for us and we approached it differently. At the annual Bread for the World meeting everyone else in the valley was doing letters, so we went with that approach. We realized that writing a letter takes time no one has so we wrote sample letters to Senators and Representatives. We made four sample letters. Printed copies were made. Brenda Hoelman did the Mission Moment at both services. The letters were distributed to the congregation at both the 9 and 11 a.m. services, with help from our Social Action Committee members. Everyone that spoke to us appeared to have a positive response. We gave the congregation the option of stamping and mailing the letters themselves, or returning them the next week in the collection plate for us to stamp and deliver. No letters were returned. We estimate 200 letters were distributed.
- Central Food Pantry (see separate report)
- Central Santas provided gifts of clothing to 66
   Esperanza children and teens, and gifts of books to 100 children at Community Services for Children.
   \$720 was donated by congregation members and friends to purchase additional books. We thank the many volunteers who helped to sign up Central Santas, to check in gifts, and deliver the gifts bags to

- Community Services and Esperanza!
- The Care for Creation subcommittee of Social Action is new this year, but has had a busy beginning! We have written and published Green Weekly Texts in The Sunday Times and The Belfry newsletter. We have several writers among our group who have included articles in The Belfry on Care for Creation topics. We have sponsored informational talks by the Bethlehem Environmental Advisory Council and by City Councilman William Revnolds, who described the City of Bethlehem's Climate Action Plan. We hosted congregation members at Dinner & a Movie (The Human Element). We joined forces with the Monocacy Farm Project, which is run by the School Sisters of St. Francis, and provides fresh produce to a number of local food pantries (including our own!). We have lots of ideas for 2020, and welcome new committee members, young and old, to join us in planning. First off: the TREX plastics challenge - watch for information in The Sunday Times and The Belfry!!
- Church World Service (promotion of CROP Walk in October, over \$3,800 raised from Central walkers and member contributions). Thanks again to Helen Foraste for her continued CROP Walk leadership.
- Cynthia's Boutique is led by Charlie McGorry and Gina Kelechava. They averaged 50+ customers on distribution days, an increase from last year. They even helped with wedding clothes for a couple who are regular customers, a new teacher who needed a teaching wardrobe, as well as provided clothing for My Sisters Closet and ARM, when appropriate. Charlie and Gina keep growing and fine-tuning their operation along with a core group of volunteers who work like a well-oiled machine, which is key in the limited space. There is a close relationship with the Food Pantry.
- Fair Trade Coffee Project (monthly sales of coffee and other products which benefit small farmers working sustainable farms, promotion of this idea of commerce). Beth Davis has done an amazing job on this project. Sales are in the church vestibule on the second Sunday of every month. She is now offering recycling of all Equal Exchange product packaging to customers through TerraCycle.
- Lehigh Conference of Churches, Justice and Advocacy Committee: Dick Williams has been

meeting regularly with this committee in planning for the annual Dr. Martin Luther King community breakfast, meeting with other churches with Social Action Committees and other activities of mutual interest.

- LePoco: \$100 for Peace Camp Scholarships.
- Luminaria Night: Social Action participated again this year in a benefit for New Bethany Ministries, one of our Social Action partners in the community. This year proved challenging weatherwise, with a rain delay on Saturday and a very windy day on Sunday. But we had a large and persevering crew of Central members and friends who helped to light up our corner of Bethlehem.
- Moravian Open Door: annual gift of \$400, congregational awareness.
- Meals on Wheels: donation of \$200.
- Monocacy Farm Project: \$100.
- New Bethany Ministries: congregational awareness, participated in Luminaria night, volunteers.
- Northeast Ministry: \$100 for summer program.
- Victory House: congregational awareness, volunteers for meals, \$100 in towels at Christmas.
- Remaining budget funds at the end of the year were donated to the Central Food Pantry to be used as needed.

In addition to our work with partners, SAC's "Central Chautauqua" conducted a forum on food on August 24, led by Steve Krawiec. The morning session focused on the abundance, convenience, and style of food in contemporary American culture. The afternoon session emphasized the ethics of food production and the health consequences of various diets. Lunch was an impressive vegetarian spread provided by the participants. The day began with a liturgy and concluded with a hymn sing.

Along with the Christian Education Committee and the leadership of Camie Modjadidi, Memorial money for Mare Ashford, an active member of our committee, was used for developing and completing a 6 week ESL

conversation group of members wishing to strengthen their English conversational skills. We so much appreciate the members who gave of their time to help develop and participate in this program. Meaningful, continuing friendships and conversation partners, along with a Bible study and sermon conversation have continued.

We initiated a **Month of Service**, which was held in October. This Month of Service was a response to a resolution from the 2018 Northern Province Synod to engage as many members as possible in a wide variety of service activities. Eight ongoing activities, five new activities and two anytime activities were part of this Month of Service. We are currently evaluating the effectiveness of our month of service and will be making recommendations on continuing, or modifying what we did in our first year.

The Social Action Committee ran our annual discussion class called **Travelers' Together** in January and February focusing on the book <u>Fear of the Other</u> by Dr. William Willimon, under the direction of Hank Naisby and Dick and Judy Williams. The discussions and book were focused on who "The Others" are in our lives individually and as a society, what can be done to better understand our reactions to the others in our lives and what can be done to better deal with our reactions. We also did a two year survey of participants in the Travelers' Together class to help plan for future programs.

We appreciate and sincerely thank our amazingly dedicated committee and congregation for an outstanding year of caring and action.

## Joint Board

The Joint Board of Central Moravian Church consists of the Board of Elders and the Board of Trustees. Meetings are held on an as-needed basis for the transaction of business that requires the action of both Boards. Meetings may be called by either Board and are presided over by the President of the Trustees and the Vice President of Elders.

The Joint Board met for the first time on Sunday, February 3 following the 11 a.m. service. The Board Member orientation and luncheon, under the capable leadership of Committee Chair Jan Cole, was very successful. Our speaker was Charlene Donchez Mowers, President of Historic Bethlehem Museums and Sites. She gave an update on the World Heritage List process for Historic Moravian Bethlehem.

Orientation Handbooks were distributed to new members and continuing members received updates for filing in their binders. We thank senior pastor Hopeton for his overview of the printed materials and to George Mowers and Kelly Knapp for keeping this information updated for our use.

A Synod resolution from the 2018 Provincial Synod, prompted by the continuing decline in Church membership across the province, asked each congregation to discuss whether reorganization is needed at Provincial and District levels. Congregational comments were received at a Central forum on August 25 after the 10 a.m. service. The Joint Board received a complete packet of information regarding the possible reorganization. The packet included notes from the Congregational meeting along with remarks by the speaker, Linda Rapp, from the Eastern District Executive Board. A copy of the Synod resolution was also distributed. The Board met again in November, and thanks to the leadership of Elders' Vice President Ann Raines, our comments were consolidated and forwarded to the appropriate leaders of our Province and District. I would be remiss if I neglected to express our many thanks to Joan Carson for her complete and concise minutes from both meetings.

The Joint Board also reviewed the Budget Preparation for 2020 which is explained in the 2020 Budget Overview. The Church has again received a clean audit. That report will be included in the Committee Report by Anthony Thompson.

The Joint Board wishes to thank our senior pastor Hopeton, pastors Lynnette and Maggie, our office support and Sunday School staffs, sacristans and the many, many dedicated volunteers who are responsible for our worship services, generous hospitality, and outstanding programs and activities.

Without equal, our Church is blessed to be supported by the love, constant devotion and commitment of all such dedicated individuals and our members.

## **Board of Trustees**

The Board of Trustees of Central Moravian Church consists of 14 members of the Church who meet monthly. Eight members constitute a quorum. A president, vice-president, treasurer and secretary are chosen from among their number annually. The Trustees are especially charged with managing the temporal affairs of the church. They must strive to ensure the prompt payment of all salaries, bills and Provincial and District obligations. The pastors are invited to attend all monthly meetings as non-voting members. Our fourteen members bring much expertise in education, business and leadership. Specific backgrounds include finance, law, business management, and marketing.

Our monthly meeting agenda includes reports from the president, senior pastor, financial secretary and various standing committees which provide oversight of our church's operations. The financial secretary is not an elected board member, has non-voting status and attends meetings as invited. A yearly summary of the standing committee reports can be found in other sections of this Church Council record. If you have questions of the chairpersons, please do not hesitate to ask them.

The financial secretary and the treasurer receive, record and deposit the receipts and disburse monies with the authorization of the Trustees. The Trustees also have charge of all funds of the Church, exercising the greatest of care to invest the funds prudently and use the income properly. The Trustees must keep all church owned and leased property in good repair and attractive condition.

Monthly, Elders read Trustees' Minutes and Trustees read Elders' Minutes. This enables each board to be fully aware of what each is reviewing, discussing and accomplishing. In addition, a trustee attends the monthly meeting of elders to give a report and an elder attends a trustee meeting for the same.

As reported previously in *The Belfry*, the Church received funds from the estate of the late Bruce Van Ness. He was the son of late, long time members, Charles and Kay Van Ness. He was also a nephew of members George and Mary Jo Hellick. Those funds were invested for growth and income by the Investment Committee. From those earnings, funding

has been set aside to underwrite programs in the 2020 budget year. Income from the Elizabeth Johnston Prime Fund will cover all Sunday School expenses, including items such as materials, programs and other needs as requested for the Sunday School, under the leadership of the Christian Education Committee.

In February, at the Board Orientation, we welcome the new Trustees and thank those who have completed their terms. Terms of office are three years with eligibility for election to a second three-year term. Llyena Boylan, Anthony Thompson, and I are retiring from the Board in February. Llyena has been our Vice President and Personnel Chair for the past two years. She is also the longtime chair of the Music Committee. She has given very generously of her business experience, time, and talent. Anthony, our counsel, audit chair and member of the Investment Committee has been engaging and helpful on many issues involving our Church. Finally, after six years as trustee, including four years as president, and four years as president of the Joint Board, it is time for me to retire.

I want to thank Joan Carson our secretary and David Charrier our treasurer for their support and diligence in carrying out their responsibilities. I thank our OUTSTANDING staff for their professionalism and skill: pastors Hopeton, Lynnette and Maggie; George, our financial secretary, and Kelly, Becky, Richard, Jeff, Jorge, Spencer, Martha and Cindy. Their support and dedication to our Church are seen every day and I hope you join me in telling them just how much we appreciate all their efforts.

My many thanks to all of you, our members and friends, committee members and chairs, and Elders and Trustees for your enthusiasm, cooperation, and commitment. It has been one of the great honors of my life to serve you in these roles and I thank you for the opportunity and trust you placed in me for these many years. It is my prayer that God bless each of you and Central Moravian Church.

## **Audit Committee**

The Audit Committee retained the services of Campbell, Rappold & Yurasits, LLP to audit the general, special and investment accounts of the Church for the fiscal year which ended December 31, 2018. This firm has been the Church's auditor for a number of years, and this provides familiarity and continuity in reviewing our financial records and controls. As has been the case for years in the past, Campbell, Rappold & Yurasits issued a clean report with respect to fiscal year 2018. The clean report provides assurance that our records are accurate and maintained in a timely manner. The only qualifying note pertains to the auditor's observation that we do not have a separate committee to independently verify the financial records prepared by our Treasurer, such as would be expected for larger corporations and organizations whose financial affairs are much larger and more complicated than those of Central Moravian Church. However, this absence of a separate independent committee is typical of smaller charitable organizations which cannot justify the additional cost of this compliance. This circumstance facing smaller charitable organizations is recognized by auditors.

Although they are required to make note of this circumstance in their audit findings, it is not a material deficiency. Otherwise, our financial protocols are appropriate, consistent and observed. A copy of the Audit is available in the Church Office for review.

A special notice of thanks to George Mowers is appropriate. George's diligence and commitment to serving our congregation is appreciated. The accurate and complete records which George maintains permit the auditors to have a clear and uncomplicated review of our financial records. This greatly assisted our auditors' timely issuance of an unqualified positive opinion in connection with the annual audit. As has been the case for the past years, it is a pleasure to submit an uneventful Audit Committee Annual Report.

## **Investment Committee**

The Investment Committee meets on a quarterly schedule in January, April, July, and October to evaluate the performance of the Church's portfolio and make purchases, sales or any needed adjustments. Members of the committee include Anne Zug, Mary Shields, Hal Smith, David Weikert, Anthony Thompson, Jeff Harris, and Don Brown.

The committee is assisted by Wayne Achey, a Senor Vice President of Investments at Merrill Lynch, and a Central member. As a financial adviser, Mr. Achey prepares presentations for the quarterly committee meetings that give the members several suggestions and options they can consider and evaluate to help maximize the stability and return of the portfolio.

Monthly investment reports of the portfolio from Merrill Lynch are provided to each member of the committee and also to the Financial Secretary. Investment results are shared with the Board of Trustees through the Financial Secretary's monthly Board report. The Board is also informed on the Committee's actions by reports on the quarterly meetings.

The following table indicates the opening and closing balances of our managed funds as well as increasing amounts that were withdrawn from the accounts to help cover church expenses in 2019. The Van Ness Fund is a new fund set up with a donation to the Church from the Van Ness family. The Steps Fund is with the Moravian Ministries Foundation, and is managed by Abbot Downing Co. The Growth Funds consist of Mutual Funds and Exchange Traded Funds that are designed for long term growth.

## **Personnel Committee**

We worked hard and had several meetings in the Spring and Fall and Winter. A new category for a committee member was added: congregational member.

We had developed a plan to secure and maintain our historic campus while providing for the safety and future growth and needs of our many congregants, committees, staff, partners, etc. The Sexton left in the Fall 2018 to take another position. A cleaning service was hired at that time to assist with a weekly cleaning. Jeff Griffis, the new part-time Facilities Manager, began his position on January 1, 2019.

In 2019, we hired two full-time custodians to complete our staffing needs. There is now expanded coverage. Custodians Jorge Zapata and Spencer Schlack began in the first half of 2019. The cleaning service remained until both positions had been filled.

CBC health insurance for full-time employees was again secured through our membership in the Chamber of Commerce, renewing December 1, 2019.

The Employee Handbook (last revised in 2014) was continuously updated and will continue to be a work in progress into 2020.

After 15 years of service, Becky Lepore took on the title of Minister of Music.

Maggie Wellert was hired as Parish Pastor and, in October, the Committee approved her position to continue into 2020.

A new "work order" will go into effect in January 2020 in order to provide the most effective level of service from our facilities group. It can be obtained from the Church office from our Senior Office Administrator Cindy Gibson and must be submitted not less than 7 days prior to an event.

In 2020, the Committee will tackle past, current and new job descriptions. A single format will be employed for this important update.

Many thanks to the entire Committee and our wonderful staff for all the time and expertise shared in this busy year.

## **Stewardship Committee**

2019 Results: The 2019 church operating budget called for envelope giving\* of \$530,000. The total amount given by members and friends by December 31, 2019, was \$488,909. This translates to 56% of the 2019 church budget.

2020 Budget: The proposed 2020 church operating budget calls for envelope giving\* of \$530,000. The stewardship letter was mailed in October 2019 to 551 church household members and friends. The 551 households receiving the stewardship mailing is less than the number of total church membership because the letter is not sent to members who are not confirmed and only one letter is sent to a household. As of December 31, 2019, \$323,059 has been pledged by members and friends, which represents 61% of the proposed 2020 church operating budget.

## **Budget and Finance**

In reviewing the past three years, a positive trend regarding the Operating Budget of Central Moravian Church has begun to emerge. After several years of deficits, Fiscal Year 2017 ended with a surplus of \$2,240, Fiscal Year 2018 ended with a surplus of \$1,459, and excitingly, Fiscal Year 2019 has ended with a surplus of \$15,757.

## Total Income was minimally under budget by \$1,220 or less than 1%.

Throughout the year, **Envelope Giving** was consistently below budget requirements and ended the year \$41,091 or 7.8% under budget. This had serious implications for the Budget and Finance Committee in establishing the 2020 Budget.

Other Contributions (other gifts, special envelopes, and cash plate offering) were over budget by \$28,466 or 25.3%, helping to cover the shortfall in envelopes.

Institutional Receipts (Moravian College, Moravian Academy, ArtsQuest, Bach Choir, 63 W. Church Street rental, and wedding income) were under budget by \$6,398 or 6.9%, due to less wedding income.

Endowment Income was over budget by \$20,243 or 15.1%, due to a one-time taking of five quarters of earnings instead of the normal four quarters.

## Total Expenses were under budget by \$14,537 or 1.7%.

Salary and Benefits were under budget by \$19,602 or 4.1%, due to partial year staffing of custodians and medical insurance savings.

Facilities-Operations were under budget by \$9,534 or 11.2%, due to utility costs savings from new HVAC systems and favorable weather conditions in 2019.

Facilities-Maintenance was over budget by \$5,035 or 6.7%, due to changes in service contract accounting.

Total Programs were over budget by \$7,479 or 8.1% due to increased programming expenses.

Church Office Administration expenses came in slightly under budget by \$480 or 1.4 %.

Central paid 100% of the amount requested for the Province & District Administration and additional administrative expenses for the revised pastors' pension program, creating an over budget of \$2,565 or 2.6%.

Total Income less Capital Projects Income increased from last year by \$52,941 finishing at \$869,929. Total Expenses less Capital Projects Expenses increased from last year by \$38,644 finishing at \$854,172. As a result, Fiscal Year 2019 ended with a surplus of \$15,757 which will carry over to FY2020.

Capital Projects, although not part of the Operating Budget and funded by income from the Preservation Fund, totaled \$137,625 for capital improvements to buildings on the Church Street Campus. Moravian Academy reimbursements totaled \$15,894 for their share of the CE Building capital projects.

## 2020 Budget Overview

Many individuals worked diligently to prepare committee and departmental budgets by projecting what they believe to be realistic expenses for 2020. The Budget and Finance Committee reviewed those projections taking into consideration income from various sources including Envelope Giving and Other Contributions for Central Moravian Church.

Many thanks to staff and the Budget and Finance Committee for looking at the details, keeping the goals of Central Church in the forefront while developing resourceful fiscal adjustments resulting in a realistic budget for 2020.

## Income:

Envelope Giving and Other Contributions present challenges in budgeting. The goal for Envelope Giving remains the same at \$530,000. Other Contributions is decreased by 15.96% from 2019. Institutional Receipts include fees for facility usage as well as rent for 63 W. Church Street. This shows an increase of 9.43% from 2019. Endowment Income is a projected income increase of 11.47%.

## Expenses:

Salaries and Benefits illustrates an increase for full-time and part-time employees.

Facilities Operations budget is increasing by 13.35% due to potential weather and pricing changes while Facilities Maintenance continues to hold steady thanks to careful management by our Facilities Administrator and the Buildings and Grounds Committee. Their collaborative overview of energy usage and maintenance of campus facilities will help keep expenses in line.

Ministry & Worship reflects an increase due to the benefit of hiring a Parish Pastor.

Music Programs budget also remains steady while maintaining its mission of being an effective and living example of our Moravian heritage with innovative musical offerings that enrich the spiritual life of the congregation as well as minister to those outside the congregation.

Christian Education shows a 54.30% increase reflecting the additional opportunities in our educational programs and staffing for youth, young adults, and adults.

Church Office Administration shows a minimal increase due to careful oversight of expenses.

**Province & District Administration** increased by 1.97% due to additional administrative costs for the pastors pension program.

Grace and peace to you in the name of the God who calls us to follow with faith and hope! The Moravian Church Northern Province equips congregations and people to be agents of God's transforming love in the world. We can only carry out this mission when we work and serve together. We are one body, with many parts, with many gifts and graces, and with many opportunities to share God's love and joy. Our witness is stronger when we join together with a common purpose.

This letter invites your full participation in our **Common Ministries Commitment**. With the guidance of the Finance Committee, the Provincial Elders' Conference has prayerfully developed the 2020 Provincial Budget and all the ministries and programs it supports. We need all of us to fulfill our commitments to live into the dreams God has planted in our hearts. We ask each congregation to give – as it has been blessed – to support this common ministry.

Your support allows us to educate seminarians who will become our pastors. Your commitment allows the Board of World Mission to proclaim the gospel in new areas of Peru and elsewhere. Your faithfulness fosters new ways of allowing the Moravian Music Foundation to share our musical heritage. Your commitment supports a faithful staff that serves the entire province and funds our Unity and ecumenical involvement. In short, your financial support of the province allows us to be fully invested in God's work locally and globally. Thank you in advance for your full participation.

We fund our common ministries through every congregation giving a percentage of its Line 1 income. The 2020 provincial budget was built on your Line 1 income from 2018. The percentage of your Line 1 income remains the same as last year. The amount you are asked to offer changes based on the fluctuation of Line 1 income. At the direction of synod, we have reviewed the percentage of Line 1 income for a few congregations to review how that number was determined. We will continue this work in the coming year.

As with good stewardship practices, you give to the province as you have received. Like personal budgets, the province lives within the expected receipts from congregational giving, which means we must make choices based on prayerful priorities. When one congregation does not meet its full share, we all suffer. When all congregations offer 100% of their requested support, we all rejoice together. We need all of you giving fully to our common ministry to support the many ministries God is calling us to offer the world.

The provincial elders have approved a budget for 2020 in the amount of \$2.27 million, which is based on anticipated common ministry receipts of \$ \$1,570,125. The budget has increased even though the requested income from common ministries commitments has decreased. We fund the difference through distributions from our invested funds, based on a spending rate that both funds current ministry and sustains the ongoing growth of the funds.

As before, we are sending out this entire mailing via e-mail. You are receiving this letter because you are a Pastor, Vice-Chair of Elders, President of Trustees, or Treasurer. It is imperative that you access the specifics of your congregation's share of the provincial budget on the Moravian Church Northern Province Portal. You have access through a specific password; if you experience difficulty with the portal, contact Tammy Curcio in our Finance Office at portal@mcnp.org.

As you prayerfully determine your local budgets and include your share of our provincial budgets, I invite you to remember our common commitments we make as congregations of this province. We must all give - and serve – together so that we continue to be faithful and courageous agents of God's transforming love in the world. Thank you for the many ways you live the Good News within and beyond your local congregation.

Greetings Friends and Partners in Ministry:

I write on behalf of the Eastern District Executive Board (EDEB) to thank you for this last year of ministry partnership and invite your full participation in the Eastern District Common Ministries for 2020. The ministry partnership that we share with you is one which supports congregational redevelopment, ministry agencies, as well as district staff who offer congregation consultation toward ministry enhancement.

We continue to encourage congregations to look seriously at employing the benefits of the new Past Due Balance Policy which offers 20% forgiveness of the Provincial and District Common Ministry Past Due Balances for each year that a congregation meets all District/Provincial assessments and pastoral benefits submissions in full. This policy supports our collaboration in district and provincial ministry, while providing much needed relief from past due balances. (Please see enclosed document.)

Although the transition to an income-based district assessment has gone smoothly, the new reality is that this formulation method results in a shrinking budget for the EDEB and less flexibility for staying current with monthly district expenses. For the purpose of meeting salary commitments for district staff and for ensuring consistent submission of common ministry allocations to our district agencies, the EDEB is requesting that each congregation please submit their district and healthcare benefits assessments on either a monthly or quarterly basis, if at all possible. (As a reminder, monthly clergy retirement submissions to Portico are now mandatory.) Please hear our appreciation for congregations who are already contributing district/healthcare benefits assessments in this way and who are currently making changes so as to accommodate this request.

Finally, on behalf of the Eastern District Executive Board let me express our gratitude for each congregation as a ministry partner. Our common ministry reflects an important, shared value that Christ calls us to do together that which we cannot do alone. We are appreciative of our district and provincial staff members, the Provincial Elders Conference, and interprovincial agencies whose dedication and leadership skill makes congregational revitalization and mission collaboration this day's reality. "To Us, To Us This Task is Given!"

## Mission, Purpose and Values

The Board of World Mission of the Moravian Church in North America (BWM) represents the Moravian Churches of the Southern, Northern and Alaskan Provinces in North America, and the churches of Unity of the Brethren in the state of Texas in world mission. It seeks to facilitate the individual and collective efforts of the churches to proclaim Christ in word and deed.

The established priorities for the BWM are Mission Outreach (sharing the Gospel outside of our constituencies) and Mission Engagement (engaging and equipping our congregations and members in the mission of the church).

The three primary focus areas of Mission Outreach are: Area Development according to COUF; Leadership Development within our areas of work; and building capacity for Mission Outreach initiated by our mission partners.

The three primary focus areas of Mission Engagement are: Education about mission efforts and the theology of mission in a global Moravian context; providing opportunities for individuals to engage in service and mission; and seeking mission support through a variety of ways including offerings of financial resources.

The BWM builds relationships through Mission Outreach and Mission Engagement to be faithful to the Great Commandment and the Great Commission.

### **Global Partnerships**

We have seven traditional partner provinces: Nicaragua, Honduras, Costa Rica, Guyana, Eastern-West Indies, and MCWT. Additionally, the BWM accompanies two Mission Provinces (Cuba and Labrador), and supervises two Mission Areas (Sierra Leone and Peru) on behalf of the Southern and Northern Provinces in North America, respectfully.

## **Priority and Clarity**

In 2019 the BWM has worked to bring clarity to its roles and responsibilities against the expectations of the numerous governing bodies that elect members to our board of directors. This work has been heavily administrative as partnership covenants with partner organizations have been revised, and guidelines for funding requests and evaluation have been re-written.

Yearly subsidies to global partners were decreased in 2019, with a plan for phasing them out completely in the next 3-5 years. The funds saved from these reductions are being re-allocated in large part to a Mission Grant fund, which has distributions three times a year. Funding requests are prioritized based on stage of development (Mission Area as top priority) and alignment with Mission Outreach goals.

A large project for the BWM over the previous year has been a study of viable options for a change in the administration of our largest single project, the Moravian Clinic in Ahuas, Honduras. The Ahuas clinic has faced significant challenges over the previous seven years. In 2014, a missionary, Rick Nelson, was

asked to return on a full-time basis to act as administrator of the Ahuas Clinic to help following significant financial oversight issues. With Rick's help, and generous donor support, the Ahuas Clinic has returned to a somewhat stable level of functioning. Over the next three years, a committee comprised of U.S. hospital administration and project management professionals, as well as individuals who have had long term commitments to this ministry will aid in the oversight and planning for BWM interaction with the Clinic.

In August 2019, the BWM was able to celebrate Ricks work, and retirement from his role as a BWM consultant, with the presentation of the newly established Ted Wilde Mission Service Award. This award was created by the BWM board of directors to honor the work of Ted, a former Executive Director of the BWM, as well as to provide a tool to help celebrate the ongoing service of individuals who have demonstrated a commitment to mission work and fulfilling the Great Commission.

The BWM was also able to join with the Moravian Church in Peru as it hosted its second National Conference, electing a new National Board, and making plans for the next four years of ministry. This was a tremendous step forward for a relatively new church, with attendance for the first time by delegates from the Amazon region of Peru, representing a new district and 22 new Moravian congregations. In conversation with church leaders, the priorities in our relationship will be Pastoral leadership training, and raising funding to establish a permanent church headquarters in Chiclayo, Peru.

Additionally, the BWM has worked with the Southern Province PEC to have Sister Safie Braima appointed as a Provincial Acolyte as she carries on the work and ministry in Sierra Leone. The BWM is inspired by and thankful for sister Safie, and her willingness to serve the Lord and take on the immense challenge of carrying out this work following the passing of her husband Mohammed Braima in 2018.

### **Mission Grant Funding**

Applications for projects are reviewed following submission deadlines of March 1, July 1 and November 1 to help collate proposals and project funding. In 2019 funding has been given to numerous projects including:

- Support of a lay pastor to develop youth ministry programming in Alaska
- Scholarships for advanced Theological Training for future teachers at the Honduran Bible Institute
- Printing of Miskito Hymnals and Daily Texts
- Leadership workshops to train church leaders in Administration in MCWT
- Capitol grants to start sustainable business efforts in Peru, including a Guinea Pig farm and a recording / photography business & a pilot project for a gasoline wholesale to retail business in Honduras
- Partnered with BMB and DMB in supporting expansion of health clinic in Tabora.

### Bethlehem Area Moravians, Inc.

At the start of 2019, I pulled together my Executive and Senior Management team and asked them a simple question...How can we, as BAM, be better partners?

How can we be better partners to the 6 Churches? How can we be better partners to our local Moravian Entities?

How can we be better partners to the Bethlehem Community at Large?

I charged them with reviewing all our existing partnerships and to look for opportunities to expand or refresh our ministries and also explore new relationships with partners who are interested in working with us for the common good.

It is very important for us to focus our ministerial works here in the Lehigh Valley. Although we still support initiatives outside of the area, the Lehigh Valley, and more specifically, the City of Bethlehem is where we have our economic, political and historical strength. Because we are based here, we can impact more lives here. I am proud of the efforts of the Executive BAM team in answering the above question and am pleased to report the following initiatives and accomplishments in 2019.

#### **Medical Access for Low Income Seniors**

As many of you may know, the Moravian Houses are the home to over 400 low-income seniors. Many of these individuals suffer from various healthcare challenges, which require follow-up therapy care. Most of these individuals forgo these additional treatments due to not having the necessary funds or the ability to travel to their doctors for the follow up visits. This lack of medical care severely impacts our residents' quality of life.

With the support of the Moravian Village of Bethlehem and in partnership with Good Shepherd Therapy, this year we opened a Good Shepherd clinic directly within Moravian House I. Instead of the residents trying to find appropriate transportation offsite, they can receive treatment in the clinic or in some cases, directly within their own home.

Due to the Moravian Houses proximity to a lowincome, senior high rise next door run by Bethlehem Housing, we have found that those residents have utilized this clinic. This is a good example of how BAM was able to leverage an existing relationship (Moravian Village and Good Shepherd) to addressing an underserved segment of society and impact our local community. We especially want to thank Moravian Village and Good Shepherd for all of their hard work in getting this program off the ground.

## **Programming and Educational Opportunities for At-Risk Youth**

Over the years, the BAM Organization has funded many outreach initiatives for the at-risk youths of the area. We have issued grants for the Backpacks of Hope and to Esperanza, which conducts after school programs and meal support for children living on the South Side of Bethlehem.

At Moravian Village, our residents have adopted Thomas Jefferson Elementary School. With Administration support, they sponsor reading programs, assist the Bethlehem Police Department with their Cops and Kids Book Drive and conduct various other events for the students.

This past summer, BAM and MVB Executives met with the Bethlehem School District to talk about how we can expand our service. One of the intriguing ways brought forward of helping these at-risk kids, is by helping their parents. Many of these parents have limitations in their own education and struggle to help their kids with school work.

One of the things BAM and Moravian Village has been blessed with is that we have a number of retired professionals from all areas of the spectrum. At Moravian Village especially, there are a number of former school teachers, professors, and financial executives that would be interested in conducting some of this education on a volunteer basis.

Some of the programs and classes being discussed are: basic finance, how to craft a household budget, explaining common core math (which if my son's homework is any indication, I also may need help here).

This also spawned a larger conversation here about whether or not we have programming that may interest the Community at large, especially our parishioners at our churches. An example of this would be the free family educational day at the National Industrial Museum, sponsored by BAM that was offered this year to all 6 of the Moravian Churches. Judging by the numbers of participants, it was a success and many individuals, who may not have otherwise attended this museum, were able to have access to its exhibits.

This internal educational programming is still a work in progress and it is our hope to have more to report next year.

## What does Real Estate Taxes, \$1,000,000, Ministry and BAM have in Common?

There is a misconception out there that Not-for-profits do not pay real estate taxes. And in some cases, this is true that many nonprofits are indeed real estate tax exempt. However, the BAM Organization is indeed a not-for-profit and still pays a significant amount of real estate taxes to the County, City and the School District.

In fact, the BAM Organization for the first time in its history has crossed the \$1,000,000 mark in taxes being paid to the Bethlehem School District. Now some will say that real estate taxes are not ministerial outreach, but I would beg to differ.

As an Organization, we have elected not to push for tax exemption as this would take money directly from education of the youth of Bethlehem, and that is something we do not want to do.

So what does our \$1,000,000 buy? \$1,000,000 buys the following:

Funds 15 full time teaching positions, or Buys 3,500 new chrome book laptops, or Funds between 8 to 10 school buses for the year.

Nobody likes paying taxes. But it is sort of nice to think the BAM Organization is responsible for funding an elementary school of teachers.

### **BAM Ministries Committee**

The BAM Board has continued its commitment to fund grass roots ministries via the BAM Ministries Committee. This past year, the Committee has supported mission works to Nepal, Cuba and Jamaica. We have funded the Bethlehem Emergency Shelter, supported a freezer ministry for homebound

individuals, and have sent numerous kids to summer camp.

The Ministries Committee's entire budget is funded through the donations of the Moravian Village of Bethlehem and we thank them for their continued support.

The donations of the Moravian Village and the Moravian Development Corporation (both BAM Entities) fund ministries and outreaches that probably would not be conducted without their financial support.

This past November, as a Committee, we talked about "dreaming bigger" and being a proactive Committee. What are the issues that the parishioners in our 6 Churches are struggling with and how can we help? With the focus of the ministry being right here in Bethlehem, can our two children entities, Moravian Village and Moravian Development Corporation support these endeavors? We look forward to the ideas from this Committee in the coming year.

#### **Honoring Dedicated Moravian Servants**

This past May, we had the profound honor to recognize Mark Parseghian Jr. by rededicating the Moravian Development Corporation's Senior Center in his name.

Mark has served the Moravian and larger Bethlehem Community for over 50 years. He was one of the initial founders of the Moravian Development Corporation and under his leadership; we constructed the Bethlehem Complex which is the foundation of the entire Organization.

As a lifelong Moravian, Mark was a very active member of Central Church holding various roles such as Sacristan, Trustee, Elder, Finance Chair and member of the Central's Candle makers.

The BAM Organization has been fortunate to have a leader like Mark and his stewardship and guidance over the years has contributed greatly to the overall success of BAM.

In June of this year, Moravian Village dedicated a new resident garden and patio area in honor of Esther McCandless.

Esther was the very first resident of Moravian Village, but more importantly, Esther served as the 1<sup>st</sup> Board President of the newly reconstituted Bethlehem Area Moravians.

Those first few years of operations for BAM were challenging to say the least. However, Esther as Board President, navigated the issues with compassion, determination and grace and set the foundation for all future operations.

#### **Recommitment to the Historic District**

If you have been in the Bethlehem Historic District, you will have noticed many BAM funded capital improvements and repairs.

This year, we have refurbished or replaced many of the shutters at the Bell and Sister's House. Working with Historic Bethlehem, we are also trying to make both buildings more period accurate by replacing many of the modern hinges with more period accurate replacements.

What started out as a God's Acre fence repair has turned into a full tear out and replacement of the entire fence and support posts surrounding the cemetery.

Unfortunately, there have been no meaningful major repairs to this fence in approximately 25 years. Consequently, for us to properly repair the fence, it required a full tear out.

We have completed 1 side of the fence repairs along the Moravian Academy side of the Cemetery and are hoping to finish the rest of the fence next year. This project was partially funded by an anonymous bequest and a commitment by the BAM Board of Directors.

With our Common Ground Partners, we have replaced/repaired much of the brickwork in the lower green space by Central Church and Mussleman's Jewelers. Over the years, the bricks had become uneven and posed a tripping hazard. By replacing this section of brickworks, we have improved the overall access of the greenspace. We thank the following Common Ground partners for their support in maintaining the grounds of such an important site: Central Church, Moravian Academy, Historic Bethlehem Partnership.

As you can see, we have been busy this year. Finally, I want to thank my Executive Staff: Tracy Patton (Executive Director of MVB) and Brad Senick (Bam Chief Operating Officer). They took my challenge of "being better" and ran with it. Many of the above successes are directly through their efforts and we thank them for all of their hard work.

On behalf of the Board of Directors of the Bethlehem Area Moravians, the Moravian Development Corporation and the Moravian Village of Bethlehem and the staff of these entities, we would like to wish you a Merry Christmas, a Happy Holiday Season and all the best in the coming year.

#### **BAM Almoners Fund**

The Almoners Fund is managed by Board Members elected by each of the six churches of the Bethlehem Area Moravians (BAM). The Board works quietly and confidentially to carry out the purpose of the Fund and responds to requests made by the pastors of the local congregations to assist members who are in temporary financial need.

The Board meets four times a year. Many of the requests presented to the Board were handled by telephone or email vote.

The Program which provides \$1,500 for each BAM congregation to assist the Pastors with requests for immediate financial assistance was continued again this year. These discretionary funds are administered by the pastors and are not to be used for the congregation's general or benevolence budgets. This program does not replace the current Almoners program, but supplements it. Requests for larger grants or short-term assistance are handled through the normal process.

During 2019, the Almoners expended a total of \$36,616.00 to assist seven individuals in financial need. Some were one-time grants, while others were for a set period of time. Of those assisted, five were from the Central Moravian congregation.

Financial gifts, no matter how large or small, are always welcome.

This year, we dispersed three hundred eight (308) bouquets within seven institutions and many homes, averaging 6 to 8 bouquets per Sunday. The Committee thanks each of you who have graciously assisted in this ministry.

## **Food Pantry**

The year 2019 was a year of continued service to the community. 120 households have been served on average, with a slight uptick in the past two months. We continue to pack bags for Moravian Houses and Holy Family Subsidized Housing units. Over the past year we served an average of 68 senior household units on the second Friday and fourth Thursday with canned food, cereal, rice, flour and baking supplies. We are also able to provide at least one piece of frozen meat and often fresh produce.

On the third Saturday we serve the food needs of the persons who have an income under 150% of the federal poverty scale. Currently that is \$18,735 for a single person ranging to \$65,145 for a family of 8. These policies are set by Second Harvest Food Bank in cooperation with State and Federal guidelines.

Occasionally persons call for food assistance. Much appreciation is extended to the office staff who assist persons with their emergency food needs. Special thank you to Cindy Gibson and Martha Jones who assist these persons by opening the food pantry when a volunteer is not available.

This year has been remarkable with additional food provided by members and friends of Central Moravian. Your generosity provided a total of 3784.8 pounds of essential food. Your donations are often items that are not regularly available from Second Harvest, such as coffee, tea, and various sauces. Since this food comes from a non-governmental source, we have the ability to provide food for anyone who needs it without asking income questions as required by Second Harvest.

Special thank you to the Sacristans who move the food from the doors of the church to the food pantry where our volunteers weigh and shelve the items donated. The Sacristans also donated two "red wagons" which are used to assist in moving the food to vehicles on the third Saturday, not to mention helping move food to the food pantry after the first Sunday of each month donations are collected. We also thank the youth who help shelve and move food as well, following "Red Wagon Sunday."

As community awareness increases surrounding the issue of hunger in the Lehigh Valley, we have experienced an increase in the amount of food we receive from non-governmental sources. These include

individuals and many organizations including the Scouts, Moravian Academy lower school, and various local businesses who donate food to the pantry. This year we received 3152.9 pounds of food from these generous sources.

Currently, we have a volunteer corps of 32 persons who typically serve for one to four hours one day a month. Many thanks to all who volunteer, this year we accumulated 695.25 hours of volunteer hours, an average of 57.94 hours per month. A group this size allows us to accomplish the tasks required which include: loading and unloading trucks and various personal vehicles, packing bags for subsidized senior housing units, hauling cardboard to the recycling center, sweeping and cleaning the refrigerator and freezer, as well as completing the paperwork, which we are required to maintain by State and Federal regulations.

We were inspected this year by Second Harvest and were found to be in complete compliance with their expectations.

If you might be interested in participating in this ministry, we would appreciate adding your name to our ever changing list. Each month all receive an email to describe opportunities in any given month. Training is available for all new volunteers, so all will be clear about our expectations So, if you feel a nudge in your soul to help, let us know by calling 610-730-1650. It is important to remember that we join with Cynthia's Boutique, whose ministry is to collect and distribute, free of charge, clothing to anyone who needs it. The clothing ministry and the food ministry are perfectly complimentary. We thank the volunteers of that significant ministry for their service to the less fortunate of our community.

Finally let me say THANK YOU to the members of Central Moravian Church who provide the facilities for these ministries to exist. Much of our mandate to serve comes from Matthew 25 where Jesus calls his followers to find needs in their community and do what they can to meet these needs. I believe that is what we are doing.

Linda Norris-Fiegel was selected as the new Putz Volunteer Coordinator in fall of 2019. Moss Gathering was held on Sunday, November 10, 2019, and coordinated by Will Schwab. Numerous crates of moss were collected this year. We received the beautiful trees in a timely manner.

Construction began on Sunday, November 17, 2019, with a dedicated crew. Signs to guide the way were put out by Terry Worrich. Construction continued until finished on November 24, 2019. The 2019 Putz opened on Friday, November 29<sup>th</sup>, 2019, at 1:00 p.m. with Beth Boyer as presenter and Rosi McIlwain with Gary Fiegel as greeters. Attendance was steady for the entire first weekend and throughout the month with only one day (December 1<sup>st</sup>, 2019) having to be canceled due to ice and snow conditions. Approx. 50 members of Central Moravian Church signed up and volunteered to be either a Presenter or a Greeter during sometimes 3-5 shift days. There were no, "no-shows" and I commend all of the volunteers and Cindy Gibson for being incredibly helpful and kind to me in my

rookie year...truly heartfelt gratitude for their patience and understanding as I learned the ropes. The former coordinator Barbara Nelson was gracious enough to send me all the information needed to get my head around the job responsibilities as Hopeton and Cindy held my hand, so-to-speak, during the entire season. After a bit of a rough start to the Sign-Up-Genius website due to what I'll call a "learning curve", I was able to set up and have most of the volunteers use the Sign-Up-Genius themselves, which allows them to get email reminders automatically. Others returned my calls promptly, signing up via the direct phone calls with me. I was able to use Sign-Up-Genius to send messages/pleas throughout the season.

Our highest count of attendance for one day tied Saturday, Dec 21 and Sunday, Dec 22, 2019, at 226 each day with Saturday, Dec 14<sup>th</sup>, 2019 a close second at 217. Our lowest day was Dec. 30, 2019, at 32.

Donations from the donation box totaled \$2,802

The vast majority of visitors were from the Greater Lehigh Valley. Many of them brought guests from out of the area. Nearly every region of PA and NJ were represented. Roughly, 25 states and 9 foreign countries were represented. Visitors came from other Moravian locations, such as Winston Salem and Lititz. Here are the areas we had visitors from: Similar to in the past years we had visitors from AL, AK, AZ, CT, DC, DE, FL, GA, MD, NC (Winston Salem), NH, NJ, NY, OH, OR, PA (Lehigh Valley and Philadelphia region), RI, SC, TX, VA, VT, WI, WA. Germany, Canada, United Kingdom, Korea were a few international guests. Many visitors from outside the area came as children and wanted to relive the tradition with their own families. The signs proved helpful for guests who didn't know in advance of The Putz presentation, but drew their interest while visiting Bethlehem.

Mere words cannot express how truly grateful I am to our volunteers. The success of The Putz is due to the good nature of these wonderful, generous and kind people. A true honor to have served with you all (and I hope to connect faces to names throughout time and thank you in person).
