New and Renewed Leadership

Judy Williams joyfully shares with us some "wonderful news"! The Fair-Trade coffee and chocolate ministry will be returning soon with new leadership, and many of the same delicious products. We are extremely grateful to Central member Beth Davis for her great leadership during the past years. We look forward to enjoying this ministry again in the next few weeks.

The Annual Church Council of Central Moravian Church convened in the church sanctuary on Sunday, January 29, 2023. We were called to order at 12:37 p.m. and adjourned at 1:37 p.m. We received reports for a wide range of boards, committees, and ministry and mission activities in the church and community. We also accepted the financial statement for 2022 and approved the proposed budget for 2023.

Four delegates were elected to represent Central Moravian Church at the provincial synod scheduled for June 22-25, 2023, on the campus of Moravian University. They are: Karen Brady, Brenda Hoelman, Becky Lepore and Bob Wascura.

Anne Zug was elected as an Elder and Jeff Biro was elected as a Trustee. Both terms are for three years with the option of serving a second consecutive term.

The Joint Board met for a reorganization session on Sunday afternoon, February 5. The following officers were elected (or re-elected) to serve as leaders of the respective boards.

Lenten Dinners and Programs Continue

March 1: After sharing a meal in the Christian Education building, lower level, we will learn from Br. Micah Sadigh. His topic is "Spirituality as A Source of Meaning and an Instrument for Healing." His presentation will introduce the Cloud of Unknowing, contemplative prayer, the meaning of healing.

March 8, 15, and 22 we will have various presenters, including Pastor Maggie Wellert. We will move into the meaning of Lent, the significance of prayer as part of our Lenten devotion, and share in some older prayer practices.

We will experience the practice of contemplative prayer, as introduced by Brother Micah, and share in devotional ways of engaging with Scripture readings, either individually or in small groups. This will include guided imagery—imagining yourself in a story, and what you learn from that experience.

We will also work with an African Bible Study method from the Anglican Church, a variation of the monastery practice of "lectio divina," holy reading.

On the last evening of the series, March 29, after we break bread together, we will close our time with a Contemplative Worship in the Old Chapel. Cars will be available to help you get from Nitschmann Hall to the Chapel, if that walk is too challenging.

The invitation of "Create Deep in Me," is to expand our heart relationship with God, to notice a closer connection, and share in God's deepening Presence in life. Feel free to join us for any or all of these Midweek Lenten services

Dreaming of a Green Lent...

Lent is approaching, and many of us 'of a certain age' may remember 'giving up something for Lent'...like chocolate, or certain TV shows, or fighting with our siblings. This year, the Care for Creation Committee has focused on plastic. It is everywhere! We continue to work on the TREX Plastic Recycling Challenge, but we wanted to do more. How can we encourage our families, our neighbors, etc. to reduce the amount of plastic that comes into our homes, reuse plastic items when possible, and recycle as much as we can, so that the amount going to landfills, our waterways and roadsides is negligible? Thus, our attempt to Give Up Plastic for Lent!! Unrealistic, you say? Maybe, but even small, individual efforts can make a difference over time. As A. J. Jacobs, a writer for the New York Times wrote recently in his article, Trying to live a day without plastic, "It's not about perfection – it's about progress:" "It's not about plastic being the enemy. It's about single-use as the enemy. It's the culture of using something once and throwing it away." We can all do better. So, Care for Creation is asking our congregation and friends to try.

Each week during Lent, we will post several suggestions in Wednesday's *Constant Contact* email, to help you reduce, reuse or recycle plastic. We ask that you select one or two ideas each week, and try to incorporate those ideas into your routine.

We CAN be better stewards of the earth...one small step at a time. Let's make this a Green Lent!

Here are 5 ideas to get you started:

- Consider switching to detergent strips for doing the laundry.
 They're packaged in cardboard boxes instead of large plastic jugs. They cut down on waste, plastic packaging and shipping costs. Many local stores (e.g. Giant, Wegmans, etc.) now carry these products. Or check out the Amazon or TruEarth websites.
- Switch from plastic bottles of liquid soap to bar soap. And consider trying shampoo in bars (like soap bars) rather than plastic bottles of shampoo.
- When you have a choice, select items in glass bottles rather than plastic (spaghetti sauce, jam, ketchup, mustard, etc.).
 And reuse those bottles when they're empty (leftovers? Screws? Safety pins?)
- Try beeswax food wraps. They're recyclable and biodegradable!
- Take your own mesh or net bags to the grocery for produce purchases.

Ending of AmazonSmile

We received notification of the ending of AmazonSmile by February 20, 2023. A portion of their letter is shown here.

In 2013, we launched AmazonSmile to make it easier for customers to support their favorite charities. However, after almost a decade, the program has not grown to create the impact that we had originally hoped. With so many eligible organizations—more than 1 million globally—our ability to have an impact was often spread too thin.

We are writing to let you know that we plan to wind down AmazonSmile by February 20, 2023. We will continue to pursue and invest in other areas where we've seen we can make meaningful change—from building affordable housing to providing access to computer science education for students in underserved communities to using our logistics infrastructure and technology to assist broad communities impacted by natural disasters.

To help charities that have been a part of the AmazonSmile program with this transition, we will be providing them with a one-time donation equivalent to three months of what they earned in 2022 through the program, and they will also be able to accrue additional donations until the program officially closes in February.

Central Moravian Church appreciates the shopping and smiling that has been done in our name. We will notify you of other opportunities to shop and benefit Central.

A Sacred Circle

Just about four years ago a wondrous group of volunteers from Central began meeting with me in the practice of Group Spiritual Direction. It was part of my Seminary training to complete a certificate in Spiritual Direction. We first met in February of 2020...we may have gotten in two meetings before the Covid shutdown prevented meeting in person.

Of the original six members, three were willing to meet with me via Zoom. We met monthly for about an hour and a half. The only instructions for our time together were simple: no analyzing, fixing, judging or recommending. This is a spiritual practice of holy listening.

Four years later, the four of us are still meeting, on Zoom, the second Friday of each month, from 3:30 - 5:00 p.m. Our commitment to one another is show up, listen, reflect, and pray for each other between gatherings.

"Our group is a place where I feel safe & welcome to be myself - who I am & speak the way I feel. It has enabled me to learn to try to forgive those who don't treat me with value & respect, thus enabling me to be a better Christian & to practice God's will here on earth. I try to spread his love to others & enjoy doing it."

Each person has time to share something that is stirring in their own heart, whether it be simple, profound, upsetting, or filled with joy. We reflect on the work of God, or the presence of the Spirit, in the words we've heard. We often have to remind ourselves, "no fixing!" Some stories stir up lots of laughter. Others bring tears. Always, we build up this tiny community of four sisters and brothers, seeking to know one another more deeply, and share in the beauty of being siblings... family...centered in the presence of the Christ.



When we met that very first time, I asked folks what their hopes were. The answer: to practice faith more deeply, knowing church family beyond superficial conversation, delving more fully into the struggle of following Jesus—doing that hard work together.

"It's a place where I can come just as I am, share honestly where I'm at and what I am feeling without it being shared elsewhere, and not be told what I should be doing, and yet receive loving support." Sometimes the church calls this Small Group Ministry. My heart calls it Sacred Circle, holy listening in a holy space, growing in Love for God and Love for Neighbor.

Borrowing from a childhood hymn, another group member shared: "Through the joys and terrors of life as it is, not as it might be, or should be, this group gives me a solid grounding in life as I live it, knowing that there are folk just like me. Other folks that are struggling to be saints of God, just like me."

Our Moravian heritage is grounded in group conversation, study, and prayer, as experienced in the Choirs of the 18th century. Those of us engaged in this "holy listening and reflecting" are grateful to share in a 21st century expression.

World Heritage Nomination

As many of you are aware, the United States Department of the Interior has named Historic Moravian Bethlehem as its 2023 nominee for World Heritage status. We still have several stages remaining in this process moving toward designation as a single multi-country historic Moravian Church Settlement site, along with Gracehill (Northern Ireland, United Kingdom) and Herrnhut (Germany), and joining Christiansfeld (Denmark). Special thanks to Charlene Donchez Mowers for her tireless efforts for over two decades, and to Hank Barnette, Mayor Robert Donchez, and Mayor J. William Reynolds for their effective leadership. Pastor Hopeton has been serving on the Bethlehem World Heritage Commission since its inception in 2017. It should be noted that the earliest timeline for inscription as a World Heritage Site is 2024.

Special March Offering Envelopes

Moravian Unity Offering (March 5): This year, Moravians across the world will join together to support a new worldwide effort to develop a Moravian Unity Disaster Relief Fund. Established at the 2016 Unity Synod (and delayed in rollout due to Covid), this offering is designed to kickstart the fundraising efforts for this important fund. The purpose is to be able to respond quickly to disasters around the Unity with funds that are available for speedy disbursement. The goal to start is \$500,000.
