Moravian Church Settlement Site Nominated to the World Heritage List

On February 1, 2023, J. William Reynolds, Mayor of Bethlehem and Chair of the Bethlehem World Heritage Commission, along with representatives of the Bethlehem Area Moravians, Central Moravian Church, Historic Bethlehem Museums & Sites, Moravian University, and Northampton County, confirmed that the U.S. Department of the Interior has submitted a multi-country nomination to the World Heritage List representing world-wide Moravian Church Settlements. The nomination includes Bethlehem, Herrnhut, Germany, and Gracehill, Northern Ireland/United Kingdom. It is proposed that they will join Christiansfeld, Denmark, which became a World Heritage Site in 2015, to form a single Moravian Church Settlement Site. This is the first ever multi-national nomination for the United States.

The City of Bethlehem is extraordinarily honored for the support of our World Heritage nomination by the Department of Interior and the United States Government. We are excited for the next phase of the nomination process on our path to becoming a World Heritage Site.

To understand the process, challenges, and rewards of becoming a World Heritage Site, we have turned to two individuals closely connected with Central Church who have been exemplary leaders in the progress toward World Heritage designation—Charlene Donchez Mowers and Hank Barnette. Both are members of the Bethlehem World Heritage Commission and the Bethlehem World Heritage Council. Charlene is Senior Advisor and Historian and Hank is Vice Chair. Both Charlene and Hank generously provided commentary for this article which follows.

Hank Barnette: World Heritage Sites are cultural or natural sites considered to be of outstanding universal value which have been Inscribed on the World Heritage List by the World Heritage Committee. World Heritage is provided through an international treaty to which the United States, and more than 190 other countries are parties. A World Heritage Site is considered a landmark area with legal protections coordinated by the United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization, UNESCO, located in Paris, France.

There are six basic actions required to become a World Heritage Site: (1) to be placed on the Tentative List of the country where it is located; (2) to be nominated by the country that has placed it on the Tentative List; (3) to be evaluated by a professional organization that advises the World Heritage Committee; (4) to be selected by the World Heritage Commit-

tee; (5) to be inscribed as a World Heritage Site; and (6) to then become operational as a Site. If approved, Moravian Church Settlements would join such locations as the Taj Mahal and the Eiffel Tower. There are only 24 Sites in the United States including the Statue of Liberty, Yellowstone National Park, and Independence Hall.

Charlene Donchez Mowers: In the summer of 2002, representatives from the International Council on Monuments and Sites (ICOMOS), the International Centre for the Study of the Preservation and Restoration of Cultural Property (ICCROM), Harvard University, and the historic Moravian Church settlement of Christiansfeld, Denmark visited Bethlehem. They were eager to see our historic 1700s Moravian Church settlement (the buildings along Church Street and in the Colonial Industrial Quarter) and to ask if Bethlehem would be interested in working with them and other 18th-century Moravian communities to gain recognition for Moravian heritage around the world.

Christiansfeld invited representatives of six historic Moravian communities to participate in the first International Moravian Heritage Network Conference. I was then serving as President of Historic Bethlehem Museums & Sites (HBMS), and I was asked by Mayor Don Cunningham and Reverend Doug Caldwell, Senior Pastor of Central Moravian Church, to represent Bethlehem at the conference. In March 2003, participants from Denmark, Germany, the Netherlands, South Africa, the United Kingdom, the United States, ICOMOS, and ICCROM gathered in Christiansfeld, recognized the similarities in our Moravian cultural and architectural heritage, and agreed to work together to promote and preserve that heritage.

The second conference was held in Bethlehem in November 2004, with the support of various Moravian entities, HBMS, the City of Bethlehem, and others. We were happy to welcome participants from the first conference who had now become friends and colleagues. As a result of our deliberations, we all agreed to work with our governments to seek placement on our respective Tentative Lists, a required first step in the process for nomination to World Heritage. Unfortunately, the U.S. Tentative List was closed at that time. South Africa hosted the third conference in 2006 with visits to their two historic Moravian communities of Elim and Genadendahl. In 2007, Gracehill, Northern Ireland/UK hosted the fourth conference. By this time, only Christiansfeld had been able to secure placement on the Danish Tentative List.

In 2008, the U.S. Tentative List opened after being closed for 17 years and only remained open for three

months. To be placed on the List, the cultural site had to be a National Historic Landmark or National Historic Landmark District. We fortunately had two National Historic Landmarks—the 1741 Gemeinhaus and the 1762 Waterworks, America’s first pumped municipal water system. I quickly and carefully gathered the necessary research materials and submitted the nomination document. When the response came back several months later, we were to be listed as “pending” on the U.S. Tentative List and the List was closed again for approximately 10 years.

The recommendation from the National Park Service was critically important: apply to the NPS Landmarks Office to become a National Historic Landmark District, encompassing all the original 1700s Moravian structures to create an Historic Moravian Bethlehem District which would present a stronger case. Working with the Bethlehem Area Moravians, City of Bethlehem, Central Moravian Church, HBMS, the Moravian Archives, and Moravian University, I prepared the documentation needed and shipped boxes of supporting materials to Washington, D.C. Over the next three years, multiple trips were made to D.C. and NPS historians from D.C. visited Bethlehem to prepare for a crucial presentation to the President’s Advisory Council, which would make the final decision on Landmark District status for Bethlehem. In 2012, the U.S. Secretary of the Interior announced that Historic Moravian Bethlehem would be designated a National Historic Landmark District—today, one of only eight such Districts in Pennsylvania. The official plaque is affixed to the brick wall in front of Central Moravian Church along Main Street.

In 2015, Christiansfeld, Denmark was inscribed on the World Heritage List as the first Moravian Church settlement to receive this prestigious honor. In 2016, the U.S. Tentative List re-opened once again. A Federal Interagency Panel in Washington reviewed all the possible sites that could be deemed worthy of placement on the U.S. Tentative List. Just a few days before the 275th anniversary of the naming of Bethlehem on Christmas Eve 1741, we received the congratulatory message that we made it and would be added to the Tentative List in 2017. However, there were now 19 sites on the U.S. Tentative List and a country can only name one site to the World Heritage List each year.

Hank Barnette: When Bethlehem was placed on the United States Tentative List in 2017, Bethlehem Mayor Bob Donchez and community leaders decided to provide additional support by establishing the Bethlehem World Heritage Commission and the Bethlehem World Heritage Council. The current Chair of the Commission and the Council is Mayor J. William Reynolds, the Vice Chair is Hank Barnette, and the Senior Advisor and Historian is Charlene Donchez Mowers. The Commission

Members are leaders in government, business, education, and nonprofits. The Council Members (who are also Commission Members) are the owners of the 10-acre area that is the Site: the City of Bethlehem, Bethlehem Area Moravians, and Moravian University; lessees of parts of the Site: Central Moravian Church and HBMS; and Northampton County. Mayor Reynolds, Dan Soos, Bryon Grigsby, Hopeton Clennon, LoriAnn Wukitsch, and County Executive, Lamont McClure, represent Members of Council and the Commission, which are voluntary associations with the purpose of helping Bethlehem achieve Inscription as a World Heritage Site.

The United States World Heritage activities are coordinated through the Chief, Office of International Affairs, National Park Service, Mr. Stephen Morris. Bethlehem has been provided excellent advice throughout the World Heritage process by Mr. Morris, and we are very appreciative of his guidance and support.

After Christiansfeld was Inscribed in 2015, discussions continued among the Moravian Church Settlements. When Bethlehem was named to the Tentative List, the United States indicated that it was willing to consider a possible Transnational Nomination of Bethlehem, Herrnhut, and Gracehill, to join Christiansfeld. At a meeting held in Bethlehem in 2021, representatives of the four Sites reviewed and signed a Voluntary Association Agreement to work together for World Heritage recognition. A Transnational Working Group was formed, and meetings of that Group have been held on a regular basis and will continue. Mayor Reynolds, Hank, and Charlene Represent Bethlehem. The Group has the advice of Mr. Barry Gamble, a resident of the United Kingdom, who is a highly regarded and experienced World Heritage Consultant.

Working together, the Group developed the nomination document for consideration by their respective governments, and in 2023 the United States, Germany, the United Kingdom/Northern Ireland, and Denmark, nominated the Moravian Church Settlements. The nomination document will be available to the public online soon. The evaluation of the nomination has now begun for the World Heritage Committee by ICOMOS which will continue through 2023, with its report for consideration by the Committee in 2024. If Bethlehem and the other Sites are selected, then Inscription and operation as a Site would follow. Members of the Bethlehem World Heritage Commission and the Bethlehem World Heritage Council meet regularly which will continue if Bethlehem is Inscribed.

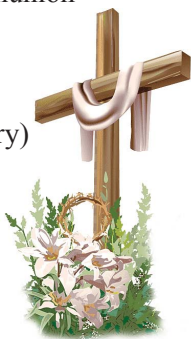
