Moravian Young Adult Convo

“Brazen and Blazin’ ...Being Bohemian in 2023”

Five members of Central Moravian Church participated in Convo 2023. Sister Faith Fiegel submitted the following report.

Our Convo 2023 trip throughout the Czech Republic and Germany was an opportunity to explore our Moravian heritage and beginnings, as well as discover the parallels between what the church was and what the church is. Over 50 young adults, including myself, had the gift of walking in the footsteps of those who came before us and we were able to discuss how we are moving forward to be the change we wish to see.

My personal experience on this trip was full of making friends, laughter, learning day after day about our Moravian history with its impact on the world, and participating in active discussions about what the church means to us now and how we want to impact generations to come within our community.



Specifically in the Czech Republic, we had the opportunity to explore Prague, and then we went to the outskirts, including Usti Kunvald and Nova Packa. While in Prague, we got to learn about John Hus, many who followed in his footsteps, and just how brave they were to create their own path, even though the world around them discouraged it. The countryside provided a window for us to see how the mission work is happening now between schools that are being built and businesses getting off the ground. We also saw firsthand how the church provides support for all communities, including refugees from Ukraine. A personal favorite memory of mine was celebrating holy communion under the Linden tree, as Bishop Sam Gray led us in a sermon I will never forget.

We made our way to Herrnhut, Germany, and I was amazed to see the parallels between Herrnhut and Bethlehem. It was a beautiful place for solitude and reflection.

We were gifted with opportunities, including an improv youth theater night where we traced the steps of the leaders we had learned about, sang hymns in German on a beautiful sun-filled Sunday morning, toured Gods Acre, and Count Zinzendorf’s Manor.

We shared holy communion every day together. We shared our vulnerabilities, our perceived uncertainties, and our hopes and dreams.

For me, I gained an unprecedented amount of education and clarity which is only going to enhance my walk of faith with our Moravian community. I also made friends for life from Jamaica, North Carolina, and Canada.

It is immensely difficult to find words to express my gratitude to Central and our community for making it possible for me to have this life-changing experience.

My heart and spirit are forever changed and grateful. Thank you to everyone who supported and facilitated this exploration. Our church on an international scale is filled with motivated spirits who want to contribute to something bigger than ourselves. And the good news is, thanks to this adventure, we have already begun. Thank you for allowing me to share in this experience.

Join Us for Candle-Making

Beeswax Candle-Making for our 2023 Christmas season activities will commence this fall on Tuesday, September 5 and repeat on Tuesday the 12th, Tuesday the 19th, and possibly Tuesday the 26th. Production begins at 9:00 a.m. and ends about noon, with a coffee and donut break around 10:30. We meet in the basement of the Central Moravian Church main office at 73 W. Church Street. Parking is available in the parking lot at the rear of the building.



We welcome all old hands and encourage newcomers to this fun and enlightening activity. Training for the uninitiated will be provided as even we "Old Timers" require some re-training in this annual mass-production of hand-made candles.

An overview of the process may help in deciding to participate. In the wick preparation room, wooden wick bars are cleaned and fitted with measured strings of wick. These are then taken next door, to the "hot shop", where molds (12 candles to a mold) are strung, and wax is poured. These cool rather quickly, allowing the candles to be removed and hung to dry. The used wooden wick bars are then returned to the wick preparation room and the process repeats. There are many and varied jobs to choose from. We will pour between 2,500 and 3,500 candles each Tuesday.

We look forward to the sounds, smells, friendships, coffee and doughnuts, that are all part of our annual candle-making. We hope that you will consider being a part of it.

2023 Synod of the Northern Province of the Moravian Church in America

Every four years, delegates from each of our Northern Province churches and agencies come together for synod, the legislative meeting at which we elect the members of our Provincial Elders Conference, elect Bishops, and pass legislation that sets goals for the province. This NP Synod was supposed to be held last year, but due to COVID, the Synod was held from Thursday, June 22 until Sunday evening, June 25, 2023, on the campus of Moravian University. The next Northern Provincial Synod will be held in 2026, and the Western, Canadian, and Eastern districts that comprise the Northern Province will hold their respective district synods in 2024.

The theme of this Provincial Synod was “For the Healing of the World”. Meaningful daily worship experiences were themed within the movements of Holy Communion: Gather, Remember, Partake, Go.

Highlights of this 2023 Synod of the Northern Province of the Moravian Church in America included:

- The Rev. David E. Bennett was elected to serve as President of the Provincial Elders’ Conference for the next intersynodal period (2023-2026). Deep gratitude was expressed to Rev. Betsy Miller for her 13 years of outstanding service as President of the PEC.
- The Rev. Dr. Amy Gohdes-Luhman and the Rev. Dr. Michael Johnson were elected to serve as Bishops of the Worldwide Moravian Unity.
- A full communion relationship between the Moravian Church Northern Province, the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada, and the Anglican Church of Canada was unanimously approved by all three denominations.
- Ecumenical partners from The United Church of Los Alamos, Churches for Middle East Peace, the United Methodist Church, the Episcopal Church, and the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America were celebrated.
- Each of the Synod delegates (there were over 200 delegates) was assigned to serve on one of the 13 different committees that diligently worked to prepare proposals for the Synod floor.
- Resolutions passed included such topics as:
 - Support of church planting and emerging ministries such as the local Essentials Café located at 418 Third Avenue in Bethlehem
 - Congregational and lay leadership was affirmed and encouraged as continued church-wide efforts seek creative solutions for congregational leadership amidst our denomination’s shortage of ordained clergy
 - Christians against Christian Nationalism
 - Combatting white supremacy
 - Call for LGBTQIA+ justice and healing
 - Call for Mental Health awareness and response to the crisis
 - Call for faithful action to end gun violence
 - Support for families seeking refuge and asylum in the United States
 - Anti-semitism and Jewish relations
 - Mass Incarceration and Legal System reform
 - Call for reconciliation and healing with indigenous peoples
 - Commitment to the Work of Racial Justice and Healing
 - Book of Order Changes
 - Ratio of Lay to Clergy Delegates
 - Spiritual Companionship
 - Giving Voice and Vote to Youth Delegates
 - Celebrating the Holy Spirit as Mother
 - Support for the Care and Healing of God’s Creation

It’s nearly impossible to summarize four days of learning, listening, discussing, discerning, praying, voting, and worshipping a God that loves us extravagantly, and requires us “to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God.” (Micah 6:8) However, the Moravian Church Northern Province provides a portal on their website where one can find documents from this and previous District and Provincial Synods. Representing our church as a delegate was a humbling and joy-filled experience. We will be sharing more details about and personal perspectives in upcoming church communications.

The Debt Jubilee Project

The Debt Jubilee Project: For the Healing of the World is a collaborative effort of the Board of World Mission, the Commission on Congregational Development, the Moravian Ministries Foundation in America, and the Interprovincial Board of Communication.

Based on our biblical call to care for the sick and our belief that healthcare is a fundamental human right, this project offers hope through the forgiveness of medical debt. Because our call is to our siblings in Christ throughout the world, this project will forgive medical debt in the United States as well as at the Moravian medical ministry of the Clínica Evangélica Morava in Ahuas, Honduras.

The recent 2023 Synod of the Northern Province passed a resolution to join the recent work of Moravian congregations such as Trinity in Winston-Salem, which raised about \$15,000 earlier this year to forgive over \$3,000,000 in medical debt. *The Debt Jubilee Project: For the Healing of the World* provides more Moravians the opportunity to join this life-changing initiative.

The Synod's goal is to raise \$50,000 in 50 days with the project concluding on August 13. 75% of gifts supports the elimination of medical debt in the U.S. through a partnership with RIP Medical Debt, an organization that purchases medical debt for pennies on the dollar and erases that debt, which would otherwise have been sold to for-profit debt collectors. 25% of gifts buys debt owed by patients of the Clínica Evangélica Morava which has been serving the remote area of La Mosquitia in Honduras for over 75 years. We hope you will consider participating in this worthy ministry.

Sacred Ground Preview Session August 7 Here's What Recent Participants Learned

Concerned about race relations? Want to learn more? Join the *Sacred Ground* study group to be held online via Zoom beginning August 28th. Sessions are on Mondays either 1:30-2:30 p.m. or 7 – 8:30 p.m. The first phase will end November 20 and then the final sessions are January 8 to February 12, 2024. You can get a better understanding of how Sacred Ground works by attending a preview session on Zoom August 7 at either 1:30-2:30 in the afternoon or 7-8 p.m. that night.

I have studied, written, and taught about racial justice in the U.S. for several decades. I find *Sacred Ground* to be especially compelling because of the videos as well as the readings and because of the insights each of the participants offer during our dialogue circles.

The Rev. Sue Koenig explains in more detail. “Sacred Ground is holy ground where people discern together what God’s love and the doing of justice requires of us. It is an excellent series with a broad curriculum on issues of race and racism, and I highly recommend it. It is both difficult and rewarding, demanding and transformative. Wherever you are on the labyrinth towards racial justice and healing, whether you are just beginning the journey, or have traveled a distance, you will learn much from being part of Sacred Ground.”

For example, Steven Krawiec, one of the participants in the last session shared some of what he learned. “The piece of information that was absolutely new to me was THE DOCTRINE OF DISCOVERY (and related declarations)” he noted. “I had long wondered by what authority European explorers could claim lands on which they embarked to be the possession of the sponsors of their voyages... Sacred Ground revealed this perspective that became pervasive during the ages of exploration.”

Sue Koenig concurs. “I have been profoundly touched and transformed by the relationships I formed with those in my dialogue circles and with other leaders in Sacred Ground.” Besides encountering “the horrific injustices against people of color in our nation’s history and... how those injustices continue today as powers and principalities that maintain racial inequities” she points out that “We also heard hopeful stories of those who are working for God’s justice and

bringing change. I learned how much I have to learn, and I was humbled by the courage and commitment of each person who brought their experiences, perspectives, pain, and longings, and their gifts, to courageously walk the Sacred Ground labyrinth toward racial justice and healing.”

Green Weekly Texts for August

- Use paper towels made from bamboo, instead of regular paper towels. While they cost a bit more, they can be washed and reused many times.
- Take showers instead of baths. A shower of 7 minutes or less under a 2-gallon/minute low-flow showerhead is more water and energy efficient than taking a bath in a tubful of water.
- Save old toothbrushes for scrubbing dirt and stains out of hard-to-reach places.
- Do not place furniture on top of heating and cooling vents. This can block or restrict air flow, making your heating and air conditioning systems work harder.
