College, and their daughter, Sophie, entering the seventh grade at Moravian Academy.

The Rev. Janel Rice will serve as Pastor of Congregational Care and Community Outreach. Having previously served at Central for 10 years (2005-2015), she returns to our pastoral team, serving alongside the Rt. Rev. Hopeton Clennon, Senior Pastor.

Sister Janel is a 2000 graduate of Ursinus College where she earned a Bachelor of Science in Chemistry with minors in Philosophy/Religion and Politics. Sister Janel earned a Master of Divinity from Harvard Divinity School in 2003, followed by a Certificate of Ministry from Moravian Theological Seminary in 2005.

Sister Janel's involvement in the church and community includes her work with the Eastern District's Church and Society Committee and the Lehigh Conferences of Churches Ecumenical Committee. She recently rotated off the Lehigh Conference of Churches Board of Directors having served as its President and also chair of the Executive Director Search Committee. In past years, Sister Janel was a member of the Moravian Episcopal Coordinating Committee and the Moravian King's Daughters Home Board of Directors.

In her own words, Sister Janel exclaims, "Joyfully Grateful. That is how I would describe where I am after announcing my acceptance of a call to serve at Central. I am grateful to God's guidance through this process and in my life. I am grateful for the congregation of Calvary Moravian in Allentown, who have loved me and helped me grow as a leader these past eight years. I am grateful for Central's leadership in working with me through this call and having confidence in the gifts I can bring. I am grateful to my family, especially my husband Christian, for his ever-wise counsel. With great joy, I look forward to joining you all on September 24th and ministering with you in the years to come. You all are doing so many incredible ministries, and I can't wait to learn more about being a part of Central's drive for sharing and living God's love in our world."

"When is someone going to contact me or send me a pledge card?" This is the question I hear the most often. Let me address this question and give a brief update on the campaign and project.

Currents, the title for our 2023 Capital Campaign, has been quietly underway. The title reflects several aspects of our project. The need to maintain comfort in our Sanctuary is met by a current state of the art technology using an electric current heat pump system, referred to as a Variable Refrigerant Flow, or VRF. A second improvement is to better air quality to current standards by bringing a flow of fresh air into this historic space. This is a significant need discovered during the pandemic. Fresh air currents needed. And the system responds to the current call to consider both climate and air quality for the future by reducing dependency on fossil fuels. In short, comfort today; care for tomorrow's generations!

The congregation is fortunate to have volunteers to lead the campaign which include Jennifer Ceneviva, currently a Trustee, who has skillfully led the Planning Committee from the infancy of this campaign coordinating with Lee Williamson, our adviser. Jennifer also serves on Central's Investment and Stewardship Committees. Tom Tenges, capital campaign veteran, former Facilities Manager, and current Buildings & Grounds Committee member. Tom has devoted many years of volunteering his loving care of this building and our church campus. Team member three, Barry Pell, needs little introduction after his many years of service to Central Moravian Church including choir member, current member of the Board of Trustees, Buildings & Grounds Committee, and President of Church Council in recent years. I join these esteemed church members to round out a quartet of leadership for the Currents Campaign.

Back to the first question, when is someone going to contact me for a pledge or donation? A congregational and community wide appeal will be launched on October 1, 2023. Our goal is to minimize administrative costs for the campaign, and therefore, print materials will be modest.

Who is invited to participate?

- Anyone who breathes the air in the Sanctuary,
- Anyone who enjoys the comfort of a service in a warm building in the winter and a cool space in the summer,
- Any Friends of the Congregation,
- Or former members who continue to support our church community,
- Those interested in preserving historic buildings,
- And those who value keeping them in use for current ministry,
- Community partners who use the space for functions and celebrations,
- Anyone who values caring for creation.

The list is incomplete, but a good start.

The HVAC work on the project continues, a bid has been selected, setting a process in motion with a goal of work completion for Spring/Summer 2024. Donations will be invested in an interest-bearing savings account at Moravian Ministries Foundation. Our payment cycle begins with the signing of the contract in September 2023. The need for contributions remains urgent, but we offer the option for multiple year gifts. Every donation helps.

Thank you to our Joint Board, Buildings & Grounds Committee, and all those who have already offered donations. The first donation came from a member living a distance away as soon as he heard about our project. If you are ready to participate today, we have pledge materials available at the church office. Please contact Martha Jones. If you would like to talk more about the project, contact me and I will be happy to arrange a meeting with a member of the leadership team. Otherwise, please look forward to the opportunity to pledge or give on or near October 1, 2023.

Bread for the World Campaign 2023

Every 5 years when the United States Farm Bill is renegotiated and reauthorized, Bread for the World's unique ability to educate and motivate legislators in Congress on both sides of the aisle takes on urgency. Authorization of the Farm Bill is a year-long process. The Farm Bill is perhaps the most significant piece of legislation for determining domestic and international hunger policy - including funding and policies for the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP).

SNAP is our nation's most important and effective anti-hunger program. It helps 1 out of 8 Americans put food on the table every single month. In 35 states, districts, and territories across the United States, the COVID-related increase in Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits that Congress authorized have just expired. The loss of these benefits comes at the worst possible time. Persistent inflation and food shortages have caused food prices to skyrocket across the country. Food pantries- already struggling with the current demand - won't be able to pickup the slack.

This is the focus of our postcards in 2023. We urge all members of the congregation to participate in sending these postcards to their legislative representatives. They will be distributed on September 17, 2023, at both services. We also will be asking all clients at our food pantry to participate.

Synod Minutes

The 2023 Synod of the Northern Province of the Moravian Church passed many resolutions submitted by the Church and Society Committee that support and advocate for action on social issues by the Provincial Elders' Conference (PEC), its clergy, and members.

Mental Health Awareness: The resolution urges members and congregations to take steps to address the current mental health crisis, loneliness, and isolation building, becoming knowledgeable about mental illness and helpful ways to respond; offering support and encouragement to those experiencing mental health concerns and crises and their families; and advocating for adequate and accessible mental health care.

Legal System Reform: The resolutions ask congregations to engage in:

- Conversations with local law enforcement departments about their practices around cultural competency, mental health training and community policing;
- Advocacy efforts at local, community, and national levels for legal system reform and reinvestment into community-based programs as alternatives to incarceration.

Racial Justice and Healing: The resolutions:

- Reaffirm the 2018 Synod resolutions on racism
- Support the creation of a provincial Director of Racial Justice and Healing to facilitate the further adoption of the 2018 Synod resolution on racism along with the Moravian Church Northern Province (MCNP) Racial Justice Team
- Direct the PEC to provide for ongoing anti racism, advocacy, organizing, and related trainings and experiences for clergy, lay pastors, and candidates for ordination;
- Direct the PEC and the MCNP Racial Justice Team to identify persons skilled in specialized justice work conflict and coaching a as resource for clergy and licensed lay pastors leading congregations in the work of racial justice and healing.

Individuals Seeking Refuge & Asylum: The resolutions:

- Support humane treatment of any person coming across our borders regardless of legal status.
- Advocate for humane policies at our borders, including, but not limited to, welcoming unaccompanied children, refusing to separate families, rejecting changes to child labor laws that endanger the lives of children, and continuing to reunite all children who have been separated from family members at the borders.
- Support those who, acting out of their faith and witness, provide sanctuary and asylum to those fleeing from persecution in their home lands.

Gun Violence: The resolutions affirm the call of The National Council of Churches of Christ USA and its member communions to:

- Use all of the resources available to put an end to widespread gun violence and mass shootings.
- To create safe spaces for victims and survivors of gun violence and mass shootings.
- To be attentive and offer a public witness and care to those who are susceptible to being perpetrators of gun violence and provide them with resources to help them choose a different path.
- To work with other religious and secular groups to find solutions to end gun violence and mass shootings.

The resolutions further encourage members of the Northern Province to not only affirm the right of United States citizens to keep and bear arms, but also advocate for responsible fire-arm legislation at the national, state, and local levels of government.

Antisemitism and Jewish-Christian Relations:


The resolutions, recognizing that language in scripture, liturgies, hymns and texts such as the Moravian Book of Worship and "readings for Holy Week may inadvertently be interpreted as anti-Semitic and maligning Jews:

- Ask for recommended changes or supplements to liturgical texts and worship materials by the PECs of both the Northern Province and the Southern Province that would lead to dismantling of antisemitism and anti-Jewish theology in proclamation and teaching.
- Ask for explanations by worship leaders of the background of scriptural texts that use the word "Jews" as they may be interpreted as anti-Semitic or contributing to anti-Jewish theology.
- Encourage congregations to build relationships with local Jewish organizations.

Resolutions of the 2023 Synod included new and expanding efforts in the areas of congregational leadership and organization and relationships with partners and organizations outside the church.

Youth Impact: In recognizing that youth are the future leaders of the church, the resolutions:

- Urge the creation by the PEC of a Provincial Youth Council composed of youth from each District, representatives at large, and adult mentors.
- Encourage the participation of youth in church ministries and on local church boards and committees.
- Direct the amendment of the Book of Order to extend the participation of youth delegates to synod to include voting rights.
