From the Pastor:

Birthdays have been on my mind lately. Most of our family's birthdays fall between March and July, and our recently reactivated Church Family Life committee is planning a Birthday Social on April 14th (*As an aside, this committee, which is gifted with planning parties, get-togethers and small group programs, would love to have some more members to help plan and work at events*).

However, I never thought of the early Moravian connection and importance of birthdays in the 18th and 19th century Moravian communities until I happened to look at the table of contents of "A Century of Moravian Sisters" and found an entire chapter dedicated to Birthdays. In what strikes me as a bit unusual for my stereotype of a pious and serious religious community of these earlier centuries, it turns out our Moravian ancestors loved to celebrate birthdays! The Daily Text was read at the breakfast table along with the Birthday Book, and those in the Moravian community who had a birthday were remembered and celebrated. The "Birthday child" was awakened to the sound of the Birthday Hymn outside their door, followed by simple gifts and flowers. Often the afternoon would follow with a private lovefeast for the birthday child or a celebration of some form. Lovefeasts, of course, involve some kind of delicious treat, and it has been widely noted that while Moravians can't claim to be the first to invent cake, we might be the reason that candles are placed on cakes today. In 1746, during a birthday festival in honor of our spiritual leader of the 18th century community, Count Zinzendorf, a large cake was made with lit candles representing each year of the Count's life. We thank the Count for this wonderful tradition in our birthday celebrations!

We continue to celebrate birthdays at Central, with our birthday card greeting ministry, and the publication of birthdays in *The Belfry* each month. Perhaps you can take a moment to pray for and wish each April "birthday child" a special blessing.

Celebrating birthdays should also remind us to celebrate each individual life as precious and gifted from God. It is significant to me to see the early Moravian community celebrate the individual gifts of a birthday child while still holding onto the ideal

of living together in community. Even as the common good was held as a central goal, the celebration and attention to the individual, through these birthday celebrations and remembrances, was important.



So ... whenever your birthday is, Happy Birthday, and consider joining us for a piece (or two) of cake on Sunday, April 14th at our Birthday Social and to meet others within your birthday month or even who might share your birthday. Who knows . . . maybe you can plan a birthday lovefeast together!

On Thursday, April 11 at DeSales University, the Robert K. Campbell Memorial Lecture Series takes place at 3 p.m., featuring Sue Pizor Yoder and Co.Lab.Inq. How are emerging generations making meaning in their lives? A team of 8 scholars and ministry leaders from across the denominational spectrum formed Co.Lab.Ing, a collective learning laboratory focused on open-ended inquiry, to explore this question. Together they interviewed over 200 people under 40 in search of the lessons they might teach us about belonging, adversity, legacy - and faith. Through collaborative storytelling conversations focused on truth-seeking and meaning-making, Sue Pizor Yoder and her co-authors Bonnie Bates, Brandon M. Heavner, Joanne P. Marchetto, Jill Peters, Stephen Simmons, Janet Stahl, and James Stahl identify the complex and varied

ways Millennials and Gen Z are navigating life and crafting their stories. What do younger Americans have to say about **Looking Ahead:** belonging? Where do they find meaning? What challenges are they facing--and how do they confront them? How do Celebration of our student pastor Josh Follweiler they envision their legacies? as he graduates from Moravian Theological Seminary (May 4) and preaches for us on May 5th.

Pizor Yoder and her colleagues were surprised to find that in addition to these questions, their conversation partners also wanted to talk about faith--even when they didn't identify with any religious tradition. Come and uncover with us both the critique and blessing we experienced for society and the church.

HVAC Project Update

Peak into our Sanctuary basement on a typical day and you may see old brown ducts being removed and new shiny ducts installed, about 40% complete. Parts of the large interior energy recovery ventilation units have been delivered to our site via a crane parked on Church Street and installation of the exterior heat pump condensers is in process within the Southside landscaping bed. All piping, part of the new variant refrigerant flow system, is stored on site. Future progress will include new pew-end supply-air grilles, installation of multiple heat pumps air handlers and, you guessed it, more ductwork.
