From the Pastor:

At the time of this writing, we are starting not one but two inquirers' classes which can lead to church membership; one as an in-person and one virtual to accommodate a growing desire of our virtual worshipping to learn more about Central. We hope to celebrate our new members either on May 5 or June 2, and we'll share more about them in the June Belfry. Beside the important features of learning about Moravian history, theology, and the ministries of Central, we hold these inquirers' classes with a group of people for an important reason. It reminds us, as Count Zinzendorf once said (and I paraphrase) Christianity is always rooted in community. These classes, and our time together in these new small groups, remind us about how our faith journeys connect us with others, and we learn about the power of collective faith and love in action.

Building upon this, one of our goals at Central is to provide more community gathering opportunities for people who do live at-large or are not able to attend worship at Central. We hope to offer more virtual ministry and education opportunities by the fall. We remain so grateful to the gifts of Will Schwab and our digital ministry team in making the blessing of our livestream worship possible.

Yet we also realize the importance and value of gathering our community in person, whenever possible. We are creatures built for community, and it is through gatherings with others that we practice the faith we profess. We learn about each other and experience the blessings of connecting across generations, often with people who are different from us and expand our perspectives. We grow richer with the blessings, input, and insights of others.

Our community is a treasured gift of our faith, and the effects of isolation and different ways of living from the pandemic, or other changes in life, has challenged this. Yet I still believe that we are built for community, and one of my primary goals as your pastor is to invite you back to community if possible and create ways that we can connect with each other. In the month of April, I'll be making some phone calls to check in with many of our members, especially those who I haven't been able to connect with since returning in September.

In May I've set up a series of Community Conversations and ask that you would consider picking one date and time for this 1 hour gathering (some are virtual if needed, but most are in-person). We'll keep each gathering to about 10 people, and have the opportunity to check in with each other especially after the loss of Pastor Hopeton, and hear about opportunities and updates for ministry, education and service at Central. Most importantly is that I will come to listen, connect or reconnect to you. Please take just one hour of your day and devote it to building community and furthering this community of Central Moravian Church.

Reverend Janel Rice, Senior Pastor of Central Moravian Church

Rev. Janel Rice began her role as Senior Pastor officially on April 8, 2024. Her Installation Service and Reception will occur at the 10 a.m. service on June 23, with Melissa Johnson, President of the Eastern District of the Moravian Church, joining us in the service.

Janel grew up in Palmer Township and attended Palmer Moravian Church with her parents. She graduated from Nazareth High School in 1996, where she played basketball, ran track and cross country, and was in the marching band on the drum line. She graduated in 2000 from Ursinus College with B.S. in Chemistry and Minors in Philosophy/Religion and Politics. While at Ursinus, she met Christian Rice, and they were married in 2001. Janel began exploring a call to ministry in the middle of her college career, encouraged by her college chaplain. She earned a Master of Divinity from Harvard Divinity School in Cambridge, MA in 2003 where she also gained the experience of working in a local church and prison ministry. Feeling called to pursue ordination in the Moravian Church, she came back to Bethlehem to fulfill the ordination requirements with a Certificate of Ministry from Moravian Theological Seminary.

While at Moravian Seminary, she was introduced to Central as a student pastor. She was then called to Central as an assistant pastor from 2005-2015. While at Central, in 2011, a daughter, Sophie, was born to Christian and Janel.

Janel accepted the call to serve as pastor at Calvary Moravian Church, in Allentown in 2015. During this time, she became involved in the greater community through the Lehigh Conference of Churches, founded from the ministries of many local churches to serve the homeless, housing insecure, and hungry through a variety of programs. Janel served on the board of the Lehigh Conference of Churches for 6 years, and served as president for the last four. She led Calvary in serving as one of the providers of a monthly noon meal to over 100 guests each day. Janel's time at Calvary also included developing education programs for the community, starting a book sharing program for the local elementary schools called the Reading Room, and learning more about pastoral leadership in general.

In free time, her family loves to travel, anything from a quick Saturday trip to New York City or a family vacation. Janel enjoys walking and yoga, and if time permits, reading fiction. The family enjoys their wonderfully eclectic pets including their cat, Trinity, 9-year-old goldfish, Elaine, and

two very well-cared for hermit crabs. Janel adds that she has also been blessed by being the mom to a Swiftie, so she spends lots of time listening to and learning about Taylor Swift.

From the CMC staff, "We are thrilled to have Janel as our Senior Pastor and head of staff. Janel is humble, supportive, caring, hardworking, energetic, and unruffled. As a leader, Janel balances her decisions with both her heart and her mind and communicates her decisions with clarity and kindness. Janel is a team player who is always open to collaboration. We can't forget that an added bonus of Janel is the after-school presence of her daughter, Sophie, who is a constant source of energy, joy, curiosity, and fun conversations."

In closing, Janel offers these words,

"To say that this year has been surreal doesn't even begin to describe it - from the call as Pastor for Congregational Care and Community Outreach over the summer of 2023 to a wonderful fall working alongside one of my faith mentors, Pastor Hopeton. As we faced Pastor Hopeton's illness and passing in early January, days were certainly filled with much sorrow along with so many things to do. Yet all along this time, it has been a blessing to cry, laugh, and work with so many wonderful people and gifted leaders in this congregation who have held us together as a community. As your newly called Senior Pastor, I am humbled by your support, love, and faith, and I will try my very best to follow God's leading to serve this congregation and the greater community."

Join Us for Lunch, May 19 Reprise of the Trip to Jamaica

In February the History Committee sponsored a trip to Jamaica for the purpose of learning about the involvement of the Moravian Church with the enslaved peoples on the Island. Despite the unspeakable tragedy we all experienced upon the death of Pastor Hopeton, going ahead with the trip was seen as a tribute to his memory. Twenty-three travelers from different Moravian congregations, as well as friends of the church, participated. The experience was amazing and humbling. We would like to share our memories with you.

Originally settled by indigenous people from South America the Taino's "discovered "Christopher Columbus on their shores in 1494. The Spanish subdued the people by force and began importing slaves from Africa. In 1655 the British expelled the Spanish and continued to profit by slave labor particularly in the sugar cane fields. Moravian missionaries arrived in 1754. Their mission was to convert the slaves to Christianity. They did not confront the issue of slavery. Slavery was abolished by the British in 1834. Jamaica gained independence from Britain in 1962. They are still a part of the Commonwealth.

On Sunday, May 19th there will be a forum to report on the trip and share what we learned, particularly examining the response of the church to slavery and to the education of enslaved people. The program will be held in Nitschmann Hall following the 11 o'clock service. There will be a narrative accompanied by many photos. The History committee will provide lunch for those in attendance. Please consider this opportunity to learn about Moravian history in Jamaica

Mission Moment - Visit from Nepal

Jai Mashi, Vani and Shanti! Jai Mashi means 'Praise to the Messiah' and is used by the Nepali Moravians as a welcome greeting to show respect and honor. We hope you will join us to welcome, with respect and honor, The Reverends Shanti and Vani Pradhan while they visit Bethlehem during the month of May.

In 2009, Vani and Shanti graduated from Moravian Theological Seminary and were ordained just before returning to their home in Kathmandu, Nepal. They joined in ministry there with Shanti's brother Nagendra Pradhan serving two congregations which he had started, and since then, they have formed a third. Vani and Shanti had served at Central, College Hill, and Edgeboro Moravian churches as pastoral interns while at the Seminary. These three churches, as well as others in the US, have supported them spiritually and financially in their mission work over the years.

Vani and Shanti will celebrate their son Nahum's graduation from Moravian University Graduate School on May 4. On Wednesday, May 15 our Mission Committee will host a Mission Supper in the Christian Education building at 6 p.m. All are welcome! Vani and Shanti will present a program outlining their mission work in Kathmandu as well as their operation of the International Kindergarten and Shristi Academy. They started Shristi Academy as a grade school with first grade and have grown it a year at a time until now they have opened the high school with ninth grade. These are private, English speaking schools. They are not Christian schools, but through Vani's and Shanti's leadership, the children experience Christian values and ethics. We hope you will also hear about their recent participation in the formation of the Southeast Asian Province of the worldwide Moravian Church.

Vani and Shanti will be Central's guest speakers at the Sunday morning Lovefeast services on May 12. They will also visit their friends at College Hill and Edgeboro churches for Sunday services and a Moravian Village Sunday service. Included in the schedule is a reception with those individuals who have been with them in Nepal as visiting teachers under the Antioch program and those who might be interested in a Mission experience as an Antioch teacher in the future.

Camp Hope, Jamaica = \$20,152.39 distributed to Chester Morris, Camp Hope Jamaica Association in March.

Gifts restricted to Jamaica Schools = \$6,364.40. We are processing this request directly to Hopeton's sister and her connection with elementary school in Jamaica.

Another notable gift has been established, The Bishop C. Hopeton Clennon Memorial Endowment for Social Action with the donation received from Barry and Diane Kessler. Acceptable Plastic	NOT Acceptable Plastic
Pallet wrap and stretch film	Plastic bottles or other rigid plastic containers
Grocery bags	Degradable/compostable bags
Bread bags (free of crumbs)	Pre-washed salad mix bags
Case overwrap	Frozen food bags
Dry cleaning bags	Candy bar wrappers
Newspaper sleeves	Chip bags
Ziploc and other resealable food storage bags	Dried fruit and nut bags
(without any food residue/contamination, dry)	
Produce bags	Six-pack plastic rings
Product wraps	Pouch packaging
Retail bags	If material does not stretch easily
Air pillows (please deflate whenever possible)	If material tears like paper
Bubble wrap	If material is shiny & crinkles or crunches
Plastic shipping envelopes (please remove labels)	Thicker, stiff plastic for linens & beddings
Electronic wrap	Any plastic product that includes a real zipper
Ice bags	Pet food bags
Wood pellet bags (please remove sawdust)	Boat wrap

Ways to reduce plastic use:

Bring your own reusable bag to any store where you might be offered a plastic bag Wash out and reuse plastic bags

Bring your own containers to restaurants for leftovers to reduce the use of Styrofoam When ordering takeout request that no plastic utensils be included in your order Invest in reusable produce bags or take items loose

Select glass containers over plastic containers (pasta sauce, for example)
Use laundry strips instead of liquid detergent or pods in large plastic containers
