From Pastor Janel

The church seasons of Advent and Lent are often seasons of intentionality. We reflect on who we are, and how we might return to a deeper relationship with our authentic self and closer to the presence of God. Maybe we also start by remembering “Whose we are.” James Baldwin, in his partially autobiographical novel “The Fire Next Time” writes of the reassurance that every child wants, especially those who grow up feeling unwanted or untethered. The pastor of his church asks him, “Whose little boy are you?” and Baldwin feels for the first time reassured of his place in this world. Later he would reflect on his disillusionment with the hypocrisy he often saw in the church and its failure to extend the role of this unconditional love and acceptance. “If the concept of God has any validity or any use, it can only be to make us larger, freer, and more loving,” he concludes in the same novel.

I believe deeply we are God’s beloved children - that is “whose we are.” We are created and accepted by God from our beginning and then set free into this world to be bearers of this love. I sincerely hope you also believe this. But be careful, if you believe this, it can’t have exceptions. If we believe we are God’s beloved, then each and every person in this world is as well. It isn’t just members of Central’s community. It is those who have no interest in a church community or even God. It is those we routinely diminish by labels like homeless, disabled, illegal, foreigner, etc. It is those that we assume deserve less than us; less of a fair wage, less of a right to love, and less of a right to live in peace. We cannot continue to believe that we are God’s beloved if we do not see everyone — without exceptions — as also God’s beloved. And if we do, we will stand for their right not to be demonized by immigration status, or if they are incarcerated or who they voted for or whether they live in affluence or in war-torn poverty.

The Rev. Sarah Speed, in our Lenten program called “Full to the Brim” reminds us of “whose we are” and our creation from God’s love. “If love is our beginning, how can we live our lives led by love’s promises? It reminds us to live fully— as we pursue justice and hope, or express grief and gratitude. And so, this Lent, let us trust — fully — that we belong to God.”

This Lent, we begin with worship on Ash Wednesday remembering that from dust we are created and to dust we will return. But let’s also remember from love we are created and to God’s love we will return. Each and every one of us. Then join us - as we explore a different return to God, what we will call an “expansive Lent”. See page 2 for more information on our mid-week Lenten programs, exploring how to live in this expansive love and grace and community building - instead of giving in to fear, apathy or hate. As the poem “Even the Stones will Cry out” by Rev. Sarah Speed concludes,

“Justice will bubble up,
hope will raise its head,
love will rise to the surface. Amen.”

My gratitude to our Minister of Music, Becky Lepore, for reminding us during a recent program on Christian Nationalism; as we learn and engage with others, we still do so with humility and in All things Love. See page 4 for more on this program.



Mid-Week Lenten Program

“Full to the Brim: Envisioning, Creating, and Sustaining Community—Living with Abundance in a World of Scarcity”

Full to the Brim will use beautiful liturgies, art and poetry from Sanctified Art following the Sunday morning’s lectionary readings. This year’s Lenten Scripture are filled with parables and promises of God’s abundant and expansive grace; Jesus as a mother hen, a prodigal son welcomed home, a fig tree nurtured with care and hope, precious oil poured out lovingly and freely, stones shouting out with praise.

Sanctified Art writes about this series, “We’ve done nothing to deserve or earn this grace, and yet, like water, it spills over. Full to the Brim is an invitation — into a radically different Lent, into a full life. It’s an invitation to be authentically who you are, to counter scarcity and injustice at every turn, to pour out even more grace wherever it is needed. It disrupts the scarcity mentality that capitalism, oppression, or hierarchy can plant inside of us. When we allow ourselves to be filled to the brim with God’s lavish love, that love spills over into everything we touch. . . .

This Lent, let us trust — fully — that we belong to God. Let us increase our capacity to receive and give grace. Let us discover the expansive life God dreams for us”.

The Bethlehem-based Helen & R.K. Laros Foundation, established in 1952 by Laros Silk Company Founder and Owner R.K. Laros and his wife Helen, announces the Annual Founders Award recognizing the late Rt. Rev. C. Hopeton Clennon. The Trustees have chosen to recognize Rt. Rev. Hopeton Clennon, known as Hopeton,

who was an integral part of the Bethlehem community and made significant contributions as Senior Pastor of the Central Moravian Church since 2013, as Chaplain of Moravian University and Moravian Theological Seminary, and as a supporter of the Bethlehem community as a whole.

The Foundation Chair R.K. Laros III, Vice Chair Laura Bennett Shelton, and Foundation Trustees gathered at a virtual event on January 21, 2025, to recognize this year’s recipients and to announce Hopeton as the 2025 Founders Award honoree.

The Founders Award recognizes the Founders, Helen & R.K. Laros, as faithful and continuous supporters of their community and is only awarded when the board sees an example of the Founder’s commitment in Bethlehem. Past recipients of the Founders Award include Bob Rapp, Executive Director of Bethlehem Emergency Sheltering; Jeff Parks, ArtsQuest Visionary and Founder; Bonnie Coyle, Board Member and tireless leader for the Hispanic Center of the Lehigh Valley; Diane LaBelle, innovative Executive Director Lehigh Valley Charter High School for the Arts; Sharon Jones Zondag, former Executive Director of the Helen & R.K.Laros Foundation; and Winston Alozie, steadfast Executive Director Boys and Girls Club of Bethlehem.

Since 1952, the Helen & R.K. Laros Foundation has provided grant support with a focus on enduring capital projects that will have significant community impact in the Bethlehem Area. Moravian Unity Offering (March 2): The 2025 Unity Offering has been designated for the Moravian Church in North America to support the project “Common Moravian Theological Curriculum in Spanish”.
