#### From Pastor Janel

"For everything, there is a season" so begins an oftquoted chapter 3 of Ecclesiastes, reminding us of the varied parts of the human experience. I particularly appreciate the New International Version's translation of 3:12-13 "I know that there is nothing better for people than to be happy and to do good while they live. That each of them may eat and drink, and find satisfaction in all their toil—this is the gift of God." Be happy. Do Good. This is God's gift.

The seasons of life vary, but a charge to be happy while doing good is a beautiful gift of God.

A shift in the seasons is definitively around us as we enter Memorial Day and into the June and July months, and it is present in church life as well. For many of us it is a time of taking a breath as schedules lighten up. Our family looks forward to a vacation coming up which will include a chance for me to represent Central and the greater Moravian Church as part of the World Heritage Transnational meetings in Christiansfeld, Denmark. I'll be joining with other officials and my clergy colleagues at transnational Moravian Church Settlements World Heritage sites, including the Rev. Dr. Jørgen Bøytler (Christiansfeld), Rev. Drs. Peter and Jill Vogt (Herrnhut, Germany) and Rt. Rev. Sarah Groves (Gracehill, N. Ireland/UK) to celebrate Christiansfeld's 10<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of World Heritage inscription on July 4<sup>th</sup>. As a church, we celebrate a much older anniversary (283 years) on June 25<sup>th</sup> in worship on June 22<sup>nd</sup>. And in July we commemorate the inspiration for the Moravian Church, marking 610 years since the martyrdom of reformer and Catholic priest John Hus on July 6<sup>th</sup>, 1415. Hus inspired followers to later start the Unity of the Brethren (Moravian Church) in 1457.

One celebration this summer that is certainly bittersweet as we celebrate and say good bye to our associate pastor, the Rev. Josh Follweiler, on Sunday, July 27<sup>th</sup>. Josh will be leaving to pursue doctoral studies in the Ph.D. program at Princeton University. We all know how much of an impact Josh has had on our church community; as a leader in our Christian Education program, from children's Sunday School and Friday Fun Night, to adult education, assisting with many church family programs, providing pastoral care and leading in worship with insightful and engaging preaching. And we are most grateful for his energy, wisdom, and love!

We all know that Moravians are good at following one of the charges of Ecclesiastes: Eat and Drink together. But remember that in the midst of all the seasons of life, and all the swirling chaos that is our contemporary world and within our lives to also hear the simple foundations of what it means to be human. God wants us to be happy and do good. May God be with you for a peaceful summer.

This background, along with his seventeen years of teaching and leadership at Ursinus College, equip Christian to serve the seminary in service to God and the world. As a member of Central, it is a distinct joy to congratulate one of our own as Christian begins his new role on June 1.

# **Celebrating the Rev. Josh Follweiler**

In June 2024, the Rev. Josh Follweiler received a oneyear appointment and call to serve as Central's Associate Pastor from the Southern Province of the Moravian Church. Early this spring, we are thrilled to celebrate Josh's acceptance into Princeton University's Ph.D. program. However, it is a bittersweet celebration for us at Central as we remain so grateful for his ministry with us as Associate Pastor over this past year. Josh's appointment ends at the end of July, and we invite the congregation to join us as we say goodbye in worship on Sunday, July 27th at 10 a.m. in the Sanctuary, followed by a reception in the Christian Education building. We wish Josh and his wife Molly God's blessings in this new chapter of their lives.



# Nepali Moravian Outreach Updates

The latest project has been a "futsal" turf field now fully installed. The much-awaited Shristi Futsal is finally ready—and it looks fantastic! It's already being thoroughly enjoyed by both children and adults alike.

We are deeply grateful to God and to our faithful prayer partners for making this possible-including the Central Moravian Church (USD 4,500), the Goshen Moravian Church (USD 2,000), and individual donors who contributed the remaining amount (300) through the Board of World Mission.

To meet the demands for safe and progressive modern facilities, we have installed security cameras throughout the campus. Another significant step forward has been the installation of SMART Boards in all classrooms from Grades 1 to 10.

The Moravian Church in Nepal sends these updates: We are forming a District Executive Board and the local Church Executive Board. Church continues to reach out to places where it is much needed. Please pray for believers and their faith to be resilient despite social and cultural challenges.



#### **CONGRATULATIONS** to Our Confirmands

Many congratulations to our confirmands Alysa Jones and Sophie Rice for completing a year of confirmation instruction with Pastor Josh and being welcomed as adult members on April 27<sup>th</sup>.

Each shared wonderful essays reflecting on what they learned from their year, as well as why they wanted to take this new step along their faith journeys.

# What is Confirmation in the Moravian Church?

Confirmation is a rite by which persons baptized as children publicly affirm the covenant made for them in baptism and confirm their faith. Confirmation is a personal decision, made by the young person, to take the next step in their faith journey and involvement with the church, but it is not made only as an individual. We as a church community also publicly recognize and affirm this young person and continue to support them along their lives' journeys. Maybe now more than ever, it is vital for our young people to know that they are loved by God and a community outside of their immediate family. This faith community will celebrate with them over their successes but also hold them through challenges as they grow into adulthood. A regular yearlong confirmation class will be held starting this fall and all youth ages 12-16 are eligible. Ideally, confirmation will be for 8<sup>th</sup> and 9<sup>th</sup> graders, but if there are siblings in 7<sup>th</sup>, we will allow them to join as well. Before the craziness of summer, we'll hold a **parents' meeting** after worship on Sunday, June 1<sup>st</sup> (approximately 11:15 a.m.) in the Kleiner Saal (2<sup>nd</sup> floor of the sanctuary, east end). We'll review a potential calendar, talk about best days/times for confirmation class, expectations for confirmation, etc.

The Confirmation year will have approximately two gatherings each month, one for learning more about our faith stories, Bible, and Moravian Church history and one to explore the ways that Central serves in our church and greater community. This will often include field trips to do community service, explore other faith communities (synagogues, mosques and churches), and more. Pastor Janel will be leading next year's confirmation class.

#### **A New Bench in Memory** of Robert Adams for Food Pantry!

We are grateful for generous donations to provide for a new bench for food pantry clients and others to wait and rest as they come into the back of the church office. This bench is given in loving memory of Bob Adams, a faithful Central volunteer for decades who greeted each client with a smile and often help in Spanish or English. Bob's willingness to pitch in anywhere and everywhere he was needed, especially with translation, was much appreciated.

As we approach the one year anniversary of the designation as a World Heritage Moravian Church Settlement World Heritage site in Bethlehem, shared transnationally with Christiansfeld, Denmark, Gracehill (Northern Ireland / UK) and Herrnhut (Germany), we pause to reflect upon the wonderful accomplishments of this year. With the urging of our strategic plan, Central set up a World Heritage Committee to respond to needs within our church and buildings after the inscription. We are grateful for the leadership of the Rev. Dr Betsy Miller of this committee. After piloting some open houses, Central has been proud to offer regular open house and tours of the Old Chapel and Sanctuary on Fridays and Saturdays since September. With the leadership of an onsite



tour coordinator, Greta Reifinger, assistance from Rev. Carol Reifinger (along with a wonderful pop-up gift shop) and many faithful volunteers, we have shared an experience and tour of Central's buildings with nearly 2,000 visitors since September 2024. These tours continue to attract attention as downtown Bethlehem welcomes more visitors.

A World Heritage Saturday tour is led by Historic Bethlehem Museum & Sites each Saturday as an extensive tour of the buildings, ruins and God's Acre that are a part of the inscription. Central's Joint Board approved access to the Old Chapel and Sanctuary by a trained tour guide.

In October 2024, we welcomed dignitaries from around the world and within our government to recognize the transnational World Heritage inscription for Moravian Church Settlements with a celebration in Bethlehem including a worship service at Central. This June 2025, we look forward to welcoming participants in the World Heritage USA Symposium who will hold their three day conference at Moravian University.

And one of the celebrations that we are most excited about is the upcoming Community Celebration for World Heritage on Saturday, September 6<sup>th</sup> from 12 - 7 p.m. This block party will close down Church Street and fill our historic Church Green and Payrow plaza with a celebration of all that Bethlehem is; from our history to our present day community groups. Local schools will showcase their musical talent, artisans from diverse groups will share and provide programs and activities for children, food trucks will

line up Church Street, and within the church green we'll have music and representation from all our Bethlehem Moravian churches as well as local partners like the Moravian Historical Society, Moravian Academy and Moravian Archives.

As part of this day, the Johnston Festival concert will be held on September 6 at 3 p.m. in the Sanctuary, and Bethlehem Area Moravian churches are working together to welcome the community to an ice cream social and Community Lovefeast in the late afternoon. The day is sure to be fun for all ages, and gives our greater community a chance to see and learn more about our living heritage while enjoying good music, food and community.


Currently our World Heritage Council composed of representation from the owners or lessees of the inscription sites, City of Bethlehem, Bethlehem Area Moravians, Moravian University, Historic Bethlehem Museum & Sites and Central Moravian Church, oversee the site. Pastor Janel will continue to represent Central on the Council and transnational coordinating groups, but later this summer a Site Manager / Executive Director for the World Heritage Bethlehem site will be hired. Moravian University has generously led the efforts for funding this position and the search process, and we are hopeful to name this position by early fall.

In the midst of all the World Heritage excitement is the heart of why we were inscribed - the Moravian Church. As www.moravianchurchsettlements.org states, "The continuing presence of Moravian Church communities in each settlement ties the historic structures — critical heritage elements in the ongoing *maintenance of practice and beliefs* — *to the ongoing* life of the wider Moravian Church and municipal community, its sustainable development, and common well-being."

We thank God for the privilege of serving in these historic places and pray that we may continue to share the Good News of God's love in our 21st century world, building community and creating avenues for peace and justice in our world.

# Reduce, Reuse, Recycle & Use Less Plasti

- It's summertime! Keep cool: Follow the shade. Spend ti in rooms that don't receive direct sunlight. Perhaps your downstairs is cooler than upstairs. Block the heat by add window blinds/coverings/shades during the sunniest tim of the day. Avoid using appliances that add heat (clothes dryer, dishwasher) during the daytime.
- Ceiling fans work! Set your air conditioner 4 degrees warmer and cut your energy costs by using a ceiling fan
- · Learn more about rainforests and their importance to the health of Planet Earth. https://rainforests.mongabay.com
- Plastic pots and trays (for flower pots) are unwelcome at the Bethlehem Recycling Center. If you have too many, local garden centers and nurseries if they would like the back. Many will gladly accept them for reuse.
- One person's junk is another person's treasure. Read (or read) Junk Day on Juniper Street, by Lilian Moore. The organize a 'junk day' with your friends and neighbors. Or join a Buy Nothing group. You'll be amazed at how those items you no longer want will find a 'good home' elsewhere. https://buynothingproject.org
- Pour <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cup baking soda down your kitchen drain, follow by  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup vinegar, and then some boiling water. This combination breaks down fatty acids that block drains, a it keeps the drain smelling fresh.
- Be Bee-Friendly! Include pollinator plants in your garde such as milkweed, coneflowers, parsley and fennel. Hav a water source nearby (like a birdbath) is also helpful fo pollinators.
