From Pastor Janel

The Christmas season in Bethlehem brought the spirit of Moravian hospitality and love to the thousands of visitors who visited our Putz and Star and Candle Shop, took a tour of the church or chapel, worshipped with us, attended a University or Academy vespers service, or wandered through the streets, filled with peace of the beauty of lights and candles (and snow this year!). I am most grateful to our amazing volunteers, including the Sacristan corp who puts in a healthy dose of overtime this season!

In a season of joy and light, we were grounded in liturgies and prayers from Sanctified Art and our seasonal theme, “In the time of King Herod, Insist on Hope”. Sunday after Sunday we were reminded not to deny the fearful times we live in: those facing medical diagnosis and the loss of loved ones, the times of political division and outrage, and the attacks on some of most vulnerable in our society - the immigrant and refugee, the unhoused, and those with food insecurity, and the list could go on. We awoke to news in mid-December not only of a horrific shooting at Brown University but also a direct attack against the Jewish community in Australia, and the violence around the world continues. We might be tempted to throw up our hands and give up hope.

The season we enter, Epiphany and the visit of the magi from afar, faced their own threats of violence and justified fear, and these “wise men” charge us to do something different. To “**Insist on Hope,**” as we have said throughout Advent, and in so doing to take a step into the unknown, knowing that we do not go alone.

And so, in the quieter times of January and February, we continue to insist on hope by living this way. Feeding the hungry and gathering with friends and community. Protesting injustices and writing letters to those in power. Reaching out to those going through a hard time; whether it is a cold and dark season (literally) or one that they face because of grief, illness or other reasons. Insist on Hope in Epiphany and the season beyond.

“Today, God, we pray for courage. In a world that is rattled with fear, fill the sky with stars and guide our steps, so that, like the magi, we might walk toward you in courage. For if we’re honest, the world is a scary place. We fear change. We fear death. We fear being alone or not being enough. We fear the Herods of the world, just like we fear losing our way. Today we pray—make us like the magi with courage to keep walking, dreaming, hoping, seeking and reaching. Reaching toward you and reaching toward each other.” Amen. Reduce, Reuse, Recycle; Use Less Plastic

- Here's a New Year's Resolution for most of us: Clean out your inbox! All emails, even the ones parked in your inbox, consume power thanks to the network of data centers around the world that store and manage delivery of our communications. An average year of email could have the impact of driving 200 miles!
- Here's another resolution: Take a hike! Or just walk around your neighborhood. Dress for the weather; you'll be surprised how the fresh air and exercise will improve your fitness and attitude. And, according to recent studies, combined with a good diet, a regular routine of walking just 30 minutes/day helps ward off dementia! Bring along a bag while you walk. Collect trash and recyclables Set a good example for your neighbors and clean up your neighborhood.
- It may seem early, but it's time to contact your local CSA (Community Supported Agriculture) to purchase a 'share' for the upcoming growing/harvesting season. <http://www.buylocalglv.org/csa/>
- According to PennEnvironment, there are 39 municipalities in Pennsylvania with bans on plastic bags, but no statewide ban. Write to your state and local legislators, urging them to introduce legislation in support of a ban on single-use plastic bags. Here's a disturbing fact: in the US, the average family uses 365 plastic bags per year; in Denmark, that number is 4.
- Check and clean your dryer exhaust vent regularly, and clean the lint filter after every load. This improves your dryer's efficiency and reduces the fire hazard.
- Fill your home with houseplants and purify the air. Take cuttings of your favorite, root them and share with friends and neighbors.
- Serve a meatless meal at least once/week: better for you, and better for the planet! And try to eat beef only one meal/week. Watch the Netflix program "You Are What You Eat: A Twin Experiment". Educate yourself about healthy eating.

Hurricane Melissa – Jamaica and the Caribbean December 2, 2025

The Board of World Mission (BWM) has received a second, more detailed report, from the Provincial Board of the Moravian Church, Jamaica and Cayman Islands Province (MCJCI) about the needs following Hurricane Melissa. The extent of the destruction is becoming clearer as assessments are conducted in more communities.

According to this latest report, 37 of the province’s 64 Moravian congregations have been affected in some way, and nearly 50 church-owned properties—including churches, manses, and schools—have reportedly suffered some degree of damage. Of these, five buildings have been completely destroyed, 16 have lost their roofs entirely, 14 have partial roof damage, and 13 have minor damage. The Provincial Board currently estimates \$1.6 million USD in damage to church-owned properties. This amount does not include the additional funds needed for the church’s broader community response.

The Provincial Board also stated it needs more financial help to keep paying salaries for pastors and staff, which is about \$25,000 each month. It also needs funds for relief and rebuilding supplies for congregations and families. The Board continues to work hard—mobilizing volunteers, sharing information, finding temporary housing, and securing new worship spaces for congregations whose buildings are no longer usable.

The devastation extends far beyond church properties. It is estimated that 150,000–200,000 homes across Jamaica have been damaged or destroyed, placing immense pressure on local communities and the national response.

Thanks to the generosity of many donors, the Board of World Mission has now sent \$40,000 to the MCJCI Disaster Response Fund to support the Provincial Board’s immediate efforts. Additional support remains urgently needed.

Volunteer Interest Sign-Up: Plans are underway to repair and outfit Camp Hope (Jamaica) as a future hosting site for short-term mission teams. While this process is in the very early stages, we have already heard from many individuals, congregations, and groups eager to assist with relief and rebuilding efforts.

If you, your group, or your congregation would like to indicate interest in potentially participating in a future mission team, please visit MoravianMission.org/serve to complete a brief online form. This helps us prepare appropriately and communicate next steps when the time comes.

Donation Matching Challenge: In a remarkable expression of faithful partnership, the London Moravian Church in Cambridge, Wisconsin, has established a \$30,000 matching challenge for Hurricane Melissa relief. This small



congregation has not drawn from its endowment fund in eight years, yet felt profoundly called to act in this moment. The leadership of the London Moravian Church has invited Moravians across North America to join them in meeting—and prayerfully exceeding—this matching opportunity. All gifts designated for MDR will be matched dollar-for-dollar up to \$30,000, doubling the impact of every contribution.
