### From Pastor Janel

What are you looking for? This was a theme (and Jesus's first words to his future disciples) I highlighted earlier this year. It is profound that Jesus comes seeking to know what are our needs and desires. But we can only hear those words of Jesus if we also choose to seek him, taking the time for meditation and worship, recentering ourselves from the demands of our lives that relentlessly beg for our attention. St. Ambrose (340–397 C.E.) wrote these beautiful words: "O God, teach me to see you, and reveal yourself to me when I seek you. For I cannot see you unless you first seek me, nor find you unless you first reveal yourself to me. Let me seek you in longing and long for you in seeking. Let me find you in love and love you in finding."

The season of Lent is a gift, a recentering. It is not a destination but rather an invitation into seeking. Beginning with Jesus's wilderness time, we also enter a period of 40 days to wander and center, pray and watch, and seek God's presence. This doesn't mean that we are immune to the wonderful and terrifying

ways of the world around us, but we are seeking a center that is God. To this end, our Lenten worship will center around the question of Seeking and the permission to ask honest questions for a deeper faith. Within the readings for this season come the honest questions of seekers, as we follow the Gospel of John throughout much of Lent and hear from Nicodemus, an outcast woman, and an exhausted community. In these stories, each person is seeking a new beginning and a deeper faith. What they get is sometimes not what they are seeking, but rather a new perspective or a different path forward. Questions can be challenging, but also hopeful, for it is only when we question that we can grow. Through the changes within us and around us, in days when it feels like we are only walking on Jello or even quicksand, we pray that this Lenten season can be a time of recentering and restorative seeking.

I turn to our 2026 Congregational Watchword from the Moravian Daily Texts to center us: O Come, Let us worship and bow down, let us kneel before the Lord, our maker! (Psalm 95:6). My faith was formed in Ursinus College's chapel program when I knelt down before being sent off to serve. Each Sunday we began with these words on confession that I will be sharing each Wednesday during our Mid-Week Lenten program, which called us to Seek the Lord in what we do and say:

**We come before you today as broken people in the need of forgiveness – having come from anguished moments in the night, and betrayals in the day; having said cutting words or no words. Often bewildered by the obvious or subtle suffering that we see – or that is our own – we have been uncertain. We have concentrated on the defense of ourselves and have found the condemnation of others easy. We have not received others simply as they are, nor met them as ourselves. Hear our various inward cries. Forgive us and heal us. Alone we cannot be healed. Therefore, lead us to discovery of others, free us from our bondages; cleanse our hearts with honesty and give us courage to accompany our fears; and bring us to faith and hope and love.**

Seek God – and may we be grounded in a faith and a faith community where God's presence and love is found in the questions and the challenges. A Blessed Lent to you.

## Guest Preacher, the Rev. Dr. Jennika Eckhaus

We are pleased to welcome the Rev. Dr. Jennika Eckhaus on Sunday, March 8th to serve as our guest preacher while Pastor Janel is on vacation. Jennika graduated in 1998 from Moravian College with a degree in Chemistry and from Moravian Theological Seminary in 2001 with a Master of Divinity and was ordained by the Moravian Church in June 2001. She served congregations in Lake Mills, WI and Bethlehem, PA. She returned to Moravian University in 2013 to serve as Chaplain of the University deepening her commitment to spiritual formation in academic life. In 2020 she received her certificate in Spiritual Direction and in 2025 she received her Doctor of Ministry degree from the Moravian University School of Theology. Her doctoral research focuses on “Midlife as Spiritual Practice: The Quotidian Journey to Becoming Present to What Matters Most”. Jennika currently serves as the Dean for Spirituality and Inclusion and the Director of Moravian Church Relations for the School of Theology. She serves as an administrative faculty member and teaches in the Compass Program, the Spiritual Direction Program, and the Masters’ Programs.

## Church Council Comments from Pastor Janel

Here's my pastoral comments and goals I outlined at Church Council, February 1<sup>st</sup>, calling us to be a church with a strong focus on community engagement balanced by depth in spiritual life, fellowship and worship opportunities.

1. Central should continue to work on creating a culture of engagement and radical inclusivity. In an "Either/Or" world, how can we be a place where Both/And? For example, a Historic Church AND Living Relevant Ministries in Today's World, Social Justice AND Community fellowship, Creating Conversation across Differences, Valuing and Respecting Different Voices, Charity AND justice work (advocacy) in community.
2. As we welcomed 18 new members last year, we need to continue to work on engaging them in our church community, providing more virtual and small groups opportunities for engagement. Likewise, we look to enhance our children's ministry (thank you Linda de Vries!) with opportunities for a growing population of older youth.
3. As we grow into our World Heritage status as Moravian Church Settlements-Bethlehem, we balance our role as a church community with also sharing with a broader visiting audience. A new website in 2026 as well as continued tours of the Chapel and Sanctuary will help us be the interpretive lens for telling the Moravian Church story.

## Racial Justice at Central Moravian Church Moravian Magazine February 2026

“Should we cancel? Can we re-schedule? A lot of people are telling us they can’t come because of the snow!”

This 10 a.m. phone call came just hours before the Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. ceremony on January 18, 2026, in Bethlehem, Pennsylvania. But the backstory to those earnest questions began in 2023 with the experience of several Central Moravian members in a program called “Sacred Ground.” Because of their calling to put their expanded awareness into action, Central Moravian Church has developed a vibrant relationship with Second Baptist Church, a predominantly African American congregation in Bethlehem.

Sacred Ground is an educational program about race in America. The Episcopal Church designed it to better inform Christians—especially White Christians—about U.S. racism. Using readings and videos, small groups discuss what they learn. It involves 11 sessions of 1 ½ to 2 hours offered remotely. Participants develop trust so they can talk meaningfully about material that includes Indigenous Peoples, African Americans, Latinx, and Asian Americans. Sacred Ground encourages people to become aware of harmful racial patterns in our country and once they have done so, to find ways to undo those harmful patterns. The program now includes other Protestant congregations as well as Episcopalians. Sacred Ground in the Lehigh Valley will be offered again in Fall 2026.

Several Central Moravian Church members participated in Sacred Ground offered in 2023. Their Sacred Ground experience so moved Barry and Diane Kessler that they sought to create opportunities for interracial dialog. These “Caring Conversations” aimed to give Persons of Color and Whites a place and time to talk about their concerns leading to better understandings and healthier interactions. With the support of the late Bishop Hopeton Clennon (and subsequently of the Rev. Janel Rice), Barry and Diane reached out to Pastors Paul and Tara Patrick of Second

Baptist Church in Bethlehem. What started as a dinner conversation in Barry and Diane’s home has become a gathering where participants from both congregations share opinions and ideas on topics such as the current political climate, Christian Nationalism, post Reconstruction America, and marginalization.

Another outgrowth of the Sacred Ground experience was a bus tour of Philadelphia historic sites featuring African Americans. Members of both churches attended. A guide led the group through the historic district and Mother Bethel A.M.E. Church, the oldest African American Episcopal Church in the United States. Its church building is the oldest one continuously owned by African Americans.

Which brings us back to that Sunday morning phone call on January 18. Initially, the two churches planned to celebrate Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.’s interfaith legacy together. Then the program expanded to become a community-wide event. Additional sponsors included Moravian University School of Theology, Bethlehem Interfaith Group, and Bethlehem Area Moravians. Despite the unexpected snowstorm, participants “stepped out in faith” and proceeded. Second Baptist Church youth presented 15 historical figures in a “wax museum” format. Vocalists, dancers, poetry performers, and speakers from the Jewish, Muslim, and Protestant Christian faiths offered a formal program in Foy Hall at Moravian University. Nearly 100 attendees braved the winter weather.

Since partnering with Second Baptist, Central Moravian also has consulted about food pantry programs, sharing information and learning about each other’s procedures for combating food scarcity. This spring, Central Moravian members will get on the bus with Second Baptist members riding to New Jersey for Pastor Paul’s elevation to be a Bishop. Additional opportunities to share their Christian embrace of love and service will no doubt arise in the days and years ahead.

Check their websites, or give them a call and ask how you can help. Not only does volunteering help the organization; it also keeps you involved in the community, combats loneliness and improves mental health!
- There IS another online place to shop for new and used books. Check out <https://www.betterworldbooks.com/go/mission> Every book purchased from Better World Books helps them donate books to people who need them. BWB has donated over 38 million books. BWB also provides literacy grants to educational nonprofits and libraries, and has partnered with a variety of organizations such as Books for Africa, Internet Archive, and Little Free Library. And they ‘never, ever’ throw away a book. “Any book for which we cannot find a proper home is recycled”. Check out their website (above) for more information. FYI: The Southern Lehigh Library in Center Valley is a partner with Better World Books.
- Use wool dryer balls in your dryer, rather than dryer sheets, to soften clothes and reduce static cling. Dryer sheets are single-use and coated with chemicals, while dryer balls are reusable and work by physically separating clothes. Your laundry may not smell as fragrant as with dryer sheets, but your environmental impact will be less.
- Reduce your nighttime light pollution. Research shows that our porch and security lights are major causes of insect decline (not good for those pollinators!!), Consider turning off your lights at night. Or use motion sensor security lights. Or replace the white bulb in your lights with yellow or amber-tinted LED bulbs. These color wavelengths are the least attractive to nocturnal insects.
- The Busy Workers’ Plant & Attic Treasures sale is on Mother’s Day weekend in May, but collections for Attic Treasures begin right after Easter. Watch for collection times in *The Belfry*, *Constant Contact*, and *Sunday Times*; now is a good time to go through the garage, attic, basement, closets, etc. for all those treasures that you no longer need and would like to donate!
